



# RAIN AND COLD INTERFERE WITH BASEBALL GAMES

Many Postponements Necessary Due to Adverse Weather; Pat Malone in Plus Form and Cubs Hand Defeat to Cards

The major league baseball season today moved into its second league, with all of the American, National and Eastern National league clubs changing opponents. After the second week of play which opened the season, the road will move to their home stadiums for their inaugurations, April 22.

Heat and cold weather kept eight of the 16 major league teams idle yesterday and raised anew the question of whether club owners would be forcing the season by starting their schedules early in April.

Of the 25 games scheduled to date only 14 have been played. The opening series at St. Louis and Cincinnati are the only ones which started on short by bad weather—yesterday's game at St. Louis was halted by rain in the seventh, Cleveland's Indians and the Chicago White Sox played the twelve-inning American league opener yesterday, the Sox winning 8 to 7. Platter's double in the tenth scored the winning run for the White Sox while the Indians were in the lead.

St. Louis again led the Detroit-St. Louis game in the sixth inning with the Tigers leading 6 to 1. Detroit allowed the Bronx Braves to hit three runs.

Heat rained the New York Yankees an opportunity to even their series with the Philadelphia Athletics and the New Yorks were rained out for three games in two days against the Red Sox. The Red Sox and Washington also were rained out in Philadelphia where they will meet the Athletics today.

Chicago's Cubs assured themselves of at least an even break in their 4-game series with the St. Louis Cardinals, taking yesterday's seven-inning contest, 7 to 0. Pat Malone hit the Cards to three in the fifth. Larry French held the Cincinnati Reds to two hits and the Pittsburgh Pirates won their second game of three starts, 7 to 1.

Called Press Service Editor: NEW YORK, April 18 (UP)—The last few days have witnessed an extraordinary drop in the price for beef as far as the cattle market is concerned.

Primo Carnera, hostess of the present crop of cutmeats for the public's cash is under somewhat belated suspicion on the fat end of the current cutmeat craze. Carnera, who is taller, not wears smaller shoes, cannot get a fight, and others among the half-dozen names at a single sitting are joining the ranks of the unemployed.

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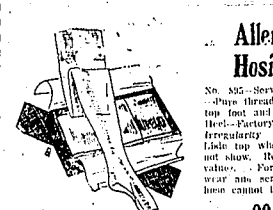

## SETTLERS LOSE BRIDGE APPEAL

Appeal of Misses Settlers, who are members of the Starvation and Relief fund, to abandon the bridge over the Snake river, was denied by Judge W. A. 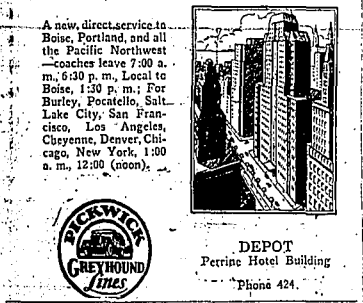

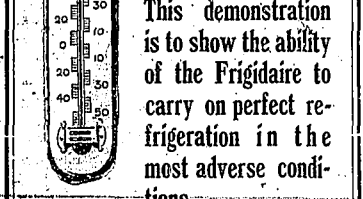
