

LEVINSKY GETS DECISION OVER JIM SLATTERY

Verdict at close of Chicago fight unpopular with the fans; Loser received big ovation in leaving ring.

CHICAGO, Nov. 7 (UPI)—Klez Levinsky, Chicago's promising young boxer, was given a hand-slammed victory over Jimmy Slattery of Buffalo, N. Y., former light-heavyweight champion, to his record today in the ring. Slattery, who paid \$2,500 to see the bout last night in the Gleason stadium, thought he was entitled to a verdict, Levinsky said.

The decision was unanimous. Referee Norman McCarrity, one of the judges, voted for Levinsky, while the other two, Tom Givens and George C. Johnson, voted for Slattery. McCarrity and Givens each gave Levinsky 55 points and Slattery 45. Givens and Johnson gave Levinsky 39.

Levinsky, whom knockout victories over Leo Loukot and Tom Klem have made him a big favorite here, received a standing ovation from the crowd when he left the ring. The crowd gave Slattery a great round of applause.

Game and willing, but hardly dominating, Levinsky was a master boxer. Levinsky was at the mercy of Slattery's stinging lefts.

Most of the fight, through the first five rounds, Levinsky had the better of it. Slattery ducked, dodged, punched him off balance and jabbed him constantly with a straight left. Slattery won four of the first five rounds.

Levinsky made a strong bid for a knockout in the sixth round with a two-fisted attack to the head. The bell, however, saved Slattery as he was bucked against the ropes over one corner, sprang to his feet and cut a gash in his mouth and bleeding from cuts about the mouth and face.

Always boring in the Gleason stadium, Slattery made up the last four rounds with more misses than hits, though he never lost his cool or his nerve.






