THE PENDULUM SWINGS

NEWS from the London conference has run the scale from the most optimistic to the most pessimistic. Of late we have been receiving pessimistic reports. Then the tenor of the stories changed, and there seems to be a chance that something may be done, after all. Something MAY be done.

It has always been thus. Conferences start with a flourish, and in the exchange of statements the best foot of all concerned is put forward. There are unavoidable frills.

As the period of fencing passes, the time inevitably comes when the diplomats reach that stage which the common man knows as "talking turkey," or "getting down to brass tacks." The going there is not so smooth. Diversions develop. Backs are bowed. National interests and national prides become involved.

The news correspondents can not do a lot of writing of the "turkey" sort at such affairs. They are compelled to use in some degree the language of diplomacy, and the language of diplomacy, particularly of Old World diplomacy, still has as one of its chief functions the hiding of the real meaning intended. Bad news is nearly always more striking news than good news, and that may explain in some degree the prevalence of the pessimistic note.

From the little real information we

may gain from the news stories that come from the seat of conference, we may guess that the representatives of the governments involved have been doing a job of stiff bluffing. They went as far as they dared. Then they heard from the folks back home, and this news probably was conflicting, but a part of it, we may surmise urged

more action and less bluffing.

Maybe we are to have some concrete beneficial results out of the conference, after all. One advantage of diplomatic exchanges of themselves is that news about them does not carry casualty lists. Not so in the case of war. But most of war's casualties are the result of crooked, selfish methods of diplomats at their worst.

LACK OF BUTTER HURTS DENMARK

Vitamin A in Butter Proved Very Necessary to Health; Lack Is Cause of Eye Trouble

(Editor's Note.—This is the fourth and final part of a series of articles prepared for the Idaho Times by the University of Idaho Department of Dairy Husbandry.)

Denmark, one of the greatest butter-producing countries in the world, has, during the past year, attempted a somewhat unusual method of economizing by exporting the very maximum amount of butter. In the form of butter and other dairy products, Denmark automatically decreased the amount of butter available for use within the country itself.

As a result of the decreased consumption of butter in Denmark

products, many children contract the eye disease known as xerophthalmia, which almost universally leads to blindness unless cured. The situation became so serious that it received national recognition and a campaign for a greater use of economy. Butter is omitted from the diet, green vegetables and other foods costing considerable money are substituted for butter in sufficient quantities to take its place. Theoretically, the deficiency of a diet lacking in butter may be remedied by the use of animal fats, but studies of actual diets have shown that under such circumstances these other foods are being eaten in amounts omitted entirely.

Vitamin A is a preventative substance contained in butter which would be absent from the diet if it were omitted. Every child should be protected from blindness and in addition prevent a condition predisposing for respiratory infections.

Dr. Andy Hansen, a Danish physician, has found there is a close relationship between the absence of butter from the diet and the occurrence of respiratory infection.

Vitamin A can be obtained from

other sources than butterfat, but it is necessary that an individual have some knowledge of food values before he can determine that an adequate supply of vitamin A equal to that contained in butterfat is obtainable.

The situation became so serious that it received national recognition and a campaign for a greater use of economy. Butter is omitted from the diet, green vegetables and other foods costing considerable

money are substituted for butter in sufficient quantities to take its place. ACTION EXPECTED TO BRING RELIEF TO UNEMPLOYED



WASHINGTON, April 4.—Early congressional action to alleviate unemployment was forecast Thursday as a group of 40 unemployed laborers reported to the Senate committee on two of the three unemployment bills introduced by Senator Wagner, dem., N. Y.

The third measure, seeking to create a national unemployment agency, was held up and will be voted on later.

Rep. A. E. Buey of the national association of manufacturers, the largest employer of labor, said yesterday that "there is a great deal of work to be done."

"There is a brief bill which I am

introducing," he said. "It is intended to end earlier resistance for the measure, which appears to receive the unanimous support of Labor leaders and the Senate majority committee."

Rep. John W. Hausermann, chairman of the House Select Committee on Small Business, also forecast early action on the Wagner bill.

Hausermann's resolution was the exact business in the Senate that Thursday.

Legislative activities of the congressional national committee probably will be altered as Congress convenes in June to continue his work on the legislation.


