WOMEN OFFER DRY TESTIMONY TO COMMITTEE

Evidence Purporting to Show How Prohibition Has Benefited Nation Given at Important Hearing in Capital

WASHINGTON, March 13 (UP)—A brilliant band of dry leaders bombarded the house Judiciary committee for two hours Wednesday with statements tending to prohibit and detest the wet to repeal or modify it.

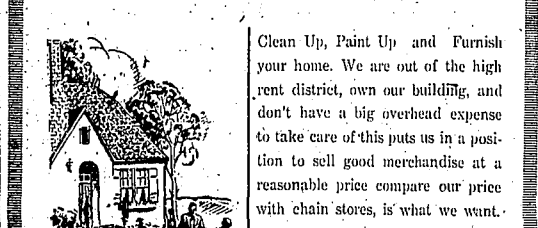

INJURY FORCES CORTEZ TO QUIT IN MATCH HERE

Doctor Says Mexican Suffered Paralysis of the Optic Nerve, Because of a Blow; Technical K. O. Is Awarded

Temporarily blinded in the tenth round, Joe Cortez of Idaho was unable to continue his fight with Willard Norton here last night and Norton was awarded the victory by technical knockout.

The fight was about a draw fairly in the tenth when Cortez showed the hand, through the ropes, in his own corner and complained that he could not see. The referee waved Norton to the other corner and continued to count Cortez out while two doctors were called to the ring. One doctor said Cortez had suffered a blow which temporarily paralyzed the optic nerve and the other doctor said Cortez might have gotten a bit of rye.

In his eye from his own glove after being pounded to his knees early in the frame. Fabrics Design

Correct for the New Silhouette

Nineteen thirty silks and cottons are presenting a new design created especially for the longer silhouette with pattern and stripes arranged in proportion to give the most flattering effect to the 1936 figure.

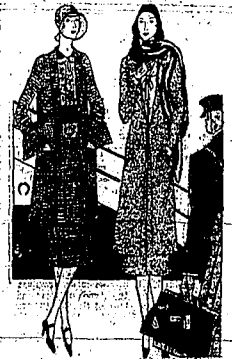
