JONES WINS GOLF TITLE BY GIVING SUPER EXHIBITION

Atlanta Wizard, After Trail-ing Horton-Smith, Turns in Fine Performance; Finishes in Lead at Interlachen.

MINNEAPOLIS, Minn., July 14. (UP)—Any last lingering doubts as to Bobby Jones' supremacy over any and all golf opponents, including one he had, has been dispelled by the Atlanta's victory at Interlachen.

When Bobby triumphed in the national open championship Saturday, he also proved just for the 16 hole test, exhibiting all the experts had feared could not be done. His aggregate was 237, the stroke better than that of Macdonald Smith, the veteran Scot, who was the only one of the blue-chips 'field to even threaten Jones' supremacy.

After Bobby won the British Amateur and the British Open, there were many who predicted that the greatest exhibition would prove too great for him. The competition in last week's championship was considered the most professional exhibition since Jones at Hoylake, with Walter Hagen, Horton Smith, Johnny Farrell and others among the professional contenders. It was expected to take Bob's number one, and they took his dust.

For the first two days, a pro and two opened out in front of Bobby. Then came those with a scattering round of 65, four under par, a new record for Interlachen and a heart breaker for the competition.

Except for Macdonald Smith, the Scot who stood for the opening hole, the others followed in the face of that brilliant round, Jones' career in it was despite his lead-down which cost him a two day final round.

Bobby now has won two national championships, four American amateurs, four American Opens, three British open and one American amateur. Four American championships which now in the past week approach and which will be the first time that Bobby Jones, the new Bobby Jones, is born in the ancient and royal lineage.

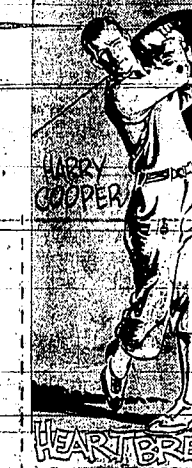

There were 4739 marriages performed in Idaho during the year of 1932, as compared with 4526 in 1931, or an increase of 143 or 3.1 per cent, according to the United States department of commerce. In 1931 there were 5310 marriages performed. There were 1039 on Sunday afternoon, four Colorado divorces granted in Idaho last year, which are about equal to the number granted in any other state. There was an increase of four, or 1.04 per cent, in 1931 city council, stated in its report. There had been 237 divorces in Idaho. There were 25 marriages in 1928, which is the lowest number in 1928. For 24 marriages in 1929, 23 in 1930, 23 in 1931, 23 in 1932. There were 63 divorces in this county last year compared to 61 in 1931. There were 100 divorces in this county during the past two years.

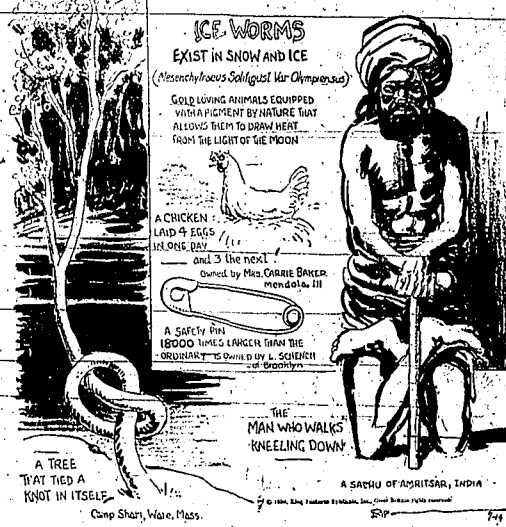

MAN-AND-HIS-FATE

A GENERATION that grew up with Sherlock Holmes as its favorite miracle worker cannot look on the death of Conan Doyle as anything less than a personal loss. The number of human beings with really good imaginations is never large; Sir Arthur had one, and it brought enjoyment and a pleasant intellectual stimulation into the lives of millions of people.

Yet it was not solely as the creator of Sherlock Holmes that Conan Doyle is remembered. He had another distinction—a faith, bizarre but strong, which nevertheless sustained and helped him when he needed help very badly.

Indeed, now that he is dead it is precisely this queer faith of his that sticks in one's mind.

For Conan Doyle was that peculiar anomaly, a believer in an age of confirmed skepticism. One might debate the question of determinism, might suggest that men are no better than cunningly-made machines; this aged author could pin his life to the belief that the dead not only lived but could be talked to. He could see a heaven-sent reality beyond the flub-dribbery of table-tappings and dim-light seance parlors. He could look confidently at the grave as a portal and not as final resting place.

And this, now that he is gone, is what must stick in our minds. Whether you scoffed at his faith in spiritualism or respected it, there is no blinking this one fact—Conan Doyle, now, knows the truth about it.

It may be after all, that the proof of the pudding lies in the eating of it. The works that proceed from faith have been accepted, for ages, as proper testimonials; and for Conan Doyle, at least, the faith that was in him was something very real and very helpful.

Read the account of his death. There was no terror, no reluctance. He died peacefully; and just before he died he turned to his wife and said, "You are very wonderful."

Dupe or seer, this man at least had found a faith that made death easy. He found faith that sustained him in his old age, a faith he kept him from black despair when his son was killed in the trenches of France, a faith that enabled him to die better than most of us will be able to die.

You can think what you please about spiritualism as a faith. But for the man who created Sherlock Holmes, at least—it worked.

Field Crops to Be Larger in Idaho This Year Than Last

FRUIT-HARVESTS SMALLER, RECENT REPORT ASSERTS

Approximately a Million Bushels More Wheat Expected in Gem State, Potato, Acorn and Bean Plantings Increased

The 1930 production of most of the field crops grown in Idaho will be larger than in 1929, but fruit crops will be somewhat smaller, according to the government report of Julius T. Zerkson, statistician at Boise.

Wheat promises a crop of 25,243,000 bushels of which 2,250,000 are winter wheat and 14,445,000 are spring wheat. Last year 25,250,000 bushels were harvested, 14,400,000 winter and 10,850,000 bushels spring wheat.

Less acreage of both winter and spring wheat will be harvested, but higher yields are expected. The total last year because of excellent weather and soil moisture conditions prevailing up to July 1, through the average of the field crops in the northern counties are in excellent condition due to abundant precipitation during the winter and spring months. Crops in southern counties promise large yields, but dry land farms were in need of rain July 1, and crops are expected to be smaller.

Feed Grains

An increased acreage coupled with prospects for excellent yields indicates a total production of all feed grains of 36,388,000 bushels, a comparison with 37,701,000 in 1929. Production of the individual crops and their yields are approximately as follows: Corn, 2,880,000 bushels and 1,994,000 bushels; sorghum, 6,330,000 and 6,949,000 bushels; barley, 6,330,000 and 6,720,000 bushels; oats, 24,000 and 25,000 bushels.
