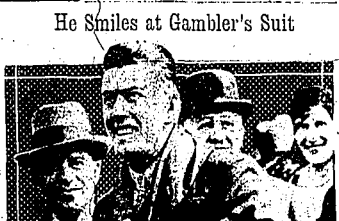

There is, however, a slight difference in the British Isles. The British have replaced trench warfare, the rifle has given way to the golf club, and the historical battle has been replaced by the golf course.

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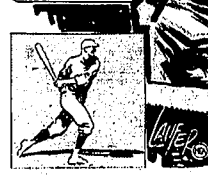

SCHOOLS WILL ELECT TRUSTEES

Common School Districts of County to Hold Annual Meetings Saturday Afternoon

Electors of all common school districts in Twin Falls county will go to the polls next Saturday, April 13, to elect district trustees for the coming year and to conduct the annual school district meetings. Most of the school districts will elect but one trustee for a three-year term. In some cases where trustees have moved away a trustee will be elected to fill an unexpired term. For this reason, the Black Creek and Springdale districts must elect two trustees and others may do the same.

The number of months that the new school term will be held is not to be decided at the annual meeting, unless Mrs. Rose J. Wilson, county superintendent of schools, by law the district are required to conduct school for not less than seven months while this month is the closing one here.

Nominations for trustees close this evening, the day before the day of election. The polls will open at 1 o'clock in the afternoon of April 13 and will be closed as long as necessary. A majority vote rules in the voting.
