Charley Root Holds Brooklyn and Mats Pounded Out 1 Victory; Philadelphia Team Increases Lead

By UNITED PRESS The Philadelphia Athletics and Chicago Cubs, two prominent winners and favorites in the 1936 season, topped the major-league today.

The Cubs gained the National League lead Sunday by taking the third straight game from Brooklyn. Charley Root held the Phillies to one hit, winning his 10th victory of the season. The Cubs have won 21 out of their last 26 games.

The Athletics increased their lead in the American league by winning by a margin of 10-1, while Washington had its 10th victory of the season.

The Boston Red Sox held seventh place in the American league by winning the first game from the last place Cleveland Indians, 10-4, although losing the second, 2-1, when Ted Lyons hung up his 11th victory of the season.

Yesterday's hero: Charley Root, New York Yankees' pitcher, who won his sixth straight game since he joined the club by blanking Cleveland for the last three innings and securing the winning run on a sacrifice fly. The score was 7-0.

POLITICAL ANNOUNCEMENTS THE Idaho Daily Statesman is editorializing on the candidacy of Asher B. Wilson for governor.

Continuing, The Statesman says, satirically, we trust: Sometimes it seems as if Democratic candidates are so obsessed with home and country, the grand old flag, the constitution and the importance of getting office that they haven't any time to spare for problems of less glitter but more importance.

Only Democrats have such "bahal" thoughts as wanting to seek office in the opinion of "The News-paper That is Part of Life in Idaho", and the idea of a candidate not having something "more important" than the "glitter" of officialdom is positively ridiculous!

All of which is introductory to what "The Statesman" attempts to make a serious estimate of the Wilson platform by saying "nevertheless, it is a platform, and as such is entitled to respectful attention from any fair man."

But when the Statesman attempts to get serious with the Wilson proposals, it is about as "respectful" and "fair" as it is laughable concerning announcements and platforms in general.

It says Wilson's idea of a non-partisan judiciary is all right, but it has a better plan of its own. Meanwhile, it intends to support those who think the present system is good enough.

Regarding Wilson's proposal to take the highway department out of the hands of one man and put in the care of three of the constitutionally elected state officials, the Boise paper thinks it would burden three men down too much. However, it admits that at present the department's head is directly responsible to but one man, the governor, who bears the burden of what three would under the Wilson plan.

But the Statesman's sneering argument against changing the present highway management will evoke smiles in the light of the present administration of the department. That newspaper boldly contrasts the Wilson proposal with the present one, which it insists is superior, for it is a

highway policy mapped out along the lines of the engineering mind, worked out with attention to engineering needs and in stern disregard of political pressure!

Which is news to some. The Statesman dismisses Wilson's plea for economy, elimination of surplus employes and abolishment of useless boards and commissions with a mere snap of the editorial finger. "until the gentlemen from Twin Falls is more specific... judgment of this plank will have to be suspended."

One plank, the proposal to enact legislation prohibiting members of the legislature from holding positions of trust and profit under the executive department "seems like a wise and wholesome regulation" to the Statesman, but instead of giving credit to the candidate who espouses it, the paper would rob him of the advantage by suggesting point blank that "the plank is one that other candidates might adopt without harm."

So much for that. The facts are, the Wilson pronouncement will have the effect of centering attention on what is and what is not needed in Idaho and will go a long way in developing interest in what otherwise is to date a campaign singularly devoid of public interest. And the Wilson platform remains unscathed as the result of The Statesman's "respectful attention."

Once upon a time there was a newspaper reporter who covered an endurance flight and never once wrote in his story "droned" or "zoomed."

This is the final week for the filing of nominations for the primary election August 5. All those politically minded better get their hats in the ring this week. This is going to be a great political campaign and one that will have more than usual interest.
