

Three Meet Death in Jerome Airplane Accident

Jerome Bowed in Grief Over Triple Tragedy

City Mourns the Sudden Passing of Popular Young Girls and Pilot, Who Were Killed in Plane Crash of Sunday

JEROME, September 20 (Special)—Astonishment for flying over the mountains, the sudden death of Miss Marjorie Estelle Candeo, 22, daughter of Jerome, and her young companion, Ruth Edale Kennedy, 14, their early Sunday evening when the airplane in which they were traveling with Pilot W. Manley Ritchey, crashed at Jerome, Idaho, Sunday morning, Sept. 19, 1930.

Miss Candeo, the only child of Mr. and Mrs. Leon P. Candeo, for the last 15 years residents of Jerome, was a popular member of the younger set of the town, and had been a bridesmaid at the wedding of Miss Ruth Edale Kennedy, one of the most prominent social events of the season. She was a graduate of the Jerome high school and had been employed by Earl Kennedy, father of the other dead girl, as deputy treasurer for the past three years. Miss Candeo was born July 1, 1908, at Kansas, Minnesota, her father, associated with the Northern Idaho.

Ruth Edale Kennedy, a favorite member of the Jerome club, was the daughter of a prominent family in the Jerome high school, who was killed Sunday afternoon. Her father, Mr. and Mrs. Ritchey, for many years residents of Jerome, were killed in a plane crash Sunday morning.

The bodies of the girls and of Pilot Ritchey are now at the Jerome funeral home. Plans for funeral services for Miss Candeo and Miss Kennedy have not been completed.

IDAHO REMAINS DRY
THERE is something ironic to Idahoans in the ruling of Federal Prohibition Director Woodcock which suggests that the making of wine and beer for strictly home use will have the sanction of federal authorities.
As far as Idahoans are concerned, Woodcock could turn wet, the eighteenth amendment could be repealed, the Volstead law could become a pleasant (or an unpleasant!) memory and Hoover and Addison T. Smith could run for reelection on a wet platform, and yet the situation is Idaho as far as law is concerned would be little changed. For Idaho is constitutionally dry and was that way long before the eighteenth amendment went into effect.
Woodcock's rulings in the main do not affect Idaho law which is strict on the subject of manufacture, sale and possession of intoxicating liquor.

THE FIGHT FOR SAFETY
A GENERATION ago the daily get-together of farmers and townspeople around the stove in the country grocery store was one of the most typically American meetings that could be imagined.
Modern America, which has slowly drawn away from that informal gathering, has devised a new meeting which is quite as typical, although not quite so picturesque—the "safety meeting" of the factory hands.
Not long ago this sort of meeting was generally looked on as the work of faddists; a useless wasting of the time of men who might better be working. In recent years, however, the importance of the safety meeting has become generally recognized; and the fact that 7000 safety workers from all parts of the country will convene in Pittsburgh at the end of September testifies to the strides that the safety campaign has made.
It is hardly exaggerating to say that this movement for safety in industry is one of the most important movements of the day. It represents one of the few organized efforts that mankind is making to understand the nature of this mechanical age of ours. We have called immortal machines into being, and we have to live with them for better or worse; but we have devoted remarkably little time to the job of finding out just how we can get along with them without getting hurt.

In the old days there was little need for a safety movement. The factory hand worked in a small shop, and generally used his own tools; if he were not more than ordinarily clumsy—in which case he would not have his job at all—he hardly had a chance of hurting himself.
Today, though, it is different. The worker is surrounded by a multitude of whirlygigs that can grind the life out of him if he is not careful. A moment's inattention can cripple him for life; a bit of carelessness can kill him. The effort to keep from being hurt has to be organized—and it is to the credit of American industry that it has been organized.

Indeed the same sort of thing to a lesser extent, is true outside of the factory as well as in. Mechanical traffic kills 30,000 men, women and children a year. We have to be watchful, even on our more casual errands. Carelessness has become fearfully expensive.
All of this has demonstrated pretty clearly that the machine is not an unmixed blessing. It has been a tremendous boon, in some respects, but it has also raised many new problems. The safety movement is a sincere intelligent attempt to meet some of the worst of the problems that the machine has raised. That is why it deserves country-wide support.

BRIEF YEARS—BUT FULL ONES
RUTH ALEXANDER, the famous young aviator who was killed in a crash the other day, was ill with tuberculosis a few years ago. Doctors told her she had perhaps 12 months more to live; but she laughed at them, went west, regained her health and became a successful and famous flyer.
Now, however, she is gone! and there seems an ironic twist in the fact that sport which helped her shake off disease should finally have killed her. Yet it may be that irony is not quite as sharp as it seems.
After all, if she only gained a few years of life, they were full, active and enjoyable years. If to live intensely is the secret of happiness, Miss Alexander got more from her brief life than some of us who will outlive her by two or three decades.

THE NATION'S BEST WISHES
IT GOES without saying that the whole country joins with President and Mrs. Hoover in wishing a speedy return to robust health for their son, Herbert Hoover, Jr.
Being the son of the president of the United States is something of a handicap for any young man. Like the popular John Coolidge, young Hoover seems to have met the tests with more than the ordinary amount of level-headedness. He has shown himself to be both a capable and likable chap, and a quick recovery over the ill health that has beset him is the wish of his fellow citizens.
