MISCHANCE OF JUSTICE EXPOSED IN PIONEER DIARY

Notes of W. R. M. Edwards Reveal That Sam Gowan Was Executed Although Victim of Stabbing Did Not Die

BUTTE, Mont., Aug. 25 (UP)—A misreading of a page in the diary of Sam Gowan, a pioneer settler, has revealed that the man was executed although the victim of a stabbing did not die.

Many strange things happened during the misreading of the diary in the diary notes of W. R. M. Edwards, pioneer.

John E. Taylor, Deer Lodge National Forest Supervisor, in possession of the notes made during the turbulent camp's history, revealed the story.

Sam Gowan, a miner, stabbed Jack Dowd during a quarrel in 1865.

"This was a man executed for a murder that he did not commit," relates Edwards diary. 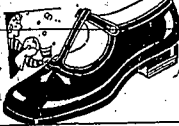

AN ARCTIC ADVENTURE

IF A FINER tale of high adventure than the story of Captain Andree and his companions has hit the front pages in the last ten years it is hard to say just what it was.

When a band of hunters stumbled over three frozen corpses in the wastes of Franz Josef Land they brought to a conclusion one of the great mysteries of the age. Nothing had been heard of Andree's expedition for 33 years. The man had become one of those bizarre, appealing figures that take on an added covering of romance because they simply vanish. He had drifted north into the Arctic silence and the silence had swallowed him. Every new polar flight every new polar tragedy served to recall his disappearance. He became a sort of legend, with the primitive balloon in which he dared 2300 miles of utter desolation.

Now the mystery is over. When Andree's diary—preserved, most fortunately, for the world to read—is printed the last haze of uncertainty will go away. We shall know how they met their deaths, what they said and thought, and did as they finally realized that their adventure was doomed to disaster; and it will be knowledge that we would not miss having.

It is easy enough to say that Andree was only a dare-devil who accomplished nothing. Certainly this venture was a tremendous gamble. To try to drift across the top of the world in a free balloon is risky enough, in all conscience—especially when you remember that even today a flight of 600 or 700 miles is usually long enough to win first prize in an international balloon race.

Yet one imagines that even if Andree and his men could have known in advance just what was going to happen to them, they would have gone ahead anyway. True adventurers and explorers are like that; probably, is why mankind always has an unquenchable admiration for them.

For it is always worth something to see a man over whom the fear of death has no power at all. Most of us never escape from the shadow of that fear. "Safety First" was our motto long before it became a printed slogan. So when a man sets off for Arctic fastnesses or tropical jungles or man-killing desert wastes and gambles with his life for the slenderest of reasons, we cannot help applauding. He is rising above the oldest, strongest fear of the race. He is proving that there are things that he values infinitely above his own life.

There is nothing much for us to say when a man like Andree comes to his appointed end. It is idle to wish that it could have been otherwise—the Andrees, the Amundsons and the Scotts died as they would have wished. We can, indeed, only repeat that epitaph for another explorer who went to the polar loneliness to die—"Here died a very gallant gentleman."

MORE SPEED IN THE AIR

THE PREDICTION that New York and San Francisco will eventually be linked by over-night air mail service—a prediction that would have sounded foolish only a year ago—is beginning to seem a great deal more reasonable, in view of Captain Hawks' 12-hour flight from one ocean to another.

Speed in the air is becoming more and more common. Just at present, undoubtedly, it would be impossible for a regular air mail plane to maintain, or even attempt, a 12 hour schedule across the continent; but when the way in which aircraft designers are constantly developing new and improved models is considered it seems quite possible that the thing will be done in the near future.

You might notice that it is just 18 years since an aviator made a great sensation by flying all the way from Jacksonville, Florida, to San Francisco. It took him 151 days.

THE CUNNING OF GHANDI

IT IS RAPIDLY becoming evident that Mahatma Gandhi is a leader of considerable skill. His latest proposal, made from his prison cell, puts Ramsay MacDonald and his government in a rather embarrassing position.

Gandhi offers to call off his passive resistance, non-co-operative movement if the British will release all political prisoners and will pledge themselves to work for dominion status at the coming round table discussion of Indian affairs.

Since British officials have already vaguely promised dominion status for India, this ultimatum has a mild, sweetly reasonable sound; yet by acceding to it Premier MacDonald might as well cause his government to fall. It would stir the British Tories as nothing else would. Whichever way he goes, MacDonald is in a hole—and Gandhi undoubtedly knows it.
