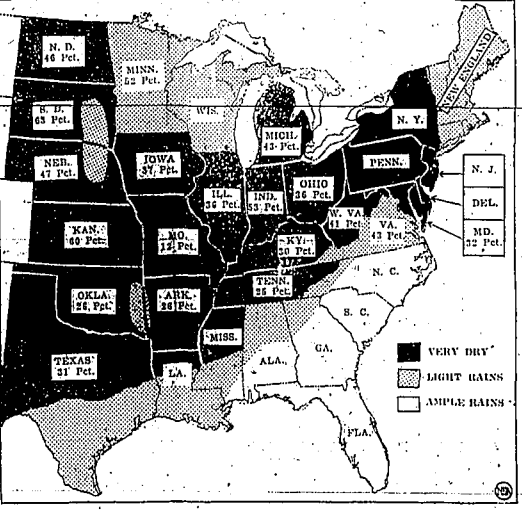

BOXERS' DEMANDS
THROW INDUSTRY
INTO INACTIVITY

Madison Square Garden Refuses to Pay Pugnists
More Than Fifty Per Cent
Of Receipts at Contests.

NEW YORK, Aug. 13. (UP)—After drawing more than a million dollars in three outdoor bouts here, the committee, the last in the industry in this region was virtually at a standstill today because of the excessive demands of the leading fighters.

Madison Square Garden has dropped negotiations for three out door shows—Shirley Campbell, Vincent J. Brown and Thomas McLaughlin—because the promoters are asking too much for their services.

Shirley wants a guarantee of \$100,000 to get into the ring again. Al Singer, newly-crowned lightweight champion, asks 10 per cent to meet Jack (Kid) Berg who demands 25 per cent. Jack Thompson, California Negro, wants 10 per cent to meet Jimmy McLarnie, of Vancouver, B. C., who asks 25 per cent for his services.

"We have dropped all negotiations for bouts in which the prize-fighters ask more than 50 per cent of the gate," Frank Thorne, vice-president of Madison Square Garden, told the United Press today.

"With the fighters getting 50 per cent, the hall mark collecting 12 1/2 per cent, another 12 1/2 per cent for preliminaries, there is left only 25 per cent for profit and incidentals. We are through," he said, "with guarantees and will not pay any fighters more than the customary 50 per cent."

The three outdoor bouts staged by the Garden this summer have grossed \$1,032,200.71 and attracted 126,875 persons as follows:

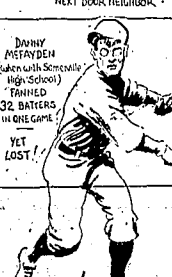

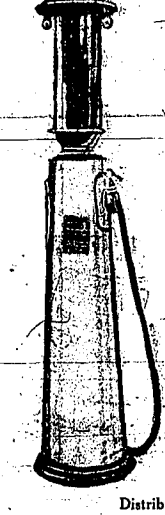

Hawks arose in the morning, ate breakfast, climbed into his airplane in New York City, and arrived in Los Angeles in time to see the sun set on the Pacific. Just a day's journey as the crow—or rather, the modern birdman—flies.

Crop Reports from All Sections Are Favorable

Early Harvest of Grains And Potatoes Are Heavy; Conditions Favor Farmers

Early reports of harvest from all sections of this valley continue to reveal that the 1930 crop year is average or better for most farm products. Grains are making exceptional yields in several localities and other crops including early potatoes, red clover seed and barley are producing heavily. Late potatoes are looking good, and bean crop conditions are believed to be a good average. Sugar beets are not as badly injured in several localities as was first presumed, while the warm weather has been most favorable to corn.

HEAVY YIELDS EXPECTED
HANSEN, August 13 (Special).—While the average of the 1930 crop year is much less than usual, indications are that the yield will be heavy. This week will see much of the threshing done and many interesting figures are looked for.

Beans and potatoes are the main crops in this region and the crop time is a busy time. About 400 acres of the bean crop have been planted this year, the average increasing, reports their introduction into this vicinity by A. D. P. Keith family. They have an interesting history, the beans having been raised as a staple vegetable by Mrs. Keith's family for several generations in Kentucky and brought to the northwest as well as other portions of the country by different members of the family as they migrated. A few years ago the "bean" commercial value was not appreciated by Mrs. Keith, but she felt that it was a good thing that it was brought to the northwest as one of the most profitable crops hereabouts.

RED CLOVER YIELD.
JEROME, August 13 (Special).—George B. Nichols Seed Company reports the receipt of the 1930 red clover seed crop for 1930. The seed store this week. The crop was 2400 pounds, was grown by W. D. Jones, agriculturist, at Jerome. Average yield was five hundred pounds per acre. Being harvested and marketed this early indicates the best seed crop from the first year. The price paid for the seed was 15 cents per pound.

POTATO CROP GOOD.
BOISE, August 13 (Special).—The potato crop this year is believed to be much better than it has been for some time in this locality, with an increase of about 15 per cent over last season. A few early spud fields have been dug, but the large part of the crop is still in the ground. George Ahlstrom has a fine early potatoes on his farm south-west of Boise that when dug two weeks ago ran over 50 bushels to the acre, equaling an average yield for early spuds.

SITTINGBURY YIELDS.
KIMBERLY, Aug. 13 (Special).—Mother Nature may be relied upon by the farmers of this vicinity as a dependable ally in combating the machinations of stock market manipulators in deflating prices of farm products in general and wheat prices in particular in the opinion of the Evening Times correspondent, who finds the use of compensation is manifest in the drought yields as a preliminary step which at least partial rehabilitation may be realized by the farmer for the low price he receives for his product.

While the wheat yielding is not as good as it was in the highly satisfactory yields have been reported by local farmers. Reports from Frank Steadman's wheat show a yield of 100 bushels per acre, while the acreage is 100 to 150 bushels.

DAIRYMEN WILL ACCORD HONOR TO BENEFACTOR

Inventor of Butterfat Test,
Who Is Now 85 Years Old,
Died Many Years Ago

MADISON, Wis., Aug. 12. The man who is said to have done more for dairying than any other, Dr. Stephen Hales, inventor of the test for butterfat in milk, died at 85, in a hospital here.

Dr. Hales was born in 1792, in the town of Hales, near London, England. He was educated at the University of Wisconsin, and was a member of the American Academy of Arts and Sciences. BUTTERFAT SHOWS PRODUCTION GAIN BUT LOWER PRICE

Average Paid During First
Half of 1930 Less by 8.8
Cents Than That of Same
Period of Last Year.

Butterfat was collected by a group composed of F. B. Farrell, President of the Kansas State Agricultural College; John H. Hall, of the University of New York; Carl R. Gray, of the University of Wisconsin; and J. L. Lusk, of the University of California.

Butterfat production in Idaho during the first 6 months of 1930 totalled 14,225,410 pounds, as compared to 13,421,240 pounds during the first half of 1929, according to the report of George N. Butler, director of dairying in the state department of agriculture. In spite of the increase in production, the report reveals, production was less than last year, due to lower prices. A lower average price per pound of butterfat of 8.8 cents compared to the 1929 average of 9.68 cents for the first half of last year.

Butter manufactured in the state increased 362,340 pounds, or 2.5 per cent, from 11,922,500 pounds during the first half of 1929 to 12,284,840 pounds in 1930. Butter production also made a gain of 1,228,000 pounds in 1930, an increase of 10.7 per cent. This 20 pounds of milk and 2 pounds of butterfat daily for the entire year, that cheese production has shown at maturity, can be expected to increase.
