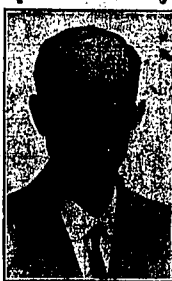

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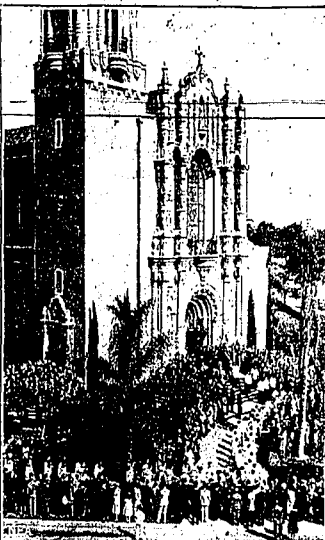

FRANCE ARGUES OVER SLASH IN ARMY SERVICE

PARIS, (UPI)—For the first time since France became a Republic, the period of compulsory service in the army has been reduced from 18 months to a year effective today.

By this law the nation reduces its army to 100,000 men, a drastic cut which has brought criticism from Nationalists who saw a new danger in the growth of the German Reich.

The French government maintains the country does give proof that its desire for peace is stronger than mere words. Since 1928, when the "Economic" military service law was voted, France's military advisers have gone about the task of preparing for the army's reorganization.

German Versailles Idea

It was the former leader of the German Reichwehr, General von Seeck, who gave French strategists the new idea.

"The Allies at Versailles," said General von Seeck, "imposed upon Germany the type of army best adapted to war of the future. A small, mobile army quick to move and quick to strike is more deadly than a ponderous mass of men slow to act."

The military maneuver, carried out by French forces during the summer and autumn on the Italian and German frontiers convinced the French High Command, headed by Marshal of War Andre Macdonald, that the German general

PLAN STUDY OF NEW MALADIES AMONG WORKERS

WASHINGTON, (UPI)—An increasing number of occupational diseases reported by state health officers has led to a demand by the United States Public Health Service for a rigid inquiry to determine the full extent of new industrial hazards.

Growth of industry in the past two decades has vastly increased the health dangers of workers and has added several new types of ailments to the medical catalogue. Present necessity of a careful inquiry for which funds must be obtained from Congress, is emphasized by Dr. L. H. Thompson, chief of research activities for the service.

Conception Needed
It is said such a survey may be undertaken in cooperation with some of the industrial states where health officers are also connected with the health of workers. Connecticut particularly, Dr. Thompson said, has entered a will to assist.

Statistics relating to spread of industrial diseases are incomplete, Dr. Thompson said, because no figures are available showing the number of workers in a particular occupation from year to year. "We have state reports showing the number of occupational diseases each year," he explained, "but we have no figures showing the change in the number employed in various fields. So these figures supply each year to changing groups the size of which is unknown."

Causes Needed
What is needed first is attacking this problem, Dr. Thompson said, is a limited census of industries showing the number of workers in each particular occupation. These figures could then be checked with the disease reports and data of value obtained.

One of the most dreaded of the new industrial diseases is that caused by radium which is now under investigation by the health service. Diseases caused by lead, dusts, paints, chemicals, etc., are also important items in the nation's health problem.

DEMOCRATIC SPELLBINDERS

The frantic efforts which the Democrats have been making to gain control of the national legislative bodies have been concentrated largely upon a capitalization of the depression and there is no doubt that there are many voters who are always willing to listen to such forms of propaganda, absurd as it may seem to thinking persons. But The Statesman reiterates its belief that while the Democrats undoubtedly will gain some seats in both branches, the Republican majority will remain intact.

The time worn admonition of Abraham Lincoln, "Don't swap horses in the middle of the stream," is applicable.

The Democratic campaigners would have us believe that the Republican party is responsible for the country's economic situation. The fact that leading Democratic newspapers, most newspapers, of the Hoover administration, have refused to take this view in itself is a commentary upon the sincerity of Democratic leaders in reaching this gospel, but even if one grants that the campaigners are sincere and really believe themselves that the depression is politically, rather than economically based, it is difficult to see how they can hold out any hope for bettering conditions by electing a congress which would be hostile to the administration and naturally work at cross purposes with it.

There is reason to believe that the backbone of the depression is broken and the measures which President Hoover has taken certainly have been a potent factor in accomplishing it.

Should the unexpected happen and the Democrats gain control of the senate and the house, the Statesman predicts that this country will experience something more than depression, an actual panic, with industry closing for ever for fear the Democratic meddling with the tariff will make conditions many times worse. In other words, all the confidence which business has been building up and which promises an early return to normal conditions will be toppled over with a wave of the hand.

Then this country will really know what "hard times" are!

He advocated conservation of our water resources, to give every farmer a full water right. He urged advertising Idaho's magnificent scenery to attract tourists; he pledged himself to greater development of our highways, particularly our market roads.

"The eastern farmer," said Mr. McMurray, "tired of facing annual droughts, cyclones, blizzards and other freaks of weather, when he learns of the true conditions here, will hurry to dispose of eastern holdings, and come west, to bring new and diversified interests to our farmers, to extend still further the range of our specialty crops in which we already command a premium."

Idaho must look forward to greater growth and greater development. To get these, it must have a constructive building program. If there ever was a time in the history of this state when it needed constructive leadership, it is now.

"A serious problem affecting the whole world is that of unemployment," says Senator McMurray. I do not believe this is a time to advocate curtailment of our normal activities, but to use every effort to restore confidence by a conservative program which will insure steady employment of our laboring classes."

"As a citizen I am glad to lend the weight of my personal influence to cooperate with President Hoover's program. If elected governor, I shall expect to use every facility of the office to alleviate the unemployment situation."

Editor, Idaho Evening Times:
To me, it would seem unfair to the voters of Twin Falls County and to Mr. Parsons, county auditor and candidate for reelection, to deny the public the following information.

In the spring of 1929, the writer was elected Clerk of School District No. 4, commonly known as the Elmwood District. At that time the district had a bonded indebtedness of \$3500. I immediately set about to find out how much money the district had on hand, trying to relieve some of the financial burden.

Every clerk in every district has on file a carbon duplicate of every order ever written, and I was compelled to check back five years to find a starting point, where the County Superintendent's office and my records were in agreement.

At this time, I was repeatedly told by the County Superintendent that their books could not be depended upon, that they were out of balance with the County Treasurer, and in fact could not be depended upon. Finally I suggested in arriving at a balance with the County Treasurer and having the County Superintendent correct the books of that office, in doing this work, the carbon copies of the orders written, were all that was necessary to make a positive check upon the expenditures of the district, to aid the County Superintendent in correcting the books of her office, and most important that all this, to fully protect the funds of Elmwood District.

Every bond has been retired and we wish to emphasize the fact that when "District No. 4" did not lose one cent, although there was always money in the treasury for its credit.

In doing this work, I only did what I feel every clerk of a common school district should have.

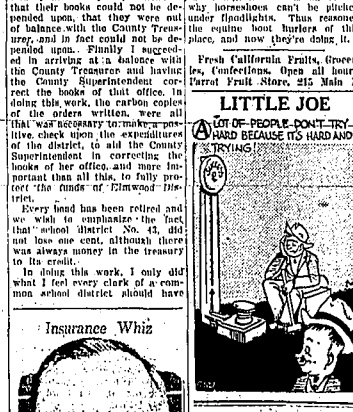

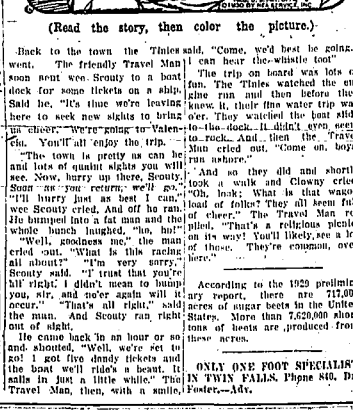

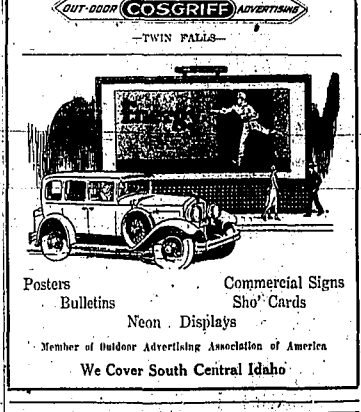
