THE PENDULUM SWINGS

NEWS from the London conference has run the scale from the most optimistic to the most pessimistic. Of late we have been receiving pessimistic reports. Then the tenor of the stories changed, and there seems to be a chance that something may be done, after all. Something MAY be done. It has always been thus. Conferences start with a flourish, and in the exchange of statements the best foot of all concerned is put forward. There are unavoidable frills. As the period of fencing passes, the time inevitably comes when the diplomats reach that stage which the common man knows as "talking turkey" or "getting down to brass tacks." The going then is not so smooth. Dissensions develop. Backs are bowed. National interests and national prides become involved. The news correspondents can not do a lot of writing of the "turkey" sort at such affairs. They are compelled to use in some degree the language of diplomacy, and the language of diplomacy, particularly of Old World diplomacy, still has as one of its chief functions the hiding of the real meaning intended. Bad news is nearly always more striking news than good news, and that may explain in some degree the prevalence of the pessimistic note. From the little real information we

may gain from the news stories that come from the seat of conference, we may guess that the representatives of the governments involved have been doing a job of stiff bluffing. They went as far as they dared. Then they heard from the folks back home, and this news probably was conflicting, but a part of it, we may surmise urged more action and less bluffing.

Maybe we are to have some concrete beneficial results out of the conference, after all. One advantage of diplomatic exchanges of themselves is that news about them does not carry casualty lists, Not so in the case of war. But most of war's casualties are the result of crooked, selfish methods of diplomats at their worst.

WE PLAY MORE

ONE of the significant changes to be noted in this part of Idaho is the greater interest that is displayed in play on the part of our adult population in these more recent days. Our country club recently purchased more land to add to its grounds which will permit the golf links to be re-arranged and made more desirable as a place of play.

Other communities have their golf courses in this part of Idaho and take an increasing interest in them. Tennis provides recreation for a host of the younger folk. In their seasons, fishing and hunting claim the enthusiastic attention of great numbers of men and women, young and old, who thrill to the beauties and the lure of the great out of doors.

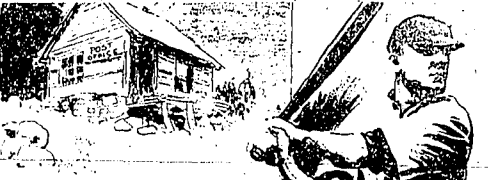
The time was when the playing of golf subjected those indulging in the sport to sly gibes and verbal thrusts, and in some minds the suspicion may still lurk that it is a waste of time. Thoughtful persons are coming more and more to the opposite point of view. To play intelligently may take time, but it does not waste time if the player is temperate.

The old conception that the surest way to achieve success was to grind at a job for 14 hours a day every week of the year with most of the holidays and a fair sprinkling of Sundays included in the schedule of labor has been discarded as false. For the majority of individuals it is false and leads to the rut, staleness and broken health.

The tendency toward more of play is full of sanity and deserves to be encouraged.

The extra front pages of the morning newspapers were devoted to Stalin's statement, which announced his recent declaration that the collectivization drive had been spread too much and had interfered with the harvest.

LACK OF BUTTER HURTS DENMARK

Vitamin A in Butter Proved Very Necessary to Health; Lack Is Cause of Eye Trouble

Editor's Note—This is the fourth and last of a series of articles prepared for the Idaho Times by the University of Idaho department of dairy husbandry.

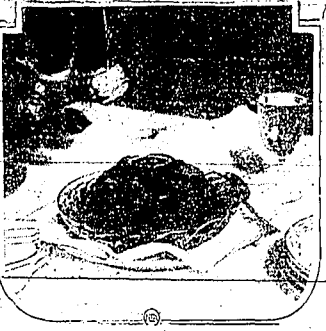
Denmark, one of the greatest butter-producing countries in the world for its size, some years ago attempted a somewhat radical method of economizing by exporting the very maximum amount of butter in the form of butterfat and other dairy products. This plan automatically decreased the amount of butterfat available for use within the country itself.

products, many children contracted the eye disease known as xerophthalmia, which also invariably leads to blindness unless cured. The situation became acute when it revealed that recognition and resulted in a campaign for a greater use of butterfat. With the present consumption of butterfat in the form of dairy products, the number of cases of xerophthalmia decreased. If the daily diet contains a sufficient amount of butterfat, xerophthalmia is unknown.

Vitamin A is a pre-essential substance contained in butterfat which when it is absent from the diet is responsible for xerophthalmia, and in addition prevents a condition predisposing for respiratory infections.

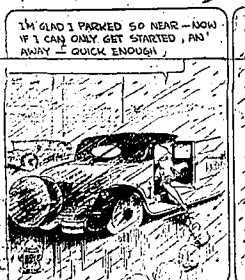
