SWINDELE

The stress of winter and of economic conditions is creating a myriad of unusual social difficulties from which this community will not be entirely free. Reference is made specifically to that element of society which, confronted with want, either real or imagined, and out of work either through choice or necessity, will seek to subsist through theft, shoplifting, forgery, burglary, hold-up, chicanery, bribery or some of the new forms of racketeering which humans have adopted.

To avert the usual methods of those with criminal or theft instincts, the customary methods of precaution exist, but it is the swindler, the high-powered promotional schemer and the fast-talker with his modified racket, against which the public must just as scrupulously guard itself.

From Idaho Falls comes evidence of one of these new-fangled methods of extortion which may be attempted at any time in other communities. The Times Register of Idaho Falls describes this particular racket as follows:

Eight Idaho Falls boys were swindled out of \$10 each in attempting to secure employment it was learned by police. A man giving the name of B. F. Evans, according to the police, promised the boys work on a Utah Power & Light dam project and coerced them into paying fees to join the "union." He disappeared from his hotel quarters here and is being sought on charges of collecting money on false pretenses.

Discovery of the unemployment "gyp" game followed a report to police headquarters that such a "racket" had been worked recently in Pocatello. Officers, hastening to prevent the swindler from plying his trade in Idaho Falls, discovered that the man had already collected \$80 in illicit fees deposited.

Boys victimized by the fraudulent representative of the power company are said to be in difficult financial condition and could ill afford to lose the fees paid.

This is an example of to what lengths the unscrupulous will go, and is detailed here as a precautionary warning to the public at large to avoid becoming the victims of such schemes and in an effort to discourage their perpetration on innocent victims here or elsewhere.

The cautious will not only lock their doors and safes, but they will guard themselves against the wiles of disguised crooks with equal persistency.

**FIRE EQUIPMENT
IS SATISFACTORY**

New Fire Engine Passes Idaho Rating Tests; Officials of Other Towns are Present

SHOSHONE, Nov. 14. (Special) — O. W. Funchuk, its representative in the Idaho State Fair, was present to take the official test on the new fire fighting equipment recently purchased by the board of trustees of this village.

There was also present for the test, Chief Marquette of the Pocatello Fire Department, the chief of the Shoshone Fire Department, Earl E. Albrecht, a factory representative of the Shoshone Fire Department, and the mayor and councilmen of Shoshone.

The test consisted of the following requirements: 1st, pumping the machine from draft for two hours at its rated capacity of 125 pounds pump pressure; 2nd, pumping one-half the machine's rated capacity at 200 pounds pump pressure; 3rd, pumping at one-half rated capacity at 250 pounds pump pressure for one-half hour.

The machine, built by the F. W. Faneckel Co. for the Idaho State Fair, was approved by him for the Idaho State Fair.

The tests were conducted at the Shoshone Fair Grounds under the direction of Earl E. Albrecht, a factory representative.

The machine is a type 60, powered by a 95 horsepower engine, equipped with an American-France Rotary Gear Pump, and in connection with a 60-ton pump tank.

The pump tank has a hose capacity of twelve hundred feet of two and one-half inch hose.

The equipment is mounted on a bright red trailer with yellow and white, and equipped with siren and powerful search light with the usual main port holes, hose ports, extension ladders, and other regulation fire fighting equipment.

The price is \$1,500.

The board of trustees of the village met at 7:30 o'clock after the test, and made final acceptance of the new equipment.

Mr. Albrecht has been in Shoshone for several days past, telling and instructing the members of the Shoshone Fire Department in the handling of the new equipment.

It is expected that the new equipment, recently installed in connection with the fire fighting apparatus, will result in a material reduction of fire insurance rates in the village.
