CLARA BOW TELLS STORY OF NEVADA GAMBLING TABLES

Movie Star Has Expensive Experience at Calneva; Will Rogers Also Furnishes Some Choice Words

IDAHO FALLS, Sept. 25 (UP)—The story of a girl and her expensive play at the Calneva, Nev., gambling tables was told by Clara Bow today in her new picture, a picture statement by Will Rogers had released her from the silence demanded by social acquaintances.

"The movie girl" told "once at a morning newspaper in which Rogers admitted that he had "sort of" introduced her at Calneva and announced that she was ready to talk.

"I said in my first statement, if they people think and want to see me, they can present them to my attorney, W. J. Gilbert," Miss Bow said.

"I sort of had to ride to come on a woman's handwagon," Rogers said.

"I told her, her newest friend, was working for me on a picture," Rogers said.

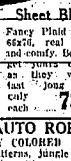

Agricultural Resume Reveals Bright Prospects for Gem State This Fall

Nine Year Average Eclipsed By Bumper Crops Harvested This Year by Idaho Farmers

The story of the prosperity of Idaho was graphically told Sunday in the Idaho Daily Statesman, Boise, and is reproduced here in part:

"When Alexander Leggett, federal farm board chairman, declared last August that Idaho is 'sitting on top of the world' he was but telling the truth which Idahoans themselves have begun to feel for weeks to come. The roller will ever create force as the returns from solid trailroads of produce roll into Idaho and add to the time family stock."

The state, statistics compiled by the Statesman from various agencies have demonstrated, is a bright spot in the general desert of "depression" which hangs over the United States.

Crop Returns High
The crops of the state, estimated by the federal and state reports indicate, will not the growers this year something that a bumper and low million dollars in excess of the nine-year average, and perhaps the best returns since 1924, when the potato market hit the ceiling. And the only thing that prevents this year's crop returns in the opinion of economists is the loss of some late-ripening crops in the impaired purchasing power of the national center.

The drought in the east, combined with what in many cases are bumper crops in Idaho, is the chief factor behind the essentially healthy condition. The national totals of many of the state's crops have been cut to such low levels that in some cases Idaho is one of the chief factors in the national production.

Profile Is Bright
True it is that in some respects the picture is splotchy, some areas of crop will make their producers much more money than others, yet, contrary to the experience in some other years, there probably will be no net losses as a result of the year's operations. And most growers will have something to apply on the mortgage, if any, or to buy that new car the family has been hankering for.

Of course, everyone in Idaho who has done much reading has realized vaguely that while other states were contemplating unemployment, credit stringency, and general depression there was something about the Idaho picture that didn't look just like that in the first place. 1929 was a good year for cash returns. Exceeding live stock, poultry and dairy products, the production of the state that year brought in more than a hundred and six million dollars. Many prices generally were good and yields high. As a result there was more money in the pockets of Idaho than elsewhere.

Road Building Helps
Then the state's extraordinary road program during the summer kept at work men otherwise engaged in lumbering and similar activities, kept joyriding and other pleasures, and further helped the merchants. There was, however, some slight worry about the general business depression should shut the market for the 1930 crops.

Idaho growers holding the sack in this fear some growers, much to their present disgust, contracted their crops at prices much lower than present levels.

The drought of July and August, however, changed the whole picture. Now—solid—trailroads of Idaho, electric, lettuce, peas, beans, potatoes, cabbage, corn, alfalfa, flower, spinach, carrots, eggs, butter, cheese, dressed poultry, hams, lamb and fruits are pouring over the trucks, headed for a hungry eastern market more dependent than ever before on the product of irrigated fields.

"10 Millions of Potatoes"
Figures of the public utilities commission show that in eight months, our 9500 perihabundant produce alone, shipped from the southern Idaho territory, have totaled 13,930 cars. Plowing the good old game of "ball end to end," these cars would stretch about 110 miles, or the distance overland from Boise to Twin Falls—solid ranks of refrigerated cars loaded with food products.

Since the big through-freights will carry about a hundred cars, the electric statistics will add at once that Idaho's contribution to the nation's wonder no far this year that counting livestock or grain is its destination, and provide employment for show workers, track walkers and terminal crews necessary to handle this huge volume of produce.

Worth—\$45,000,000
That of course is merely the beginning of the 1930 movement, plus the big cash of the 1929 crop. The remainder of the 1930 potato crop alone will require 25,000 cars or 50 per cent more than the entire movement to date. And this 250 million of pounds (equivalent to a train stretching from Boise to American Falls) will be worth to the state virtually as much as 1/2 its entire mineral output.

The crop this year is five million bushels ahead of the 1929 production, and the price is even better than the gift-edged market of last year. Commissioner John H. Packard of the state department of

IDAHO U. GIVES DAIRYING COURSE

University of Idaho, Moscow, Sept. 25—Advance registration is already being made for the annual five-months course in practical commercial dairying which will be given by the University of Idaho College of Agriculture, Department of Dairy Husbandry, October 27, 1930, to March 27, 1931. Members of the dairy husbandry staff prefer a good student.

Dairy Products Strong
While the horse and the cow thus have been busy, the cow and the hen have not been idle. Since the first of the year the dairy cow has been responsible for 77 carloads of dairy products out of the state. These total shipments sound small compared with some of the larger crops, but since the average priced, concentrated products their values mount up. Of this total 110 carloads were cheese and 46 butter.

Shipments of the whole milk, cream, and butter, keeping pace in the increasing of demand for dairy products which has been in progress ever since the first of June. Since that time the average price has increased 5 cents a pound, which on a carload of butter, carrying many tons, represents a net increase in return to the dairyman.

Eggs have totaled 277 carloads in addition to which the poultry farm produces dressed chickens, turkeys, geese and turkeys in quantities difficult to estimate. Since the season for their dispatch has not yet started.

agriculture recently estimated the total value to the producers of the Idaho potato crop at twenty-five million dollars. And they figured he was being unduly conservative.

The production this year is 25-26,000 bushels; a year ago it was 17,356,000 bushels. On the basis of a price of \$1.20 a bushel, last year the 1929 crop was estimated to be worth \$20,626,000.

Beans Promise Gain
The bean crop probably will exceed six million dollars in value, as compared with \$5,800,000 worth in 1929. The price this year is running about the same as last year, while the yield has been increasing about 10 per cent.

More millions are coming from green peas, which were 1929's carloads were dispatched this year. Peas, which will produce more than 200 cars; prunes, estimated at 1450 cars; pears, of which the state has 61,000 bushels; onions, of which the production is 337,000 bushels this year, compared with 225,000 a year ago; the 387,000 tons of sugar beets; and the oddies and ends of such products as cabbage, cauliflower, lettuce, spinach, sweet potatoes and such that are not raised in sufficiently large quantities to be estimated.

Seed Prices Higher
Then there is the small seed crop—usually corn, wheat, barley, oats—this year, since prices have stiffened tremendously this year as compared with last. Right now, seed is selling at 50 per cent higher prices this year than last.

The increase in the price of seed is not as marked as the other increase, but it still is substantial.

Uncle Sam's Planting Pointers

By Dr. Victor Lundeen
Bureau of Plant Industry, U. S. Department of Agriculture

Idaho plants which have produced a dwarfed growth may often be induced to produce fine flowers by cutting back any hard-wood and started growth that has developed in midsummer. Do this pruning when days are on the wane, and so force the plant to new growth at the time when the best blossoms are to be expected.

How much of the old growth to remove will depend on the condition of each plant. They will soon respond to this pruning and the new growth will bear vigorous and colorful blossoms.

Plants Need Supports
Make sure your dahlia plants are well staked and tied so that heavy winds will not break them down as they mature. Stakes should have been set when the plants were planted but it is not

too late to provide supports now. Drive the stakes into the ground far enough away from the plants so that roots are not damaged.

Plants that are just starting to bloom will be benefited by giving each one a handful of a mixture of 5 parts of bonemeal and 1 part of superphosphate. Spread this on the surface soil at the base of each plant and work it into the surface soil. If your soil lacks moisture, water the plants thoroughly so it penetrates deeply into the soil.

Practise Pinching If you wish to have large flowers on long stems. The terminal bud on the stem usually produces the best blossom. Remove lateral buds while they are still small. Do not remove lateral growth that comes from leaf axils well down on the stem. In time this also will produce long-stemmed blossoms. If secondary buds on the sides of the stem are pinched off, the cut ends of the stems in the early morning or late evening. Immerse immediately after cutting them, seal the cut ends of the stems in a flame or place the ends in boiling water.
