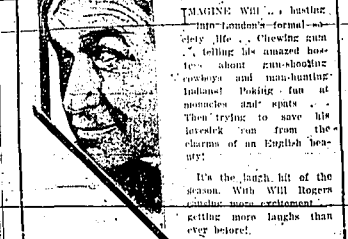
## Man at Jerome In Legal Toils

**CAN A CITY BE TOO BIG?**  
**AMBITIOUS** cities like Chicago, Detroit, and Los Angeles, which at times have fondly dipped into the future and pictured themselves, respectively, as the metropolis of America, must have got a distinct shock out of the census figures for New York.

New York, it develops, has been going ahead just as fast as these other towns. Its population now is just under 7,000,000. Its "metropolitan district" contains no less than 11,000,000 people—more than there are in the next seven largest cities in America put together.

So, while Chicago continues to grow, and Detroit comes forward to step on the heels of Philadelphia, and Los Angeles shoots past half a dozen cities and lands fifth place, New York remains its pre-eminence. It is still our metropolis, and it probably will hold that distinction for a long time.

For those of us who do not live in any of these cities, all of this is merely a matter of academic interest. Nevertheless, it is about time that we put our biggest cities under the microscope to see just what they signify. Does their growth, in itself, make for a better life for their inhabitants? Does the New Yorker, who has 6,000,000 near-neighbors, have a better time than the man from Akron who has 250,000? Is it possible for a city to become too big? It would take a great deal of study and a great many volumes of facts to answer these questions properly. Meanwhile, however, there are surface indications that are significant.

Traffic congestion in New York is, today, almost unendurable. In Chicago the situation is only slightly less bad. In cities like Detroit, Los Angeles and Cleveland it is more than bad enough.

Living conditions, for enormous numbers of the inhabitants of these big cities, are unappealing. If anything is certain it is that the lawless gangs of our great cities are bred by the congested, unhealthy circumstances under which thousands of children grow to manhood.

Politically these super-cities are grotesquely unwieldy. The average New Yorker is completely at the mercy of Tammany Hall. The average Chicagoan is at the mercy of an even less admirable machine. In each case the sheer size of the city gives ample opportunity to maintain its grip on government.

These are only a few instances of what big population figures mean. It is almost time for the American people to look into the matter thoroughly and find out if the city—whose population is almost stationary is not, perhaps, better off than the one whose population is doubling every two decades.

There can be such a thing as a city that is not too large for any earthly use. Now and then one can wonder if New York and Chicago, at least have not reached that point.

**BRUNDIDGE'S GOOD WORK**  
**THIS** man Harry T. Brundidge, reporter for the St. Louis Star, seems to be one of the country's most useful citizens just now.

It was Brundidge who revealed that Lingle was not the only grafting reporter in Chicago. Brundidge who focused attention on the unsavory Chicago lad that lay back of the killing, Brundidge—as much as any one man—who compelled Chicago to realize that Lingle's murder was merely a symptom of a malignant underlying disease.

All in all, the man has done a pretty fine job of work. If the record of Lingle has brought shame to the hearts of honest newspapermen everywhere, Brundidge's work makes it possible for them to take a new pride in their profession.

A good reporter, in short, is an extremely valuable citizen.

**HARD TO GET EXCITED**  
**SOMEHOW** it is a bit hard to get excited about this 156-year-old Turk who is now visiting this country.

In the first place, one may be pardoned for being a trifle skeptical about those 156 years of his. A doctor recently pointed out that extreme old-age records are generally claimed by illiterate peasants—by people, that is, who would not have any written records to substantiate their claims.

In the second place, one is inclined to ask, "Well, what of it?" The gentleman may have lived every minute of his 156 years; but why get excited about it? It is safe to assume that in all his century and a half of life he has not done a tenth as much genuine living as an intense, active young American like—for example—Charles A. Lindbergh.

During the last several years, one hardly ever hears of the Greek potato. Why? Because the growers here are greedy. They paid attention to grade. They shipped inferior potatoes; instead of improving their seed they became careless and careless in packing with the result that the reputation they had gained was disappearing.

Today the Idaho potato has an enviable reputation. It is a quality product. This reputation can be maintained only by close grading.

**VETERINARIANS OF 20 NATIONS WILL ASSEMBLE**

LONDON (UPI)—More than 200 delegates have enrolled for the International Veterinary Congress which will open here on August 14. The United States will be represented by 15 delegates and 12 by the other 18 nations remain of representation at the congress.

MACDONALD WILL TESTIFY BEFORE JUDGES TUESDAY

Blair, witness in Bomb Trial. Retire-Preparatory to Telling Reproduction Story of Bomb Explosion on the Coast.

SAN FRANCISCO, July 28. (UP)—John Macdonald, a feeble and apparently old man, voted 10-9 for next Tuesday's trial at which time he will tell the San Francisco Supreme Court his testimony defining the middle tier of Warren K. Billings was false.

All details of the reproduction made by Macdonald will be told Thursday. It was decided Thursday by the seven members of the court.

Macdonald, the justice, failed to be the first witness called in an appeal session during which the court will review an affidavit filed by Billings for a return from the state, which was filed since 1924 following conviction of conspiracy in the Macdonald case.

It was ruled by the judges that Macdonald's testimony will be heard on the afternoon of Tuesday, July 30, at 10 o'clock.

Macdonald, appearing voluntarily, by lawyer in custody of the state, was the first of his kind ever held in this state.

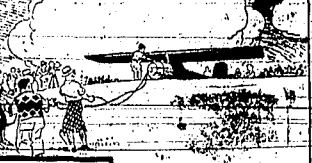

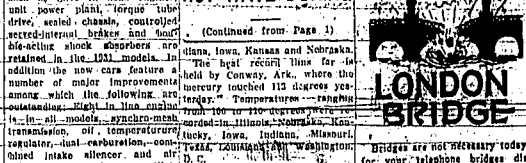
