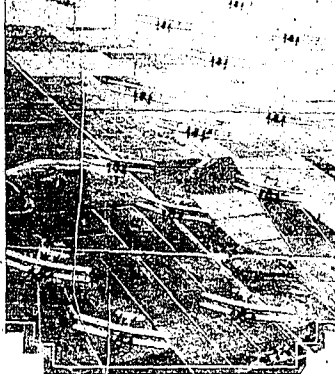

## BUSINESS COMING BACK TO NORMAL MAGNATE CLAIMS

Rudolph Guenther, Chairman of Financial Advertising Company, is Optimistic in Regard to Commercial State

EDITOR'S NOTE: Rudolph Guenther, Chairman of the Financial Advertising Company, is in a position to claim a broad view of the country's business progress through contact with clients which include the biggest bankers and lumbermen in the United States. In the following article, written exclusively for the United Press, Mr. Guenther states that a substantial revival is under way in general industry and that further financial markets will continue to disconcert further industrial improvement.

By RUDOLPH GUENTHER, Chairman of the Board, Rudolph Guenther-Russell, Law, Inc. Written for the United Press, NEW YORK, April 8, (UPI). Events of the past few months have created a foundation for a period of development in basic business lines which is expected to give us another sustained period of progress.

There can be no question about the fact, supported by industrial statistics, that the spring has brought with it a revival as well as a psychological improvement in business. As in nature, the security markets are the first to sense a rise or decline in the nation's business. This is because the nerves of the country's industrial life lead directly into the large financial centers.

In the market through which American finance has just passed, there was provided another emphatic reminder that the pendulum swings back and forth.

I believe that this country will continue to hold indefinitely the major part of the world's gold reserves and to evidence greater industrial activity than any other nation.

In spite of all the notoriety which a degree of unemployment has been accorded in recent weeks, this unemployment is far less serious and probably far smaller than we have been led to believe by certain outstanding speculating demonstrations, primarily in New York, where there is a large foreign population.

The fact that there was a 4 per cent increase in failures during March is not significant, especially when it is recalled that relatively few new industries survive and that a very small percentage of "inventors" ever come out on top.

We may look forward to further large financial markets which will continue to discount well into the future, requiring industrial and business activity.

## Thousands of New Homes Needed To House Population

CHICAGO, (Special)—Four thousand new homes a year are required to house the present population of the United States. It has been found, too, says the research bureau of the C. A. Dunham company, heating engineers, that at least two million new homes are required in order to replace and remodeling.

"These structures," it is stated, "must be overhauled and modernized and such effort is required for quite a part of the building program this year."

"When the weather opens up there will be a rush, particularly in the northern states, to get this work done. The wise home-owner will proceed at once, while labor and materials are easy to obtain."

"Materialization of old homes in many cases extends from roof to basement. A definite return in savings deposits has been noted by banks—home-owners show. The increase has been quite persistent since the turn of the year, and reports the Bureau closely approach the normal rate of growth."

## SCIENCE MAKES DISCOVERIES OF GREAT INTEREST

### Non-Fattening Sugar Is Made From Waste of Cotton Seed Hull Bran, A Fact of Value to 'Plump' Individuals

ATLANTA, April 8. (AP)—Application of the science of chemistry to the problems of the human race, in scores of fascinating ways, and with definite promise of a better world, were the 75th annual convention of the American Chemical Society here, continuing distinctly out of the ordinary.

More than 1,000 practicing and research chemists, were here to advance, discuss, and demonstrate the latest achievements of their science. Out of scores of papers, several new facts came to the surface and commanded attention of the lay mind.

Definite meaning, hitherto with a hope for a struggling world, was given to such otherwise meaningless terms as "syringe," "hydrochloric acid," "sulfuric acid," "bromine," "vitamin G," and scores of other chemical tags that sound high and really mean useful.

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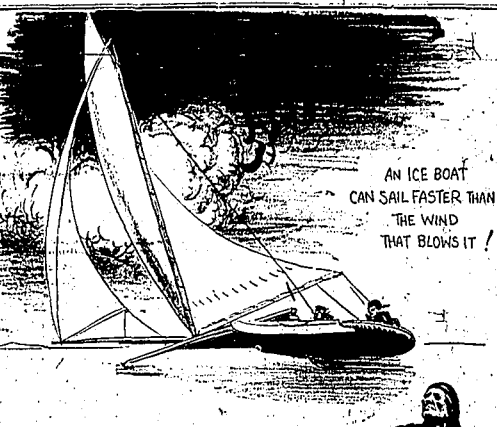
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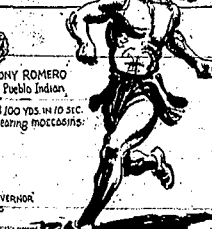
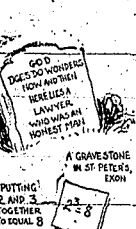
