

# WISCONSIN HAS INCOME FROM RESEARCH DATA

Alumni Foundation Committee called Wisconsin's Accredited University of the State.

Madison, Wis. (AP)—Commonwealth of Wisconsin has received the profits to justify the title of an important book in the history of Wisconsin.

Secretary J. Russell, dean of the college of agriculture for 23 years, recently published a book on "Wisconsin's Research Data."

Management of the book, food legislation, with 1929 year, was published by Dr. Harry Steenbock, one of the jobs of the foundation.

Its whole program is designed to develop to a commercial basis the discoveries and inventions of faculty, alumni, or others who would their patents in the hands of the state. It is a grant of \$100,000 to the foundation, which are paid to the foundation. These royalties, in turn, are devoted to further research.

While the Steenbock, proceeds through his application for a patent, and other similar, permit the most generally known of the foundation's works, this group also contains a collection of essays and from the treatment of the discovery of Dr. F. "I believe that the next decade will develop facts on hormones in relation to life processes and in the treatment of disease, and the secretions of the ductless glands, that will be of the utmost importance in mankind," Dr. Russell said concerning one of these research matters now in the hands of his foundation.




