POLICE INCLINED TO CONNECT ZULA WITH LINGLE MURDERS

Chief Investigator, Rocho Belover Man Who Killed Lingle, Took Life of Backster.

CHICAGO, Aug. 4. (UP)—The murder of Alfred J. Lingle, Chicago Tribune reporter, and Jack Zula, north side gang chief, definitely were linked together today by police and other officials investigating both.

"Find the man who killed Lingle in a pedestrian subway eight weeks ago and you'll find one of the seven men who killed Zula in a hotel at Des Moines, last Friday," was the word given by Chief Investigator Paul Rocho of the state's attorney office.

Rocho went to Des Moines and Waikana, Wis., yesterday to ask Sheriff Phillips to assist in the investigation of the Zula slaying. Their discovery led, they said, to a belief Zula may have been on the spot "by a woman who 'double-crossed' him and told his rival gangster the ideal time to assassinate him."

They also attached importance to the finding near Des Moines that the chief investigator, Paul Rocho, of the state's attorney office.

Rocho said that the investigation of the Zula slaying, which was reported to be a solution of the whole Lingle-Zula tangle.

Zula, who was killed in a hotel at Des Moines, last Friday, was reported to be a member of the Lingle-Zula gang.

Among First Arrested

Zula was one of the first men arrested after the Lingle slaying. The word went out through the city that the man who had killed Lingle was the same man who had killed Zula.

The woman in the case was a mysterious one to whom Zula made numerous telephone calls while he was in Des Moines. Des Moines police, who were called to the hotel where Zula was killed, found a woman who had been living in the hotel for some time.

NEVADA YOUTHS FACE TRIAL FOR DOUBLE MURDER

Joseph E. Morlock Jr. and Kenneth Carter Confess to Killing Men Whom They Alleged Jumped Mining Claim.

PIOCHIE, Nev., Aug. 4. (UP)—Joseph A. Morlock Jr. and Kenneth Carter, two Nevada youths who believe the stern code of unwritten western law of 75 years ago should still apply, today went on trial charged with the murder of Herbert B. Hulse, last Dec. 23.

The youths are charged in separate indictments with the murder of Hulse and Joseph Morlock, Sr., slain near Fallon, Nev., on Jan. 10 last.

He had been bound, gagged and left by his slayer, the body was found underneath four sacks of cement.

Only Discovered

A few days later Morlock's body was found in Logan, N. M., and was sent through the mail with a 16-gauge shot gun.

Young Morlock and Carter were taken to their homes in Ohio and arrested. They denied written confessions admitting they killed the older men over a mining dispute.

They said they had been "jumped" by Hulse and Morlock, Sr., and that they had the right, under the unwritten law of the west, to kill them.

Admission of the two confessions was the cause of the trial. It was reported that before the slaying, would concentrate their efforts in barring the admissions of guilt.

ELECTION TUESDAY
TUESDAY is an important day in the election calendar of this county and this state. No qualified elector should minimize the importance of his going to the polls to vote in the primaries for on both the Democratic and Republican tickets there are contests important to the county itself as well as to the candidates themselves.

Primary elections are designed, of course, to give the people as a whole—the members of each party—the opportunity of selecting the candidates of their choice for the general elections in November. Whether or not this is a better method than the old convention method is a moot question, one that has divided parties and individuals for years. But regardless, the elections Tuesday should result in everyone voting who is registered, and the outcome should reveal the thoughtful decision of those participating in the event.

THOSE MIXED BABIES

MR. and Mrs. Bamberger and Mr. and Mrs. Watkins of Chicago wish that there was some way that parents could tell their own babies.

They can't do it. And all the king's horses and all the king's men aren't having one-half the fun in helping them solve this baby mixup that King Solomon had when he tried to divide one baby between two women.

Physicians, an ophthalmologist, an obstetrician, an anthropologist, a psychiatrist and some more scientists with names just as long have been in conclave with the two children, trying to decide. Even they can't agree.

You will recall that the mixup started when the Watkins family discovered a piece of adhesive tape bearing the name of Bamberger on the body of the baby whom they had brought home from the hospital. They agreed that the infant they had was a very nice child. Hadn't it almost been theirs? But they preferred to rear their own.

The Bambergers felt the same way about it. And the hospital thought that maybe the tapes had been mixed.

It really should be simple. There's a perfectly healthy, round, contented baby for each family. The two families could draw lots and probably be just as far ahead as they are now. Since the children can't tell their own names, and will speak the ones chosen for them, anyway, when they do, they can't help. Nobody would ever know the difference if the wrong lots were drawn. Nobody, not even the parents.

The child which was taken by the Bambergers seems to be claimed by each set of parents regardless of the diversified advice of the sages.

But both families can't have it. Somebody has to accept the other one, and there is sufficient proof that it is bone of the bone and flesh of the flesh of one or the other sets of parents.

If it were merely the care of the infant—seeing that it had the proper amount of spinach and orange juice and sleep and drank its milk at the regular hours—the problem wouldn't be so important.

But one or the other of the two babies may develop into a prodigy. He may even be president. And so long as there is an uncertainty of parentage, and a belief in heredity, the parents that did not get him would ponder if, perhaps, it wasn't their son who was bringing honor to another family.

Then, too, the children might grow to look like their parents and if they weren't in the right families there would be much disturbance if one father saw the other father walking along the street with a boy who was his own counterpart. A trade at that time might be surer but it would be embarrassing.

Nothing in life is so divinely close to a miracle as the birth of a little child, and the realization of its parents that there is something of themselves in this new life. Viewed in that light, the confused attempts to decide to whom the two babies belong assumes an air of tragedy. Each family has a right to its own child, and to the absolute, irrevocable proof that it fits its own.

Meantime, the world waits for a greater sage than Solomon to solve this mystery.

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WISCONSIN HAS INCOME FROM RESEARCH DATA

Alumni Foundation Committee called Discoveries Are Credited to University of Wisconsin State

MAKING RESULTS of research and discoveries the property of the state is the purpose of the Wisconsin Alumni Foundation, which is now in the process of being organized.

Harry L. Russell, dean of the college of agriculture, was recently elected to head the committee. The foundation is in charge of the work.

Management of the process of food research, with special regard to the production of vitamin, is being directed by Dr. Harry Steenblock, one of the jobs of the foundation.

Its whole program is threefold. The foundation promotes and develops to a commercial basis the discoveries and inventions of faculty, alumni, or others who are granted their patent rights. These royalties, in turn, are devoted to further research.

While the Steenblock, director through his application to "heat" food and other studies, permits is the most generally known of the foundation's work, this group also contains specialists of color and from the treatment of the disease, developed by Prof. E. H. Hart; the discovery of Dr. F. H. Haskins, relating to the pituitary gland and the role of hormones in reproduction; discovery of Dr. E. O. Wise, now of Akron, O., of use of acetone acid as a drug in treating women's condition of producing acetic acid originated by Dr. Trautman, now of Purdue University; and discovery of Dr. E. H. Ford and Prof. W. A. Peterson relating to fermentation.

"I believe that the next decade will develop facts on hormones in relation to life processes and in building up new and reliable methods of the secretion of the ductless glands, that will be of the utmost importance to mankind," Dr. Russell said concerning one of these research matters now in the hands of his foundation.

Dr. Russell pointed out that the foundation offers no financial aid, but is important to do great public service by giving financial assistance, but stressed the fact that the foundation will not compensate a student unless he has completed control of his life.

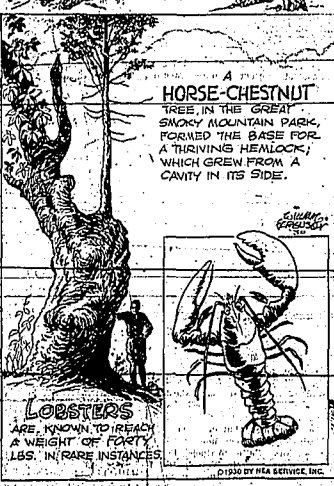

More Birds Than In '29 Reported

With the opening of the season in Twin Falls, and surrounding country less than a week away, reports indicate a slightly more plentiful condition of birds this year, although during the last few days they appear to have been leaving the valleys and lower slopes for the highlands, where they will be more noticeable in migration.

The season will open in Twin Falls, Idaho, on Sunday, Aug. 10, the bag limit is four birds per day, "bag" being defined as "one bird per day." No open season will prevail on eagles in the county this year. All of Twin Falls county will be except that part within the Shoshone national forest.

Many hunters are planning to go northward in search of birds, in hopes they will be more plentiful in that district.

REPORT REVEALS BUSINESS GROWTH

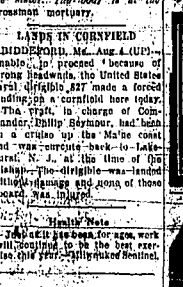

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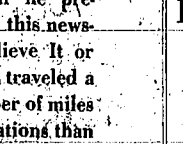
