U. S. DEPRESSION SEEN IN GERMANY

BERLIN, July 3 (UPI)—Germany probably will be the first country to recover from the present world economic depression, in the opinion of leading German political and financial authorities, according to a report published in the United States today.

The report revealed a remarkable change in the German stock market crash and the acute business depression in the United States would have an immediate and substantial effect on Germany, it ultimately would prove beneficial since it would lead to increased purchases of German exports to the United States and South America.

The case here which has convinced United States and German financial industry and consumers that the last decade has been a slump, the German stock and commodity markets to flourish in a parallel with the United States, and the present slump has been similarly reflected here.

Moreover, the depression in the United States has affected Germany, which has suffered because it has brought a decline in tourist trade.

Lightning Test Crew in Field to Gather Data

SCHENECTADY, N. Y. (UPI)—While thousands of summer tourists gaze wonder-struck at a thunder-bolt parties of nature which are the middle-west, they are watching and waiting for them to provide lightning, they will make an attempt to study their effects.

One of these crews already in the field in Michigan at a spot where they believe lightning is most likely to strike, will cover a 60 mile stretch of a high voltage feed wire. Another party will be set up on a similar line at Lakeview Park and Center Ojibwa on another feed wire where lightning seems to have an affinity for striking.

The two groups have been sent by the Federal research department of General Electric at Pittsfield, Mass. E. J. Wade, who worked with Dr. W. D. Coolidge, who made the first artificial lightning, leads the Michigan group, and J. L. Borden, a student in the high voltage laboratory, is in temporary charge of the Ohio party.

Each of the parties is equipped with an impulse generator which will produce from 100,000 to 1,000,000 volts in one flash of light. All wires along these bolts were started immediately and their actions recorded on a delicate instrument which is recording many of cathode ray oscillograph. The oscillograph is the means by which a permanent record is made on photographic film of the passage of lightning bolts, either real or man-made. Oscillographs have been mounted on the trucks and may be run in the presence of a gathering storm in a wink.

The reason for these experiments, it is explained, is to determine the conditions by which lightning is properly protected by lightning arresters, and property which is destroyed by lightning is to be protected. It is possible, from the bolts from the skies.
