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





That is one of the reasons for this trip. I want to get first-hand knowledge of actual conditions in my territory."

No drastic revision of the present allocation of the broadcast stations is contemplated by the commission, according to Mr. LaPoint. There may be minor changes from time to time, as occasion demands, but on the whole the present system is working out very satisfactorily, he believes. The commission is now engaged in a program of simultaneous broadcasting of chain programs by chain stations operating on the same wavelengths will probably be successful to some extent in creating interference, he said.

After conferring with officials of station KIQQ and visiting with Congressman Addison T. Smith, commissioner resumed his trip, which will eventually have carried him in broadcast centers in Wyoming, Montana, Idaho, Nevada, Arizona and New Mexico. From there he went to Reno, Nevada.



SCIENTIST GIVES HIS ANSWER TO EDISON QUESTION

NEW YORK, Aug. 2 (UP)—Dr. George H. Sherwood, director of the American Museum of Natural History, announced today in one of the most difficult of the questions of Thomas A. Edison's examination of the problem of the party lost in the desert.

The question given to the 49 boys yesterday assumed a party was lost to the desert with only enough food and water to allow three of its members to reach civilization. The boys were told they were head of the expedition and had to decide which three of the following they would save: a brilliant scientist, 60 years old; two half-breed kullies, 58 and 22 years old respectively; the scientist's wife, age 32; her son, aged six; the girl you are engaged to marry; your best friend; a young man of your own age; and "who has shown great promise in the field of science; your best friend."

Sherwood's answer was: "I would save the scientist, the kullies, the wife, the girl you are engaged to marry, and the young man of your own age. The scientist is the greatest civilization at all there, must be one guide selected for the trip. If two guides were equal, the younger man would be chosen because the greater stamina. Under such circumstances there is no doubt in my mind but that the younger would remain the best. There is little probability that the son could stand the hardship. He would be too poor a specimen of his mother's quality. The wife who is separated from him and it would not be advisable to separate them. I should not select the scientist of 60 since probably most of his work would have been achieved. I should select the young scientist not because he was my best friend but because of his promise in the scientific world and I should select the young girl whom I was engaged to marry."


