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DAIRY PROFESSOR ASKS IDAHOANS TO EAT MORE BUTTER

Raise in Price of Butter for Fellow Greater Consumption according to Teacher at University of Idaho

1220's Note.—This is the first of a series of four articles on butter substitution, prepared by Professor Thorpe of the Dept. of Dairy Husbandry of the University of Idaho college of agriculture, to promote the consumption of Idaho dairy products. The second of the series will be published in the Idaho Times later.

Approximately 2,500,000 pounds more of butter were withdrawn from storage in the United States during January 1930, than during the same month in 1929. This reduction in the surplus of storage butter is encouraging, but it is an assurance that the reduction will continue. The surplus of dairy products in storage included not only butter, but also evaporated and condensed milk, dried milk and cream. Much milk and cream that has usually been sold for manufacturing into cheese and evaporated milk has been added instead to the surplus and converted into butter. This has resulted in increasing the surplus of butter and has disrupted the normal relation between butter and other dairy products.

On February 1, 1930, there were in storage in the United States, 35,482,000 pounds of butter in excess of what was in storage February 1, 1929. Recent reports indicate that this surplus has not been materially reduced during February. In fact, there is a possibility of a slight gain.

A strenuous effort must be made to increase the consumption of butter for the reduction of the surplus of butter affects not only directly the butter industry, but indirectly other portions of the industry such as the evaporated and condensed milk, the dried milk and the cream industries. Unless the present economic condition of dairy products is remedied, it will undoubtedly have a decreasing effect on all efforts which are made to increase the consumption of butter.

One of the easiest and most effective means contributing to the present dairy situation in the United States, is to eat more of the so-called butter substitutes. The production of these so-called butter substitutes in the United States during 1929 increased 11 per cent and the consumption of them most nutritious and economical increased 22.5 per cent. The average person consumes 1 1/2 pounds of butter substitutes a week, and interest in the combination increased 22.5 per cent. Every pound of butter substitutes used represents a pound of butter not sold. In Idaho there were approximately 12,000,000 pounds of butter substitutes sold during 1929. This was 2 1/2 pounds per capita and which reduced the same number of pounds of butter, which is equivalent to the annual production of 12,000,000 pounds of butter. The price of butter substitutes is not as high as the price of butter. As it was, the money spent for butter substitutes went to manufacturers outside of the state of Idaho.

"Fresh vegetables are particularly desirable at this time of the year and the vegetables are healthy because of the vitamins they contain, and the iron and the salts necessary for the proper toning up on the system," said Dr. Halley.

"Vegetables are particularly palatable at this season of the year and should be served at every table where a child eats, he said.

A check through the markets of Twin Falls today shows that homegrown green onions and fresh green spinach are being offered for sale. Other early season vegetables, including carrots, turnips, beets, radishes, celery, cauliflower, head lettuce and cabbage have been shipped into this city for retail purposes from southern truck gardens. As fast as locally grown vegetables become available the importing products will decline. New potatoes, of course, will not be placed on the market locally before the latter part of June or the first of July. Some may be shipped in before that time by the various produce companies.

All vegetables displayed in the Twin Falls markets were in good condition, being fresh and crisp. "Though it is still a little early for that sort of thing, many housewives of southern Idaho will soon be able to take knife and can outside and find a mass of delicious greens."
