



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

Agricultural Resume Reveals Bright Prospects for Gem State This Fall

Nine Year Average Eclipsed By Bumper Crops Harvested This Year by Idaho Farmers

The story of the prosperity of Idaho was graphically told Sunday in the Idaho Daily Statesman, Boise, and is reproduced here in part:

"When Alexander Legge, federal farm board chairman, declared last August that Idaho is 'sitting on top of the world' he was not telling the truth which Idahoans themselves have begun to feel ever since the force of the returns from winter trucking of produce right into their hands had the effect of a family sock.

The state statistics compiled by the Statesman from various sources have demonstrated, in a bright spot in the general desert of 'depression' which hangs over the United States.

Crop Returns High

"The crops of the state, estimated by the federal government, indicate that the growers this year something that a number of years ago. The nine-year average, and perhaps the best return since 1924, when the state was hit by the ceiling. And the only thing that prevents this year's crop return in the opinion of economists is the impaired purchasing power of the nation's currency. The drought in the east, combined with what in many cases are bumper crops in Idaho, has helped the condition. The national crop has been cut to such low levels that in some cases Idaho is one of the chief factors in the national production.

"True it is that in some respects the picture is spotty. The production of crops will make their producers much more money than others, yet, contrary to the expectation in some quarters, there probably will be no net losses as a result of the year's operations. Many of the farmers will have something to apply on the mortgage, if any, or to buy that new car the family has been yearning for.

"Of course, everyone in Idaho who has done much reading has realized vaguely that while other states were complaining of unemployment, credit stringency, and general depression there was something about the Idaho picture that didn't look just like that in 1932. The fact is that in 1932 the year's cash returns, excluding live stock, poultry and dairy products, were about 10 per cent above that year brought in more than a hundred and six million dollars. Many of these returns were good and bright. As a result there was more spending all winter in Idaho than elsewhere.

"Then the state's extraordinary road program, which has been going at work men otherwise engaged in lumbering and other activities, kept the state's roads in good condition, and further helped the merchants. There was, however, some slight heavy depression about the year for the 1932 crop. Idaho growers holding the sack in this year some growers, more to their present disgust, contain these crops at a much lower level than present levels.

"The drought of July and August, however, changed the whole picture. Now—sold—strawberries of Idaho, celery, lettuce, peas, beans, potatoes, cabbage, cauliflower, flower, spinach, carrots, eggs, butter, cheese, dressed poultry, hogs, and fruits are pouring over the trucks, headed for a hungry eastern market more dependent than ever before on the product of irrigated fields.

"10 Miles of Perishables— Figures of the public utilities commission show that in eight months our 2500 perishable products alone, shipped from the southern Idaho territory, have totaled 13,930 cars. Plowing the good old game of 'ball end to end' these cars would stretch about 110 miles, or the distance overland from Boise to Twin Falls—solid ranks of refrigerator-cars loaded with food products.

"Since the big through-freights will carry about a hundred cars, the direct shipments will be about 140 trains, keep 140 train crews busy for the days necessary to land the freight at its destination, and provide employment for shop workers, track walkers and terminal crews necessary to handle this huge volume of product.

"That of course is merely the beginning of the 1932 movement, plus the tax cash in the eighth month. The remainder of the 1932 potato crop alone will require 25,000 cars or 70 per cent more than the entire movement to date. And this 250 million of spuds (equivalent to a train stretching from Boise to American Falls) will be worth to the state virtually as much as 1/2 entire mineral output.

"The crop this year is five million bushels ahead of the 1932 production, and the price is five cents higher than the pit-filled market of last year. Commissioner John H. Paddock of the state department of

Uncle Sam's Planting Pointers

Department of Agriculture
Dahlias, plants which have produced a dwarfed growth may often be induced to produce flowers by cutting back any hard-wood and started growth that has developed in midsummer. Do this pruning when hot days are on the wane, and so force the plant to new growth at the time when the best blossoms are to be expected. How much of the old growth to remove will depend on the condition of each plant. They will soon respond to this pruning and the new growth will bear numerous and colorful blossoms.

Plants need supports. Make sure your dahlia plants are well staked and tied so that heavy winds will not break them during their mature stages. Stakes should have been set when the plants were planted but it is not

too late to provide supports now. Drive the stakes into the ground far enough away from the plants that roots are not damaged. Plants that are just starting to bloom will be benefited by giving each one a handful of a mixture of 5 parts of bonemeal and 1 part of phosphate of potash. Sprinkle this on the surface soil at the base of each plant and work it into the surface soil. If your soil lacks moisture, water the plants thoroughly so it penetrates deeply into the soil.

Practise blanching if you wish to have large flowers on long stems. The terminal bud on each stem usually produces the best blossom. Remove lateral buds while they are still small. Do not remove lateral growth that comes from leaf axils until down on the stem. In time this also will produce long-stemmed blossoms. If secondary buds on the sides of the stem are picked off the cut ends of the stems in the morning or late evening. Immerse after cutting them, wash the cut ends of the stems in a solution of formalin or other disinfectant to prevent rot.



BEAN ESTIMATE SHOWS INCREASE

Idaho's bean crop estimate increased from the August report to a total of 2,200,000 bushels for September. This crop is expected to be the largest on record for the state according to latest reports from the state department of agriculture.
The bean crop was damaged during August by the death and the blight of the plants. The total crop for 1929 was 1,700,000 bushels compared with 1,200,000 bushels in 1928. This increase is partly offset by the decrease in production of this crop in California and elsewhere.
The production in Idaho, Wyoming and Montana, where most of the Great Northern are produced, is reported to be nearly up to the level of 1929. The total crop for this year is being estimated at 2,200,000 bushels. Producers here have harvested 1,000,000 bushels but declined in New Mexico, where they are about 200,000 bushels short of last year's big crop of this variety.





LIQUOR CONTROL METHODS GIVEN CLOSE SCRUTINY

Clarence Darrow, Attorney, and Dr. Clarence T. Wilson, Prohibitionist, Study System Used by Canadians

NEW YORK, Sept. 25. (UP)—Clarence Darrow, famous liberal, and Dr. Clarence T. Wilson, ardent prohibitionist, have been touring Canada together, studying the workings of governmental liquor control.

In a joint statement issued on their behalf by Culler's Weekly, they declared that they were unable to reach any substantial agreement as to how they had a good time together, and that after traveling in each other's company for two weeks it became increasingly evident that Darrow does not wear horns, or horns of trifling size, and that Dr. Wilson is an affable and open-minded gentleman.

They explain their failure to agree, even about the facts of governmental liquor control, as follows: "It is hopeless for warring and rashly aggressive. When two men approach a problem from opposite points of view, they will, with different ideas of government as the rights of the citizen, and with different views on liquor, and as a result of the number of opinions, facts and causes that can be adduced by both.

"The truth is, the prohibitionist and the anti-prohibitionist are as far apart as the poles in their conceptions of government, individual rights, life, its purposes, its responsibilities and its aims. It is a vast difference between the prohibitionist and the anti-prohibitionist. It is the approach from which different people view the problem of society and the nature of man."

All the points on which the two agree are listed in their joint statement. These include such fundamental points as:

"The Constitution of Canada is made up of nine provinces. The prohibition law of Ontario went into effect in 1917. The system of liquor control was established after the election of 1926.

"Ontario laws permit only government stores to sell liquor. There are 320 stores in various parts of the province including 19 in Toronto. The establishment of these stores, and of liquor as a beverage has greatly increased. The government profit on \$25,000,000 of wine last year was \$10,000,000.

"Such whiskey is sold for \$2.00 a bottle and for \$2.00 a half bottle, which contains 2.5 per cent alcohol. It is dispensed without restrictions and is regarded as a temperance beverage.

"Prohibition as an extensive scale has been wiped out in Ontario. There are still bootleggers but their business consists in small operations, mainly selling of
