



## STAGG OBSERVES 68TH BIRTHDAY, HEALTH IS GOOD

Man's Age Should Not Be  
Reckoned in Years, According  
to the Famous University  
of Chicago Grid Mentor

CHICAGO, Aug. 16 (UPI)—Amos Stagg, 88, "The Grand Old Man of the Midwest," today celebrated his 68th birthday at his home near the University of Chicago, where he has served as the rector of the football team since it was founded in 1882.

"Yes, I'm 68 years young today and still a full field," Stagg told the United Press. "I feel as good as I ever did and haven't even thought of retiring. Don't be surprised if you have to ask me again in 20 years how old I am. I intend to continue as athletic director and football coach at Chicago as long as I'm in good physical condition and I think that will be a long time."

Though he is in his physical fitness, the veteran coach went out on the tennis court, and played his daily game against his youngest son, Paul, Chicago University quarterback.

At present in this old man's cabinet are all other coaches until Stagg, "Years have little to do with a man being old. A man becomes old when he is physically unfit."

"The body is a machine and you must understand your machine to keep young. I understand mine and don't abuse it with tobacco, alcohol, caffeine or other poisons and I exercise to keep the machine functioning properly. In that way I have been able to live no more than a headache."

## GIANTS CREEP UP ON ROBINS

The Chicago Cubs were faced today with a new opportunity to increase their lead over the Robins, who are 3½ games behind them, when they opened a series with the Phillips. Carl Hubbell allowed but four singles as the Giants banked Cincinnati 5 to 0. The win placed the Giants but one and one-half games ahead of Brooklyn.




