

TOMMY FREEMAN BEATS THOMPSON IN TITLE MATCH

Welterweight Crown Is Now Worn By Arkansas Fighter; Winter Sweeps Negro Off His Feet During Bout

CLEVELAND, Sept. 6 (UP)—Tommy Freeman of Hot Springs, Ark., was the crown of the world's welterweight championship today after outpointing young Jack Thompson, California, in a 15-round bout at League Park here last night.

Taking the offensive at the outset, Freeman won the championship off his feet with punches, fast and short range punching, that won for him all the rounds of the fight. The remaining four went to the champion. The decision of the Patsy Healey, veteran New York referee, carried with it the approval of 15,000 fans.

Freeman displayed a gameness and anxiety to mix that surprised the spectators. He was only slightly injured. That blow made Freeman cautious of his face guard and from there on out the challenge was in doubt. Thompson's punches, with few exceptions, falling on harmless territory.

Thompson, who won the welterweight title from Jackie Fields in Detroit last May, withdrew at 14½ and Freeman at 16½.

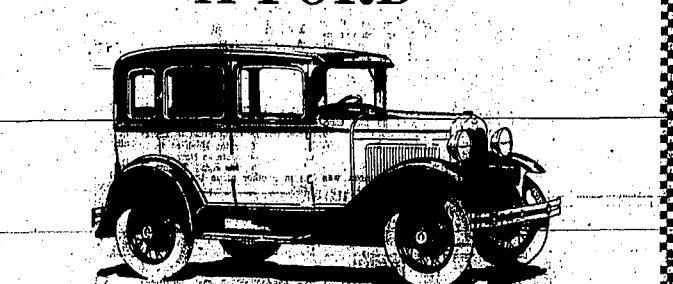

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BORAH AGAIN

THE news that William E. Borah is again in Idaho, hell-bent on some kind of a crusade either for or against the administration causes Idahoans to wonder just where the senior senator will wind up in this campaign. Perhaps he does not know himself, so no one needs argue with him on that point. But he got a clean bill of health when the Republican state convention at Idaho Falls lauded him in the same breath that it eulogized Senator Thomas and Congressman Smith. This gives the general public cause to wonder with just whom were the resolutions insincere. There is little if any similarity in the views and records of Borah as opposed to those held by the ardent supporters of the administration. Now that the senator has been renominated, it will be interesting to see with what zeal he espouses the platform upon which he is a candidate.

If Borah is not intent on splitting the Republican party in the hopes of leading a Progressive wing of that group against Hoover two years hence, then suggestions are in order to determine what else he might hope to accomplish in his reputed intention to war on the party which is responsible for his political existence.

That Borah is an enigma there is no doubt; that he is a senatorial headliner there can be no question; and that he is a senatorial acrobat is undisputed.

For the same reasons that the Republicans of Idaho are forced to renominate him as senator, the while stomaching his irregularity for fear he would run as an independent, gives grounds for the assumption that he might seriously attempt to exercise this same kind of a whip in national politics, and either run or threaten to run against Hoover independently.

At any rate, Mr. Borah, has his constituency in Idaho guessing and speculating. That he will not disappoint his public as to thrills is the prediction.

A BAD DAY FOR MOTHERS

STARTING a youngster off to school for the first time is one of those minor but poignant tragedies that life insists on bringing to all mothers. There isn't any way of dodging it and there isn't any way of making it easy to take. It has to be done, and that's all there is to it. Still, it isn't much fun.

The youngster, of course, usually enjoys it. To him it is a symbol of advancing years, a forerunner of coming independence. He generally considers that going to school takes him out of the "baby" class and enrolls him, if not quite in the ranks of the adults, at least a long step away from outright infancy. He gets a brand new peek at the outside world, and it provides him with quite a thrill.

The worst of it is—from the mother's viewpoint—that he is quite right in looking at it that way. The first trip to school does, unquestionably, mark an epoch in childhood. It brings to a sudden close the period of complete dependency on the home, it slashes straight through that brief, ecstatic time in which a child is always on terms of perfect intimacy with his mother.

That is why mothers, on the first day of school, experience a strange and pitiful difficulty in keeping the tears back. They always have and they always will; and, to repeat, there isn't anything that can be done about it. But there is small comfort in that reflection.

Probably the hardest thing is not, after all, the knowledge that the youngster has taken the first of the steps that will eventually carry him away from his home forever. The pathetic thing, the thing that tugs at the heart strings, is the brave, unsuspecting innocence with which a lad of six trudges off to face the world.

By the time we are old enough to be parents, most of us come to realize that the world is far from being the pleasant, delightful place that we imagined as children. It is a place in which illusions fade and in which dreams have an unaccountable way of failing to come true. There is a great deal more meanness and cruelty and heartbreak in it than we used to think. Acquiring this knowledge is a painful process.

Starting to school puts a child in line for its first dose of that knowledge. In the months that follow he will shed the wide-eyed trust, the spontaneous confidence, that are the heritage of all very small children. Gradually he will become soiled, as all of us grownups are soiled. The moment that he reads his footprints toward school, the shadows of the prison house begin to close about him.

All of this, to be sure, is universal and unescapable. It has to be. We learn by getting bumped, and in the long run it is generally good for us. But watching your own child take the first step isn't pleasant. The first day of school is a bad day for mothers.

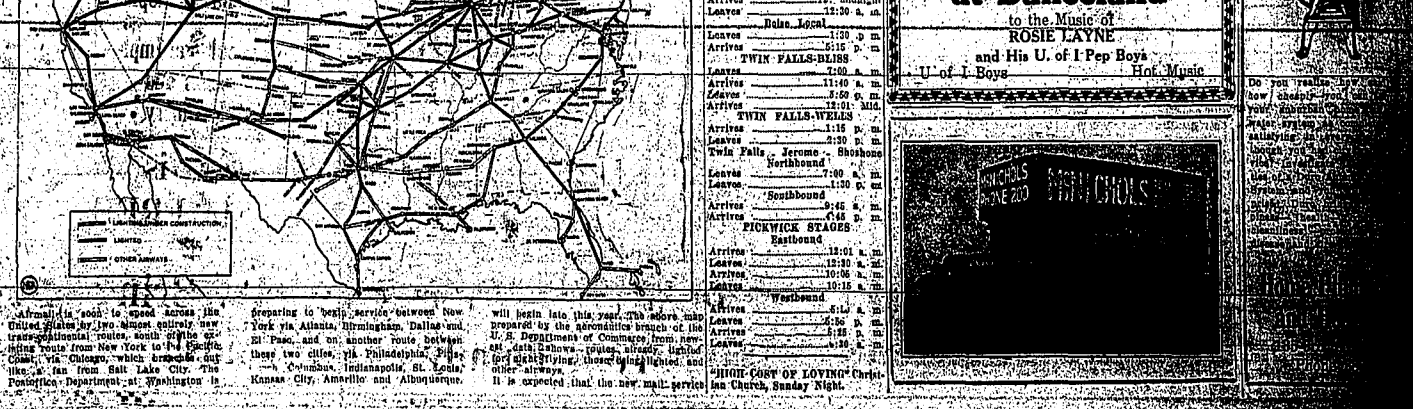
