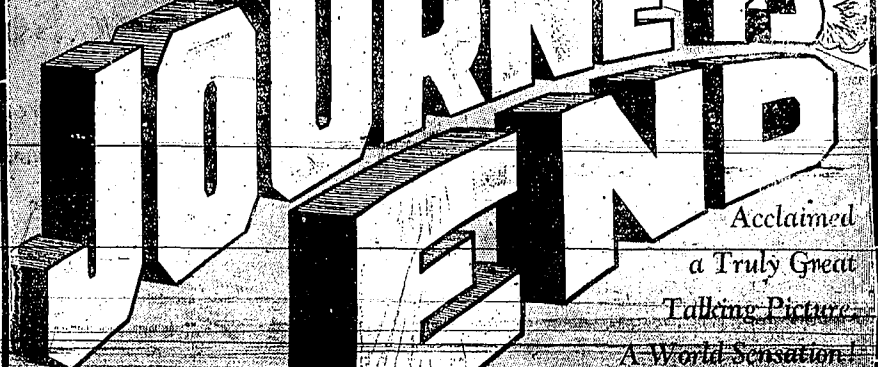

CARGOES OF HOBOES

We often hear of that beggar who lives a (Dr. Jekyll and Mr. Hyde existence, plying his trade on the street corners by day and maintaining a luxurious automobile and apartment by night; or the reputed wealth of the pencil seller; and of the hoarded money of erstwhile human derelicts.

Here is a story from Minidoka, as told in the Minidoka County News of Rupert that partially attests to what many of us have suspected, that the man who asks us for a quarter to get breakfast, may have more coin of the realm than ourselves. Says the Rupert account:

Business at the local ticket office of the Oregon Short Line at Minidoka was rushing Friday afternoon, a demand for railroad transportation springing into being almost without warning and stimulated to patronize the popular rail route, by Deputy Sheriff Bob Walton and a special O. S. L. man, no less than 75 transient travelers obtained railway tickets to their destinations, boarded east and west bound passenger trains that afternoon out of Minidoka.

These hobo tourists, were taken off the east and west freight trains and lined up, almost invariably declared they were broke, Deputy Walton said Saturday, but when led to understand they had their choice of paying transportation or being turned in, all but seven dug up funds from various recesses in their clothing to procure tickets to wherever they wished to go. The farthest point for which a ticket was purchased was Nampa. The seven penniless persons were permitted to walk out.

One of these nomads of the freight train, claiming to be broke, when pressed to the limit unsheathed a roll of bills carefully wrapped in a small shawl and tucked underneath his shirt and the bill of his overalls which, according to Deputy Walton, amounted to \$200, mostly in ten dollar denominations.

The old man, about 60 years of age, had been sleeping on the floor of a box car with a gang of unknown friends, huddling exactly 14, the deputy sheriff said.

The instance was mentioned of a young husky fellow who was hauled off a freight train and after remonstrating with the officer, declaring he had no funds, thought better of it and leisurely reached down to his shoe, carefully untied the lacing and produced a ten dollar bill. As he replaced the shoe, other bills were visible.

This reveals that some men have more money than they are credited with having, which fact makes it impossible to state what is perhaps more often true than many men are credited with having more money than they actually have. Which of these two types is in the sadder plight, is difficult to determine.

MEMORIAL BUILDING

SPLENDID encouragement is being given the efforts of the American Legion to erect a fitting Memorial building in this community, perpetuating as it will the spirit of sacrifice and devotion made by this section in the war more than a decade ago. But a comparatively small amount of funds need be raised to complete the financing of the structure, proposed to be built here this year. The foundation of this goal has already been long often mentioned and put off awaiting a better time in which to collect the funds; it might be put off still further, but it is the consensus that the raising of about \$2500 additional funds can not be needed to be longer deferred.

The public is being asked to make the solicitation work as little burdensome as possible by preparing to contribute to the fund, if this has not already been done; to lend encouragement to the plan of erecting this building; to urge others to give; and to continue in manifesting its admiration for those who served and sacrificed.

The goal is to build the building this year. It can and will be done with everyone joining willingly in the movement.

Kansas City instantly got busy to square the account. First, it raised a fund to build a home and provide an income for the officer's bereaved family. Then, it went after the bandits. It caught them and three of them are to be hanged on one scaffold late this month.

Whatever you may think of capital punishment, here is one case where it seems amply justified. Men who kill a policeman while they are committing a crime have mighty small claim for consideration. Kansas City seems to have done an excellent job of wiping this business off the books.

What Others Say

GET DOWN TO BUSINESS

What the wheat industry needs is a nationwide marketing plan on a basis of "ship" the surplus to the best price and not the highest price for wheat sold in the domestic market. That will call for an equalization program so that the wheat-growers, who sell mainly for export, will be safeguarded. Under the terms of the marketing act, the United States customs service provided the farm board officials look the facts in the face and act in accord with the requirements of the situation.

Could we have such a set up the grower who must sell abroad is supposed to gain. He is in a worse situation than the foreign grower for the foreign grower sells in the same market but has the advantage of lower production and lower living costs. The marketing of American standards requires that our growers be on an equal footing. Yet they are not the only ones affected. The whole agricultural situation is involved when the wheat business is out of the way and that jeopardizes national prosperity.

It would be appropriate for men like Mr. Legez and Mr. Hyde to stop their lecturing and get down to business with reference to marketing. They have it in their power to render a tremendous service not only to wheatgrowers but to the entire north and to the Hoover administration. If they fail to function and rely instead on fatuous advice they make a mockery of the marketing act impossible and produce a situation that endangers the president's popularity.

When Secretary Hyde tries to place responsibility for the surplus problem upon the shoulders of the farmer he is about wrong. Responsibility rests upon the government and its failure to market the act was an admission to that effect. It is possible under the marketing act to work the problem out and it is time to get going.

The bones of many Indians have been unearthed by the shovels of avid treasure seekers in these two caves, but no gold has been forthcoming.

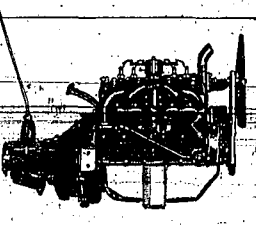

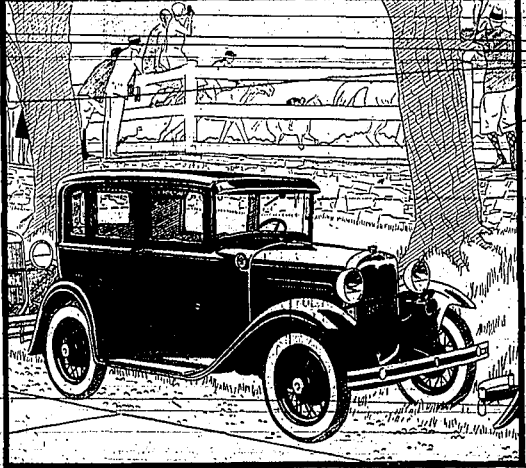

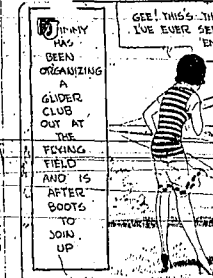

U. S. REFUSES TO ACCEPT 'DEATH' OF RUM SUSPECT

Identification of Body Recently Falls to Release Bond Offered by Defendant, Case Creates Great Stir.

By GEORGE E. SCHUPP, United Press Staff Correspondent. TWIN FALLS, July 9.—Still doubting that the body of a man found bound with balling wire and floating on the Sangamon river near here is that of Dominic Tarro, alleged bootlegger of their federal authorities have adopted a policy of watching awaiting confirmation from past experience that Tarro will show up eventually.

Tarro, indicted as the alleged agent for "big business" in the distribution of "rum" and other liquor among bootleggers, was arrested on a charge of conspiracy to "violate the national prohibition" in January. He is charged to have handled the distribution of products of two companies and his bonds were expected to aid the government in the trial of the case and nearly 50 individuals, all indicted on charges of conspiring to violate the dry law.

Soon after his arrest, Tarro was freed on bonds aggregating \$100,000, and disappeared. Last month a decomposed body was found floating near here. Government and Coast Guard's coroner's jury decided the body was that of Dominic Tarro, a friend and relative identified it as such. The relatives, however, was kidnapped by enemies and thrown into the river alive.

The government's refusal to accept the identification was disclosed when it refused to agree to a motion to set aside a court order restoring Tarro's bond of \$100,000.

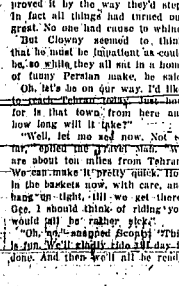
It is contended by United States District Attorney Walter M. Provine that Tarro is alive and will turn up eventually. Government attorneys insist that the identification that he went into hiding to escape threats of being "given a ride." Provine has had experience with fugitives.
