LEGGE SOUNDS A SHARP WARNING TO THE FARMERS

WASHINGTON, March 5.—(UPI)—A strong threat that a rail embargo against shipping wheat from the West to the East will hold their stocks until storage facilities become available has been issued by Chairman Alexander Legge of the Interstate Commerce Commission.
