## HOOPER TO PROBE BUYING OF MEAT FOR ARMY, NAVY

Chief Executive Hoping Sec-  
vice Organizations Can Con-  
fide Purchases to Produce  
Made by U. S. Concerns

WASHINGTON, July 18 (UP)—The administration's another program to solve the problem of meat supply for the army and navy is to have the government purchase meat from American farmers and processors, instead of the foreign sources to which it has been accustomed.

President Hoover called an special joint board of the army and navy to investigate the matter today and to consider the possibility of having these two government agencies confine their food purchases to American products.

Buy Foreign Food  
As a prelude to the deliberations the charge was made yesterday that army and navy purchases are buying yearly \$600,000,000 worth of food from foreign sources, for use in the Philippines, Hawaii, China and Panama. Chief foreign purchasers are being made up of "Kaiser" meat, and Argentine beef. All three countries are competitors of American foreign meat trade.

Meanwhile, the administration's policy was revealed by Senator Caraway, Dem., Ark., who said the farmer's "pluff" which is caused by the new tariff act. The statement was made in a report with one from the labor department showing a 4% per cent decrease in the price of farm products.

## BILLINGS ASKS FOR REHEARING OF APPLICATION

## AUTHORITIES FIND SUICIDE EVIDENCE IN DEATH OF GIRL

Fay Darnell, 15, Believed to Have Killed Herself; Letter Written to Friend Furnishes Clue; Services Planned

PHILADELPHIA, July 18 (Special)—The girl from a 22 October revolver shot the life of 15-year-old Fay Darnell, her name here, about 9:30 on Wednesday night was fired by the girl herself, it was decided by Sheriff J. Forest Pratt and coroner J. E. Drake following a full investigation Thursday afternoon.

Fay had been left alone in the home Tuesday night. She had been reading and it was thought that she had become so depressed that she had committed suicide.

If you saw my name in the papers saying I have committed suicide, just say "Darnell will tell" and bring me some one of those letters from the papers.

## Eyewitness of Reporter's Murder Found, Discovery Cheers Chicago Officers

State's Attorney Swanson Says Solution of Writer's Death Obtained From Woman Who Saw Crime

CHICAGO, July 18 (UP)—State's Attorney John A. Swanson announced today that a solution of the murder of Alfred T. Lingle, Chicago crime reporter, has been obtained through an unnamed woman eye-witness.

Swanson said the woman saw the killer shoot Lingle, Swanson said. The experience caused the woman to suffer a nervous breakdown, and she is under the care of a physician, the state's attorney said.

Swanson's announcement was made with evident jubilation at the possibilities opened by the discovery of the witness.

"We regard her as the 'key' to the Lingle murder," Swanson said. "It is a relief to have this case solved."

Swanson said he would not say whether the slayer had been identified.

## TYPHOON STRIKES JAPAN, BLOTTING OUT MANY LIVES

Ten Persons Killed at Nagasaki and Large District Laid Waste; Crops, Buildings Are Ruined in Korea

NAGASAKI, Japan, July 18 (UP)—A typhoon struck Nagasaki today, killing ten persons and laying waste large stretches of land.

Ten buildings were demolished and many more were badly damaged. The famous Hachiman shrine, built in 1600, collapsed after the first onslaught of the typhoon.

For many years the shrine has been a religious center and the scene of Japanese pilgrimages.

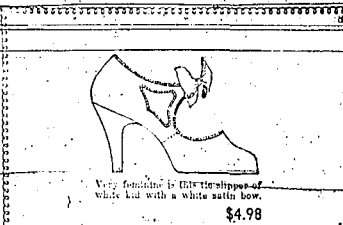

LOOKING AT THE TARIFF NOW that the new tariff law, designated to bring protection to the American workingman and farmer, has finally gone into effect, it might pay to look about and see if the times afford any signs concerning the way it is going to work.

Here and there one can find little incidents that seem significant. One of them took place in Akron the other day.

The B. F. Goodrich Co., one of the nation's largest tire manufacturers, is preparing to transfer bodily the bulk of its tire and footwear export business to Kitchener, Ont.

This is being done in order to serve trade in the British dominions better. The dominions are retaliating to our new tariff law by putting up tariff walls of their own. Exports from Canada will be able to get in where exports from the United States cannot.

Goodrich accordingly, is simply looking ahead and taking the obvious, common sense step to meet this new situation. The city of Kitchener gains a nice new industry, Akron loses, and sundry American wage earners in Akron are going to find their jobs moved out from under them.

A man of a nasty, critical turn of mind might conceivably, inquire just how far the new law has protected these Akron rubber workers.

At the same time, the cables bring significant news from overseas.

Stanley Baldwin, leader of England's conservative party, has agreed to Lord Beaverbrook's campaign for a British empire tariff wall, and it is probable that the next British election will be fought on this issue. The conservatives plan to tear down the trade barriers between England and the dominions and build up barriers against the rest of the world—after which the barriers would be lowered for such nations as would lower their own tariff walls.

Great Britain now buys more than \$800,000,000 worth of American goods a year—chiefly foodstuffs. This trade, if the Beaverbrook plan goes over, will be largely transferred to the dominions. Cables state that the new American tariff law is giving the Beaverbrook campaign a great impetus.

On a hypothetical critic, once more, might ask just how this is going to help the American farmer, for whom—theoretically—the tariff was passed.

At the same time, representatives of 14 European nations have met in Paris to consider ways and means of combating the American tariff. They are looking forward to an economic coalition that would do for all of Europe what the Beaverbrook plan would do for the British empire—distribute to other producers the huge orders that are being placed with America.

These signs of the times are just a shade disturbing. Can it be possible that our new G. O. P. tariff law is going to backfire on us?

IDOLS AND KISSES THIS episode of young Miss Amy Johnson and the man she slapped provokes certain meditations about the difference between male idols and female idols.

Miss Johnson, as you know, is the toast of the British empire nowadays because she flew, alone, in a second-hand plane, from London to Australia. She was feted and dined on a lavish scale and the other day, in Australia, an ardent young man stepped up to her automobile and kissed her.

Amy, leaving no time, she hauled off and binned him one, leaving him with a bloody nose and sincere conviction that a famous young aviator is not to be kissed with impunity. Which, of course, is quite all right.

Lindbergh was pursued by the kisses of many fair admirers and while he ducked most of them, he could never use his fists to convince any of the girls that he preferred to stay unloved. That privilege is reserved for the feminine element. Any famous young man, apparently, must grin and bear it. It is only the girl who can swing a lusty right to stave off an unwanted kiss.

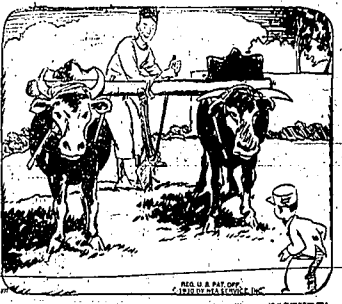
This is as cheap a trick as American political history records. There are, doubtless, reasons in some

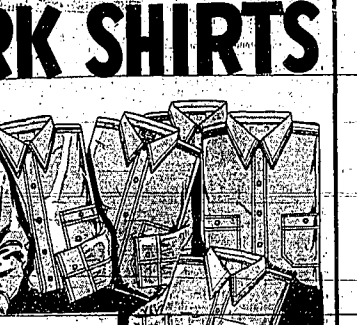

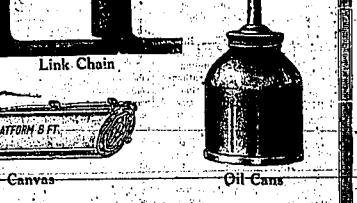

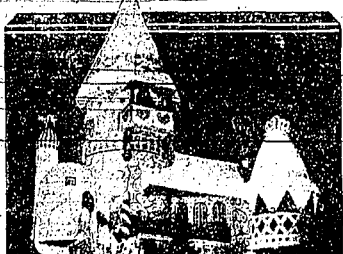
