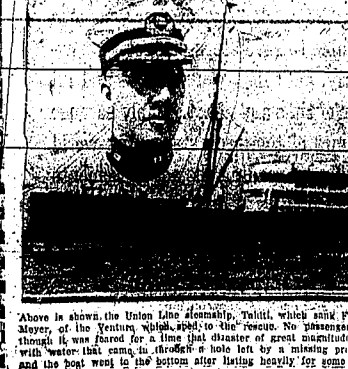

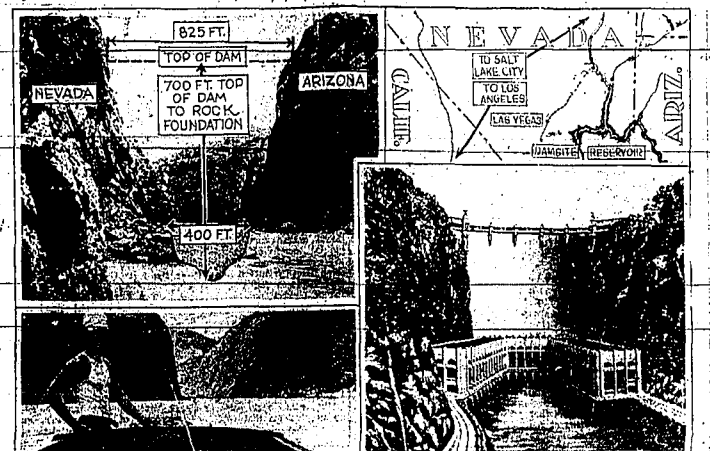

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NEGRO PROBLEM AGAIN BOTHERS SOUTH STATES

Evidence of Increased Racial Feeling Found in Dixie; Industrial Depression Gola Blame for Many Lynchings

ATLANTA, Ga., Aug. 25 (AP)—The Negro problem men were in speaking at the National Industrial conference, with consequent unemployment and industrial depression, was cited as the immediate cause of the present perplexity.

While underlying causes in the economic and social situation in many parts of the south, it is a direct development of the day after the Negro industrial depression, which was the cause of the lynchings in the United States for nearly 250 years.

The tenacity of the situation has had expression in ten or more lynchings—often brutally—during the year for this year and a number of other demonstrations against the colored people which, through contact of "white" leaders or for other reasons, did not end in actual violence.

The lynching record for this year to date already has passed that of 1929 when ten lynchings were recorded. One can only wonder that the remaining months may be worse unless relief can be exerted.

At Tuskegee Institute, Tuskegee, Alabama, Monday, work began on the new building, which are considered the nearest to official records of extrajudicial punishment in existence.

His figures show that since 1882 there have been 1522 white persons and 239 Negroes lynched in the United States. Only four states, Massachusetts, Rhode Island, New Hampshire and Vermont have not at one time or another in those years gone outside the law to run roughshod.

A study of the figures shows an interesting relationship between industrial depression and lynchings. In 1892 100 whites and 152 Negroes were lynched in the following year 40 whites and 154 Negroes. These were the years which set back the lynchings.

By 1906, when prosperity was returning, lynchings dropped to 21 whites and 80 Negroes. In 1909 to 5 whites and 107 Negroes. By 1914, when the war broke out, lynchings dropped to only three whites and 25 Negroes.

Approximately 20 per cent of the Negroes are illiterate; there is little provision for education—misleading, perverted development, and industry through the schools and in the case of the mentally defective Negro he is usually the inmate of an institution.
