Cubs Score Winning Runs in Ninth; Athletics Tyl. by 10th Victory; New York Splits a Twin Bill

The St. Louis Cardinals today scored four victories out of their remaining six games to clinch the National League pennant regardless of what the other contenders do.

If the Cardinals win three or more of their remaining games, the Chicago Cubs win all five of their games, the National League race will end in a deadlock between the Cubs and Cubs.

Brooklyn is strictly out of the race and out of the St. Louis. If the Cards lose four games and the Braves win their remaining five.

The New York Giants have been eliminated from all but a tie for the pennant. The Cubs would have to lose their remaining six games and the Giants win their three for New York and St. Louis to tie.

The Cards had a 2½ game lead over the Cubs today as they faced the Phillies in their next to last game at Philadelphia before returning home to finish the season with four more against the Athletics.

The Cards were late yesterday in their game with the Boston Braves, 1-2. Dally Hartnett's 24th home run of the season with two strikes on base won the game for the ninth inning.

Brooklyn sustained its fifth straight defeat by losing to the Philadelphia Athletics, 7-3.

The Giants missed a chance to tie with the Red Sox for the double-header when they divided a double-header with Cincinnati. After winning the first game, 6-4, the Giants dropped the second.

The Philadelphia Athletics won their fourth victory of the season when they defeated the St. Louis Cardinals, 3-2, in the second game of a double-header after losing the opening, 8-4.

Catcher Spencer's wild throw in the tenth enabled Detroit to defeat Washington 4-2.

The Chicago White Sox beat the New York Yankees, 15-7, aided by five Yankee errors.

Five runs in the tenth gave the Boston Red Sox a 9-5 victory over Cleveland, Wesley Ferrell being singled with the decisive run.





NEW BUILDING PLANNED HERE

Announcement of a new step in the program of expansion and construction in Twin Falls was made today by the Stevens-Van Ecken company. A new modern building, 56 by 125 feet in dimensions, will be constructed for the firm, which now occupies rooms at 151 Main avenue east, on lots next to the J. C. Pannoy store, according to information given out by W. A. Van Engelen, manager of the company.

It is estimated the building, which is to be constructed by John Hood, Pocatello contractor, will cost approximately \$10,000. A lease for rental of the building by the Stevens-Van Ecken company for a period of ten years has been signed, Mr. Van Engelen stated, and plans and specifications are now being prepared. Construction will be started within the next few weeks.

A one-story building, modern throughout, with full basement and balcony, is planned. The building is to be located on the lot at present a building occupied by W. R. Priole and Dr. W. D. Reynolds. This building will be razed to make way for the new construction.

A FOE OF COMPLACENCY

No American who likes to trust that all is for the best in this of all possible republics should ever read the writings of Charles Lathrop Pack, president of the American Tree Association. For Mr. Pack has a way of being disconcertingly blunt and outspoken. In his latest broadcast, Mr. Pack makes the following discouraging statement:

"In the forest lies our economic salvation. With the passing of our forests, whose products keep the wheels of industry turning, would come the passing of our entire economic scheme. There is no article of commerce into which cost of forest products does not enter.

"We have heard a great deal about a trade expansion program. Any such program means an increased call upon our forest resources. Let us take stock. We are cutting our forests about four and one-half times faster than we are renewing them."

- This is not reassuring, but it is worth listening to by a lumber state like Idaho. If Mr. Pack's reiteration of unpleasant truths finally awakens us to the seriousness of our forest problem we will have done the country a great service.

THE TOLL STILL RISES

ALTHOUGH Massachusetts has been making special efforts this year to make motor traffic safer, the state has just discovered that the first eight months of 1930 have broken all records for traffic fatalities, 500 people having been killed by autos during that period.

To make matters worse, Massachusetts is known as one of the strictest states in the union in regard to safety measures. It has more than the average number of safeguards. It's drivers' license law is stringent and is carefully administered. But its death toll continues to go up.

Similar conditions, undoubtedly, will be found to prevail in Idaho and all over the union by the time the year ends. Our utter failure to deal with the tremendous problem of the automobile is emphasized in a bloody figure. How long will it be before the nation realizes that this is one of the very greatest issues of the day—one that demands measures more radical and restrictive than any that have yet been tried?

THE END OF THE DEPRESSION

A DEFINITE pickup in American business this fall is predicted by Roger Babson, famous statistician, with the remark that "the tremendous drop registered by the Babson chart, since last September, must soon strike bottom if it has not already done so."

Thus Mr. Babson adds his authoritative voice to the growing chorus of optimism. Colonel Leonard P. Ayres is another authority who sees in the near future a return to more normal conditions, and others are following suit. The whole nation will devoutly hope that these eminent prophets are not mistaken.



IT is more than usually startling to learn that poison caused the death of State Senator John T. Joyce in Chicago—who died, you may remember, two days before he was to have testified concerning gangland activities at the polls in the spring primaries.

Just as present the man in the street cannot quite tell whether this poison was self-administered or not; in other words, whether Senator Joyce committed suicide or was murdered.

If the latter proves the case, Chicago's gangs must be given credit for a new bit of ingenuity. Heretofore the revolver, the machine gun and the bomb have been their weapons. Are they, now, becoming poisoners as well?


PARIS, Sept. 22 (AP)—Parisian merchants deplore "High Commissioner for Tourism" Gaston-Gerard's plea for tourists and the well-known fact that the country cannot draw themselves a little grubbing over the current tourist season. For M. Gaston-Gerard's glowing statistics to one side, the merchants aren't making the cents out of their shivers and something tells them business could have been better.

In specifically combating the High Commissioner's figures one newspaper, the "Paris Mail," finds a possible solution in the statement that "America sends us a good many tourists, admitted. But they are not the right sort." "Students," that newspaper goes on, "do not spend a great deal of money. No 100 article and writers respect it places the Lenz; they eat rather at the smaller restaurants. Most of these people are here for serious work, and hence do not patronize the very amusements we have planned especially for them."

The entire press joins occasionally in the lamentations, "and three or four enterprising reportage men have made the rounds of the fashionable places in the hotel and chalet, recording in their copy-books the fact that the Parisian writers' tears over the old picture of tourists, capotes, maitres d'hôtel and waitresses lined up against so many vacant walls, attend pensively at the cloudy skies. According to these M. Gaston-Gerard's figures mean less than nothing.

"The meaning," "Paris Mail" is in favor of turning notes attention to the Germans.

NORTH IRELAND CROP ACREAGE HAS HUGE DROP

WELFARE, Sept. 22 (UP)—Agriculture returns of North Ireland for the first seven months of 1929 as reported by the Ministry of Agriculture show that the total acreage of ploughed land was 1,245,000 acres.

A reduced acreage under oats, potatoes and flax has brought the ploughed land acreage down to 1,245,000 acres, the lowest since 1877. Cattle also decreased while sheep, hogs and the total pig population increased.

The area under the corn crop declined by 6,619 acres, while a decline of 702 acres occurred in the case of oats. The area under root crops shows a reduction of 17,881 acres, due mainly to a decrease in the potato crop of 15,598 acres. During 1929 potatoes were extremely cheap, and it is to this expense attribute the smaller 1930 planting.

These plantings have decreased by 5,231 acres and turfs also have decreased by 1761 acres. Wheat and barley show small increases, and they have increased by 12,450 acres to 1,717,011 which is the highest total since 1925.
