

# BOXERS' DEMANDS THROW INDUSTRY INTO INACTIVITY

### Madison Square Garden Refuses to Pay Pugilists More Than Fifty Per Cent Of Receipts at Contests.

NEW YORK, Aug. 13. (UP)—After drawing more than a million dollars in three outdoor bouts here, the pugilists have virtually at a standstill today because of the excessive demands of the leading fighters.

Madison Square Garden has dropped negotiations for three out-door shows—Sharrick-Campbell, Sharrick-Williams and Sharrick-Williams—because the pugilists are asking too much for their services.

Sharrick wants a guarantee of \$100,000 to get into the ring again. Al Singer, well-known light-weight champion, asks in percent to meet Jack (Kid) Berg who demands 25 per cent. Jack Thompson, California, asks 16 per cent to meet Jimmy McLarnin, of Vancouver, B. C., who asks 25 per cent for his services.

The three outdoor bouts staged by the Garden this summer have grossed \$1,082,500.71 and attracted 125,875 persons as follows:



## Crop Reports from All Sections Are Favorable

### Early Harvest of Grains And Potatoes Are Heavy; Conditions Favor Farmers

Early reports of harvest from all sections of this valley continue to reveal that the 1930 crop year is average or better for most farm products. Grains are making exceptional yields in several localities and other crops including early potatoes, red clover seed and barley are producing heavily. Late potatoes are looking good, and bean crop conditions are believed to be a good average. Sugar beets are not as badly injured in several localities as was first presumed, while the warm weather has been most favorable to corn.

**HEAVY YIELDS EXPECTED**  
HANSSEN, August 13 (Special)—While the weather has been dry and the stalks of grain stand thick, shows most encouraging returns to the farmers about Wendell.

The elevator manager, Melvin Gates reports that much of the wheat is ranging over-weight to the bushel measurement. Barley carries up strongly and the yield is excellent. In most places the main crop in good. Hay, alfalfa and potatoes excellent, and this is the common experience here.

The moist and sultry days of the past week have aided materially in the development of the large acreage of corn.

**SMALL GRAINS CUT**  
AMSTERDAM, Aug. 13 (Special)—Cutting of small grains is now under way on most farms in this vicinity. The harvesting, being done with tractor power, combine and binders and by heading machine, on farms that are too small to cut by other machines. The wheat in this dry land, which is making a yield of around 20 bushels per acre, is being harvested and marketed in this early indication that the price paid for the seed was 15 cents per bushel.

**POTATO CROP GOOD**  
Buhl, August 13 (Special)—The potato crop this year is reported to be much better than it has been for some time in this locality, with an increase of about 20 per cent over last season. A few early seed fields have been dug, but the large part of the crop is still in the ground.

**SATISFYING YIELDS**  
KIMBERLY, Aug. 13 (Special)—Mother Nature may smile upon the farmers of this vicinity as a dependable ally in combating the machinations of stock market manipulators in deflating prices of farm products in general, when prices in particular in the option of the Evening Times correspondents who find the best of compensation is manifested in abundant yields as a preliminary step toward at least partial rehabilitation may be realized by the farmer for the low price he receives for his product.

### DAIRYMEN WILL ACCORD HONOR TO BENEFACTOR

**Inventor of Butterfat Test, Who Is Now 85 Years Old, Due to Receive Award for Work Done Many Years Ago**

MADISON, Wis., Aug. 13.—The man who is said to have done more for dairying than any other, Dr. Stephen Moulton Babcock of the University of Wisconsin, is to be honored by that industry in general. The honor will be given to him for his invention of a test for butterfat in milk.

Dr. Babcock received the honor of being named as the inventor of the test for butterfat in milk in 1890, and was awarded a gold medal and a gold watch.

Dr. Babcock's test for butterfat in milk is now used in all dairies in the United States. It is a simple test, and can be made in any laboratory.

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### BUTTERFAT SHOWS PRODUCTION GAIN BUT LOWER PRICE

**Average Paid During First Half of 1930 Less by 8.8 Cents Than That of Same Period of Last Year.**

Butterfat was collected by a group composed of F. R. Farrell, President of the Kansas State Agricultural College; John H. Flint, Director of the New York State Agricultural Experiment Station; and J. C. Lusk, Secretary of the National Dairy Council.

Butterfat production in Idaho during the first 6 months of 1930 totaled 11,225,149 pounds, as compared to 12,521,205 pounds during the first half of 1929.






