They deserve to have their performances recognized. The dairy business in Idaho should have more men who can secure records such as their owner got from them.

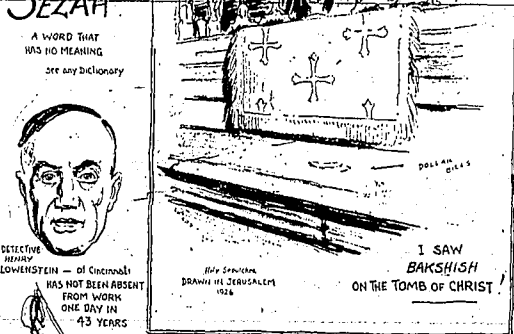

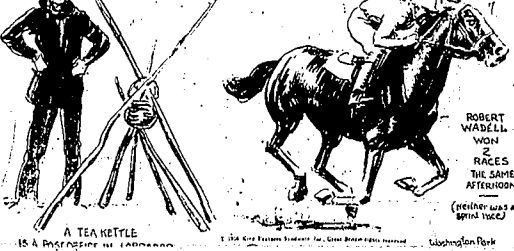
