## SPAIN'S CAPITAL BACK TO NORMAL AFTER UPRISINGS

Heavy Police Guard Ever Vigilant for Renewal of the Trouble; Scores of Agitators Are Placed Under Arrest

MADRID, Spain, Nov. 19 (UPI)—Spain's police guards armed with rifles and supported by concentrations of civil guards returned the capital's business to normal yesterday after demonstrators sought to continue a general strike and labor disorders.

Madrid police arrested more than three thousand agitators, including Communists and certain other persons suspected of plotting new disturbances in connection with general strikes and disorders which started in Madrid last Friday and spread to other Spanish cities.

**Limited to Factories**  
The general strike at Barcelona was limited to factories, workshops and building yards, but workers there this afternoon, with the rest of the great industrial city comparatively normal after days of rioting in which four persons were killed and scores hurt.

At Seville a strike was called in sympathy with the Madrid and Barcelona strikes, which originally had been called by Madrid workers demands for greater safety laws. Disorders accompanied the start of the Seville strike, but were buffered off in the city.

Similar strikes were in effect in various other cities, including Alcalá de Henares, Reus, Valencia, Málaga and Zaragoza.

**Take Precautions**

Auditoriums in Madrid took extraordinary precautions, including removal of disorderly by agitators, calling civil guard reinforcements from the provinces.

Strikes were declared at Cuenca, where 200 railroad workers walked out, and at Zaragoza and Coria.

## CONDUCT SEARCH FOR LOST PLANE

Systematic Hunt Going on for Craft That Vanished While Enroute From Los Angeles

LOS ANGELES, Nov. 19 (UPI)—Aircraft from all over southern California and Nevada are engaged in a systematic search over the Tehachapi mountains for a trace of the Pacific Air Transport plane that disappeared suddenly morning while enroute from San Jose to San Francisco.

Planes were sent from Bakersfield, Burbank, Los Angeles and San Francisco, and the hunt is being conducted in the general vicinity of the rugged territory around Lemoore on the Ridge Route road.

It was reported yesterday that at least 15 ships were ailing in the search today. The territory was blocked off in sections, and aircraft were scattered to thoroughly cover one district.

## STATES MOVE TO AID UNEMPLOYED

Utah and Idaho Officials are Busy Engaged in Working Out Some Feasible Plans

SALT LAKE CITY, Nov. 19 (UPI)—Capitals of Utah and Idaho were busily engaged today in working out feasible and effective methods to aid the unemployed.

The best method established by the unemployment bureau whose objective is to register all unemployed persons and to assist them in finding work. The situation in Idaho is by no means as serious as other western states. Good crops in the fall have helped to keep the market which is proving an excellent balance during the period of national depression.

Even so the number of unemployed is increasing as the season advances. This has been caused somewhat by the end of the harvest season and the beginning of winter activities.

In Utah, on the other hand, the situation is more acute. The unemployment relief machinery is not yet fully developed and the time and various ingenious methods of alleviating distress have been advanced.

The latest step taken indicates that the state will improve its fund by which it is bound to provide wages of \$1,000 daily.





# HOOVER OFFERS CENSUS FIGURES

Official Compilation Shows Changes in Personnel of the House of Representatives

**WASHINGTON.** Nov. 19 (UPI)—President Hoover Tuesday officially announced the results of the 1930 national census as it affects representation in Congress in the House of Representatives.

Outstanding gains were made by California which will have nine more members in the House, by Michigan with four more and by Texas with three.

Mr. Hoover said the official figures certified to him by the census bureau did not differ materially from the informal estimates made in recent months.

The changes in representation cause certain states to lose 23 seats in the House, which are, of course, added to those of other states.

The President announced that the census showed the population of the United States, excluding the District of Columbia, and various territories and possessions, to be 121,422,737.

The official table of gains and losses of congressmen by state, which Mr. Hoover will present to Congress follows:
