

DAIRY PROFESSOR ASKS IDAHOANS TO EAT MORE BUTTER

Raise In Price of Butter; World Follow Greater Consumption according to Teacher at University of Idaho

(Editor's Note.—This is the first of a series of four articles on butter substitutes, prepared by the author of "The Economics of the Dairy Industry of the University of Idaho," college of agriculture, to promote the consumption of Idaho dairy products.)

State during 1929 increased 14 per cent. consumption of them, most noticeably increased 2.5¢ a pound for cap-sulphur. Unless the present economic condition of dairy products is reexamined, will it not be wise to take some measure to improve general agricultural conditions?

It is the writer's opinion that the major influences contributing to the present dairy situation in the United States, as well as in Idaho, are the production of these so-called butter substitutes in the United

States and the production of butter in foreign countries. We believe that every dairyman, every farmer should provide his state pride with butter produced and distributed in its natural form.

"Fresh green vegetables should be much in evidence on the family dinner table now than winter vegetables. The market price of fresh vegetables is becoming available," stated Dr. George Halliley director of the dairy health unit, Thursday afternoon. "Fresh vegetables are the most nutritious, especially in the early part of the year and are exceptionally healthy because of the vitamins they contain, and the trained housewife who makes the proper topping up on the system said Dr. Halliley.

"Vegetables are particularly popular at the present season, and should be served at every table where a child sits, he said.

An check through the market of Twin Falls today shows that hometown green onions and fresh green spinach are being offered for sale. Other early seasonal vegetables including carrots turnips, leeks, radishes, cauliflower, head lettuce and cabbage have been shipped into this town for purposes from southern truck gardens. As far as locally grown vegetables become available the importers import products will decline. New potatoes, however, are still plentiful on the market locally before the latter part of June or the first of July. Some may be shipped in before that time by the various packers, provided the market is good.

All vegetables displayed in the Twin Falls markets were in good condition. Being fresh and crisp, they are easily prepared for that sort of thing, many housewives of southern Idaho will soon be able to take knife and cut out and find a morsel of delicacy green.
