PESHAWAR UNDER FIRE OF BLOODY FRONTIER TRIBES

Order Restored in Changanah Following Bandit Attack; Northern Troops Close Advance on Lughah

LONDON, Aug. 11. (UP)—An unusually serious move by warring tribesmen on the north-west frontier of India is seen here today in the attack on Peshawar.

The persistence of the tribes in continuing their attacks despite the heavy bombing of their air force planes and the attack of troops and the fact that British authorities were forced to withdraw reinforcements from Peshawar, indicated that the present movement is not an ordinary tribal insurrection.

PESHAWAR, Aug. 11 (UP)—Defending troops which have been repeatedly attacked by tribal forces in the past three days, have mustered today against the "potential" threat of an advance by the powerful forces of the notorious Huk of Turan.

Send Troops
Coincident with the tribal, British forces against Peshawar, the frontier authorities were forced to send troops to Nowshera, some 30 miles distant, to meet the possibility of an attack there.

BUTLER FORESEES A WET PLANK IN BOTH PLATFORMS

President of Columbia University, Long an Opponent of Prohibition, Considers a Showdown Near

NEW YORK, Aug. 11 (UP)—Dr. Nicholas Murray Butler, president of Columbia University, predicts the adoption of prohibition repeal plank by the Democratic and Republican New York state conventions.

The noted educator, who has long been an opponent of the 18th amendment, is expected to lead the "wet" fight in the public campaign, he estimates that from 60 to 70 per cent of the delegates at the gathering will favor repeal.

With the anticipated adoption of a similar resolution by the Democratic, Dr. Butler said, "I foresee a wet plank in both platforms."

Butler said he was not a member of the New York state campaign, but he has been a vocal supporter of the repeal.

"The wet" has now run in the campaign, the liquor and the opposing Dr. Butler said in a statement issued at his Southhampton, N. Y. home.

Floods, Pouring Out of Canyon, Have Destroyed Highway

SALT LAKE CITY, Aug. 11 (UP)—Finishing touches to what is now almost a routine job today, the rebuilding of the Salt Lake-Ogden highway following a flood, were completed today by state highway construction crews north of Salt Lake.

All of the debris and mud will not be cleared away until mid-week, highway officials said, but work today will greatly facilitate traffic. The biggest barrier on the Salt Lake-Ogden highway was between the city and South Ogden, but it was removed by a steam shovel today and Sunday traffic was able to move through the mud at a moderate pace. Three other obstructions between Ogden and Salt Lake were removed today.

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Trade Commission Brings Charge of Unfair Methods Against Coal Association

WASHINGTON, Aug. 11 (UP)—Charges of unfair methods of competition in interstate commerce in violation of the federal trade commission act were brought today by the federal trade commission against the Idaho Coal Dealers' Association, the Utah Coal Producers' Association, and the Retail Fuel Dealers' Association of Utah.

The commission issued a complaint charging the defendants with entering into a "conspiracy to restrain, regulate and suppress competition in the sale and distribution of coal to interstate commerce" by refusing to recognize other than their own members as retail coal dealers and by refusing to transport or sell coal to other than those members.

The commission also charged the three associations with entering into an agreement whereby their respective retailers would have "the exclusive business of selling coal to all domestic consumers, all retail coal dealers, municipalities, and schools where truck or wagon service is required and to the employees of industrial concerns."

The effect of these agreements, the commission declared, was to limit and allot the sale of coal to interstate commerce to the members of the three associations in restraint of trade.

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W. C. T. U. DENIES AN INCREASE IN LIQUOR PATIENTS

Dry Organization Says No Increase in Patients Since Prohibition

WASHINGTON, Aug. 11 (UP)—The Women's Christian Temperance Union, in a statement today, presented statistics to disprove the charge that there are more liquor patients since prohibition than before, which it said was the impression created by a recent report from the Keeley Institute of Dwight, Ill.

Pointing out that this report showed less than 50 patients now at the Institute, the statement, prepared by Mrs. Anna Marden Beyer, corresponding secretary, said that before prohibition there were 100 patients at the Keeley Institute.

The Keeley Institute now appears to be the only important liquor cure hospital on the American continent, she said.

The report, she said, was a survey of the liquor cure, which she explained, "We had the names of 148 which had been operating just prior to prohibition, and just prior to prohibition, we brought up the news that 105 of these had closed their doors."

PARDON APPEAL OF BILLINGS TO BE CONSIDERED

Supreme Court Will Reconvene Tuesday for Purpose Of Hearing Evidence In Notorious Bombing Outrage

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 11 (UP)—Members of the California Supreme Court will reconvene tomorrow for consideration of a pardon application filed by Warren K. Billings, convicted with Thomas Mooney of complicity in the Preparedness Day bombing, July 25, 1916.

The Tuesday session is expected to be one of the most sensational of the hearing. It will be a day for the defense with Edwin W. McKenzie, attorney for Billings, having men who conducted Billings and Mooney on the stand for cross examination.

Edward A. Canha and James F. Brennan, two former prosecutors who appeared against the pair in 1916 and 1917, testified last week that they believed the convictions were just. Canha added that Billings and Mooney should have been hanged.

SHANSHAI, China, Aug. 11 (UP)—The National government continued today to enforce extreme measures to protect Hankow after important Yangtze valley cities from Chinese communist forces, but simultaneously, by force to meet the drive toward northern armies southward toward Nanking.

The total number of executions of communists in Hankow was raised to 46 in a week when 14 more captives were beheaded.

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FAIR TIME

BEFORE many more weeks shall have passed it will be fair time again in Idaho. It may be difficult to realize now while summer temperatures prevail and the vacation urge calls a wailing populace to forest and mountain, but a mere day-after-tomorrow that same populace, or an appreciable portion of it, will be attending fairs, those close at home and some not so close.

Thus does the Idaho Statesman remind us all of fair time, of harvest time, of autumn, so soon upon us. Continuing it says:

The day was, and not so far removed, when the country fair was an outstanding social event for all the countryside. Two months prior to the time of holding the fair, boys and girls were ambitious to earn extra money against the needs that pressed upon youthful fancies when all the wonders of the sideshows called. The trip was made either by train to the county seat, 20 miles away, or else the family arose at 3 or 4 o'clock, led the chores and then rode at plugging gait behind Bill and Maud in the old surrey.

Family reunions attracted relatives from as far away as 30 miles. Dinners were taken from home, you may recall, huge dinners provided by such cooks as only live in memories of childhood. The dinner was spread over a tablecloth on green grass under the trees, picnic style, and there was much of merry-making while it was eaten. Even if slower those were quite colorful days—and the fried chicken had a flavor and was eaten with such gusto as shall not prevail again for the generation which then was in childhood.

The fairs have changed since those days along with all the multitude of changes that have been worked in every phase of living. The fair of today has lost a great deal of its social flavor. Relatives living on farms a mere 10 or 20 miles apart are likely to call on each other after supper while driving in the evening's coolness.

The successors to those boys and girls of yesterday who counted themselves fortunate if they managed to hoard 25 or 30 cents for a wild spending spree at the county fair the one day they could attend are not content with such paltry sums.

Young Bill raises pigs, and he is counting on winning at least \$25 with his entry at the fair. He had outstanding success last year in the club class and made the older breeders surrender a part of the money offered in the open class. Jim has dairying for his project, and his yearling heifer and that bull calf he schemed around and bought this spring are looking mighty promising. Jim wears an air of distinction at times, but his mother understands that it's his concern over his charges that claims his attention.

If the fairs have changed from what they were in the old days, most of the changes have been for the better. The midway as it existed in those days has vanished for all practical purposes, and the entertainment features remaining offer less that is of offensive to a discriminating public taste. The opportunities for stressing the educational have been developed until your discerning student can form a more conclusive opinion of the progress of a community by a careful study of exhibits during one day at the fair and shrewd questions asked exhibitors than he could by a week of independent inquiries.

Pumpkins and squashes and tall, tall corn; vegetables proud in colorful perfection and of a size to make the stranger gasp; livestock consciously aware of its superiority over the common run—all these and much besides we shall soon be seeing.
