

LUKENS PROPOSES LAW TO LICENSE DRIVERS OF CARS

Plans for Advanced Measure
Outlined by Idaho's Secre-
tary of State; Revenue
Would be About \$150,000.

BOISE, Nov. 20.—Plans to demand a license for drivers of cars, and to license the licensees, are being introduced by the Idaho legislature, according to the secretary of state, according to the secretary of state and commissioner of the highway fund.

The proposed law advanced by Lukens would provide for licensing drivers every three years, and would make the license subject to revocation for major traffic offenses. Cost of the license would be one dollar per person, and revenue from this source would amount to about \$150,000. It is estimated. With this money, Lukens points out, the highway patrol system could be strengthened, and an additional fund would be available for the highway fund or the general fund.

It has been known that Lukens has advocated a measure licensing auto drivers, so his announcement that he would present such a bill to the legislature came as no surprise.

With this revenue coming to the department, he said, he would request that all auto drivers, including taxicabs and street cars, be licensed. The highway fund is now being used for the support of the traffic patrol. This income has supported the patrol to the extent of \$150,000, and Lukens said, most of the \$150,000 appropriated from the highway fund for the last year has been returned to the fund in the case of the present bill.

Secretary Lukens said he would present the people of the state a measure to license drivers of cars.
