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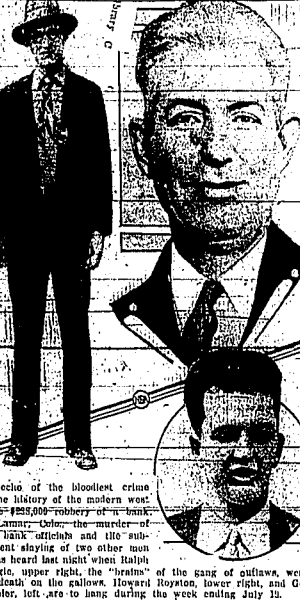

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SENATORS STILL LEAD MACKS BY SMALL MARGIN

Washington Holds Edge, Defeating Boston; Philadelphia Also Wins; Only Four Games Scheduled for Today

Competition in the major leagues today had little bearing on the pending races, with the three leading clubs in each league taking a holiday to prepare for Saturday's opener of inter-sectional play.

Only four games were scheduled today, the western American league clubs completed sectional competition with Chicago playing St. Louis and Cleveland meeting Detroit in the National League. St. Louis moved on to Pittsburgh and Philadelphia met at Philadelphia.

Yesterday American league contests made no change in the standings of the pennant contenders, both Washington and Philadelphia winning their games. Heavy hitting by Dale Gribble and effective pitching by Thump Hadley gave Washington a 7 to 0 victory over Boston and scattered the Senators to start their seven-inning with a 1-0 game advantage over Philadelphia.

George Barnshaw held New York to three hits and Philadelphia defeated the Yankees, 2 to 1. The Yanks combined two of their hits with two errors in the ninth to tie the game. The Cleveland Indians ran their winning streak to three games, defeating Detroit, 6 to 5. St. Louis came home behind in the Chicago White Sox in the sixth and again running out work, 7 to 5, when Gullie homered in the tenth.

The New York Giants got 26 hits to defeat Philadelphia, 19 to 8, in the only National League game. Nine hits, seven of them in succession, kept the Giants 10 runs in the third inning.

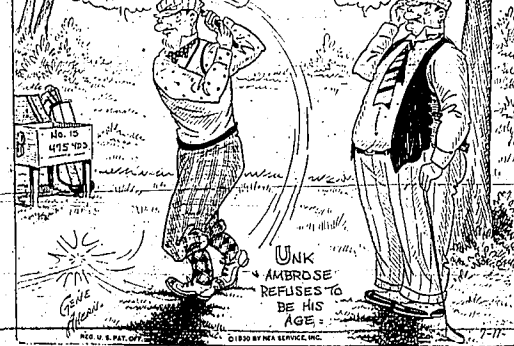

NOT TOO MANY PEOPLE The state of Nevada has gained approximately 11,000 inhabitants during the last 10 years, according to the census figures; and now has a total of 88,000 people within its borders.

Now the state's boosters may have excellent reasons for wanting to make this slogan come true; but one who is compelled to spend most of his time where there are a great many more people to the square-mile than Nevada ever dreamed of having may be pardoned, surely, for wondering if the state really knows when it is well off.

Having a numerous population is very likely a good thing; but there can be such a thing as having one that is altogether too numerous for any earthly use. There are worse things in the world than vast, empty plains and lonely, uninhabited mountains; teeming tenement districts, for instance, or down-at-the-heels suburban villages where jerry-built houses are all jammed against each other in maddening proximity.

The citizen of Nevada, in other words, is luckier than he perhaps realizes. That arid, western, state has a tremendous charm, and a good part of it is due to the fact that it is so empty. The motorist who struggles wearily with heavy traffic in metropolitan neighborhoods should drive through Nevada some day; Nevada, where it is half a day's drive between towns, where one can drive for hours, sometimes, without seeing a house or a tree or a fence, where the air is clear and the magnificent plains roll to infinite distances, empty and lonely, peaceful and quiet as nothing in an urban state ever is.

We have scriptural authority for the belief that it is not good for man to be alone; but, quite plainly, it is not good, either, for too crowded. And no one is ever too crowded in Nevada. There is room, there, for a man to get away from his fellows, which if he is the right sort of man, is a good thing for him.

Nevada's boosters are fine people, and we wish them well; but we hope this particular slogan of theirs never reaches fulfillment.

G. O. P. NEWSPAPERS SUGGEST HOOVER STEP-ASIDE

REPUBLICAN newspapers are almost as freely commenting nowadays on the likelihood of Herbert Hoover's being a one term president, as are their Democratic competitors.

Among the staunch supporters of Mr. Hoover during his campaign, and on his advent into the White House were the Chicago Tribune, the Kansas City Star, the Buffalo News, and the Detroit News; all conspicuous among the nation's important journals. It was something of a surprise when the Kansas City Star and the Buffalo News published articles dealing frankly with the President's unpopularity and suggesting that it was confined to no particular section of the country.

Now the Chicago Tribune prints an editorial to this effect: "Generally the President is in line to succeed himself without question, at least to the nomination and frequently without much doubt even as to his election." After this preface the Chicago Tribune continues: "Mr. Hoover's renomination and re-election are not so easily predictable and speculation is busy with other candidates. Mr. Hoover has tried to join with various forces which he cannot please and which will not stay with him, and it suggests that 'Dwight Morrow, winning the Republican nomination for the Senate in New Jersey, now rates a possibility or probability for the Republican nomination in 1932.'"

The Detroit News' chief political writer, J. G. Hayden, in a dispatch from Washington records that Mr. Morrow "has become presidential possibility of the first importance." Despite anything he himself may say or think," and adds that Mr. Hoover will soon find himself under pressure to accept one term and stand aside.

At least there is no third term problem in the offing.

ILLINOIS HAS A HALL OF FAME OF ITS WOMEN

Outstanding Daughters of the State Are Honored in Statuary; Many Famous Personages Represented There.

SPRINGFIELD, Ill. (UP)—Seven new Illinois heroines of whom miniature statues are to be placed under glass in the rooms of the Illinois State Historical Library here today like Helen Huntly Carter. Date was approved on 130 women. One hundred twenty-nine figures have been made while the others is in the process of being made.

These 130 heroic Illinois women, who represent eras of the state from the days of the Indian down through the Civil War to the present day, were selected for the honor as being the most heroic of their sex because of some mark of distinction during their life.

It may have been because of her "A" holding back a band of attacking Indians in the days of the "Covered Wagon" or it may have been for her accomplishment in the world of art.

Miss Leveridge, former governess of Illinois, who represented Illinois in this branch, Miss Ruthie Leveridge, a representative of the Illinois State Historical Library, former governess of Illinois.

Miss Leveridge was born in the governor's mansion while her grandfather, General Leveridge, was governor of Illinois from January, 1812, to 1817.

Her mother married a second time and was known as the Harbess Blin von Wieden. Their children were sent in Dresden, Germany, while in later life they lived mostly in Paris and London. Starting her professional career when she was 17 years of age, she was the first studio model in the work of the famous sculptor, August Rodin, and later with Rodin in Paris.

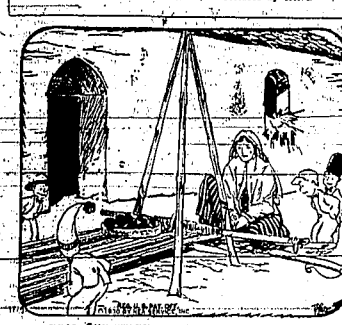
