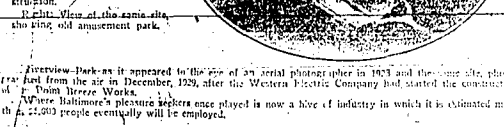

YUBA, Cal., March 25 (AP)—A young girl murder mystery was engaging the attention of detectives here and in a score of California cities today as authorities tried to determine the identity of a girl found dead in the road near region of Humboldt and Del Norte counties last night.

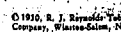
