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WOMAN BLAMES DRY FAILURE ON WEALTHY PEOPLE

HOUSTON, Tex., Nov. 20 (UPI) — Wealthy persons are responsible for the failure to prohibit enforcement, Mrs. R. Leigh Calvin, president of the Women's Christian Temperance Union, said at the annual convention here for the National W. C. T. U. convention, believes.

Poor people she said in an interview today, are much better protected than the wealthy.

"All this so-called sentiment against prohibition is propaganda, for the most part," Mrs. Calvin said.

"Wealthy enough of prohibition are financial. And when millions are contributing more than half the money being spent to finance anti-prohibition work."

"They want the eighteenth amendment repealed because it would grow richer through the alcohol business."

"The wealthy class constitutes the most frequent dry law violators. They are the greatest consumers—but it is the thing to disregard the eighteenth amendment and to have their colleagues boasting around them, that does not make no effort to keep their children from drinking."

"The people of moderate means, though, are great prohibitionists. You don't hear of any more 'Little Mondays' in the industry like when workers were laid off from work because of dry laws."

"The laboring man usually sober now. You don't find him sprawled in a drunken stupor on the streets or drunk in a barroom."

"But go into a fashionable hotel and see what you find. There's where you'll find them, I can assure you."

Mrs. Calvin said her latest reports that in recent elections the wets had achieved great victories.

"It was not a wet victory," she said. "It was a loss for us. The Negroes of the outlying dry districts were defeated. Some of those who were defeated were our attitude toward prohibition was not that of the stalwart dry."


