Raging Oklahoma Oil Well Arouses Fears Of Disastrous Blaze

OKLAHOMA CITY, Okla., Oct. 31 (UP)—A wild oil gusher, spouting mist of inflammable oil and gas, threatened this city's wholesale business district today, stopped traffic and imperiled lives. All available city, firemen and expert oil well workers were mustered in to contain the well which emitted thousands of barrels of oil and millions of cubic feet of gas.

The wild well is known as the No. 1 O. E. Stout. It is invaluable to the city because it is located not far from the manufacturing, commercial and railroad property adjacent to the heart of downtown.

The well spewed millions of cubic feet of gas flames plainly visible in the downtown area. Spillages of oil fell upon parked automobiles. Inflammable liquids were sent with an oil mist. Authorities and oil well bosses faced a life-threatening ordeal similar to their today battle when the noted "WILD MA" gusher ran wild at the city limits. There were three injuries in the downtown area, however. The center uncontrolled gusher brought a fire menace unapproached here.

Should there be even a small fire in the area sprayed by oil an explosion and fire would result that would annul the greater wholesale and business section of the city.

Officials said that if the oil flow should stop to decrease the threat to the city would be lessened. The city with gas to shut off all fires in the fire danger zone.

Gas volume was estimated at 60,000 cubic feet daily. The flow of the well would be heard in every section of the city which extends eight miles north of the gusher location.

Webb's legs were cut off just above the ankles. He attempted to ward the train just outside the yard limits, eluded and fell.

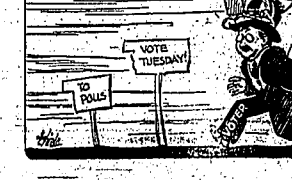

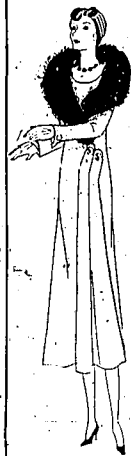

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SCIENTISTS FIND REASON FOR FALL OF ANCIENT CITY

March of Jews Around Jericho Was Intended To Divert Attention From Important Move Say Britishers

LONDON, Oct. 31 (AP)—A British archaeological expedition to Palestine believes it has discovered almost four years later, the real reason why the walls of Jericho fell when Joshua and the invading Israelites finished the seventh day's march around them and sounded the trumpets.

Of sites of excavation on the site of the ancient city have convinced archaeologists that the march of the Jews around the city was merely intended to divert attention from a more important move.

On the seventh day the Jews marched, they believe, Joshua's "Sappers" were busy undermining the walls, placing in holes and crannies trunks of three which were set alight when the signal was given by the shouting and blowing of trumpets on the seventh day.

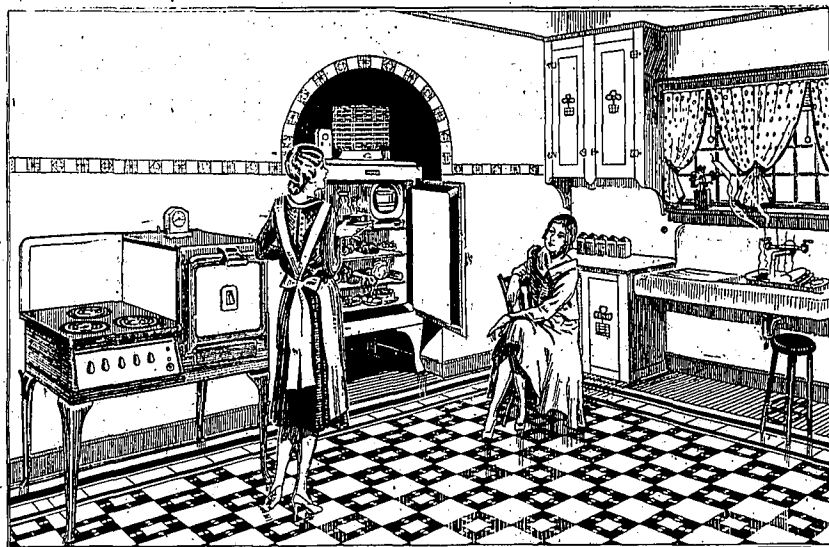
Members of the expedition are certain their discovery will be accepted as reinforcement of the biblical account of Jericho's fall. They claim to have ample evidence that the city was destroyed by fire, as the Bible narrows, along the principal thoroughfare they found reddened bricks, stones cracked by heat, charred timber and ashes.

The excavations showed that Jericho, like many other fortified towns in the east, had two parallel walls surrounding the city. The outer wall was six to eight feet thick. The inner one was 12 feet.

The other wall, almost entirely demolished, appears to have fallen down the slope on which the city was built. One small section of the inner wall, however, was found to be fairly well preserved, standing 10 feet in height.

The discovery of a charred beam underneath one part of the wall gave rise to the theory that the Jewish engineers, and not the trumpeters, were responsible for the conquest of the city.

The excavators hope to continue their work next year and completely explain the fall of Jericho.
