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He'll Preside WAGNER ADVISES EARLY ADOPTION OF RELIEF BILLS

New York Democratic Senator Believes Measures Insufficient But Advocates Passage as Soon as Possible

WASHINGTON, Dec. 11 (UP)—The democratic assault on President Hoover's relief program continued in congress today. It was started, however, not by such virile opponents as were heard in the senate yesterday, but by a measured plea by Senator Robert F. Wagner, Democrat, New York, for speedy enactment of the bills designed to afford permanent unemployment relief. These bills have been passed by the Senate, but are held up in the House.

"I am sure," said Washington, "that the administration, clutched by the last straw, will not resist the passage of these bills. Tomorrow, tomorrow, it is too soon to say today."

Wagner emphasized that he was not opposed to the pending bills for immediate relief, but felt they were not sufficient to meet the needs of the unemployed.

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CITY OF ROCKS ROAD PROPOSED

Oakley Valley Commercial Club Suggests Building of Highway to Scenic Spot

OAKLEY, Dec. 10 (Special).—A City of Rocks highway leading from U. S. Highway 30, south, at Streetville, City of Rocks, Oakley, to the Old Oregon Trail, is the suggestion placed before the Idaho council of defense (December 4) by the Oakley Valley commercial club. The project would open up to the public one of the state's scenic and historic monuments, and shorten the distance between southwestern Idaho and Utah and parts of Nevada.

The building of the highway would increase the number of Idaho's scenic vistas according to officials of the Oakley organization. City of Rocks resembles somewhat the ruins of a medieval city. With towers, spires, gables, domes, granite boulders vary in size from those of a few feet to those of a hundred feet. The towers are in the form of statues. Some faces have been found which bear a striking resemblance to particular individuals, while others look like grotesque figures from a nightmare.

Some of the large rocks, from a hundred to two hundred feet high, can be climbed. On top of one of these boulders, which is known as a deposition, ten feet square which holds rain water.

Much of the granite is soft, and various kinds of arches, bridges, porches, alcoves and rooms have been chiseled out by the weather. The city is so arranged that a person can find shelter without recourse to tents. Some of the rock towers were used as fortresses by early settlers in encounters with Indians. No poisonous snakes have been found in the city of Rocks.

The Old Emigrant Trail, grassy through one end of City of Rocks and along a large portion of the proposed route to Streetville, may be reached on the way to the city of California where the name of the granite. Dates as early as 1849 are still visible. J. M. Murphy, who visited the place in 1874 and wrote a book on his adventures, said that in 1874 no dates inter than 1870 appeared on the rocks—travelers after that year journeyed by rail.

Indian Grove, situated on a hill two miles above the rock city, was an old-time rendezvous of Red Indians from this place of various kept watch toward Streetville for approaching bands of emigrants. That the marauders were sometimes successful in their depredations is evidenced by the fact that even to this day campers in Indian territory occasionally die of rufes of lost taken from emigrant trails.

The Oakley club expressed appreciation of the support given the proposed "highway" by newspapers in Twin Falls, Burley and Brigham. It is considered possible that Idaho and Utah may cooperate in the project, since it is recognized that a bill will be introduced in the Utah legislature providing for a state highway to the Great Creek region. That the best outlet of the Great Creek region to the Utah cities is by way of the Utah-Idaho border along the proposed city of Rocks route is the belief of many. This outlet would give easy access to the town of southern Idaho as well as to the Utah cities. The line probably would be extended from the Snake Creek through Elgin, Tish, to Monticello, Nevada.

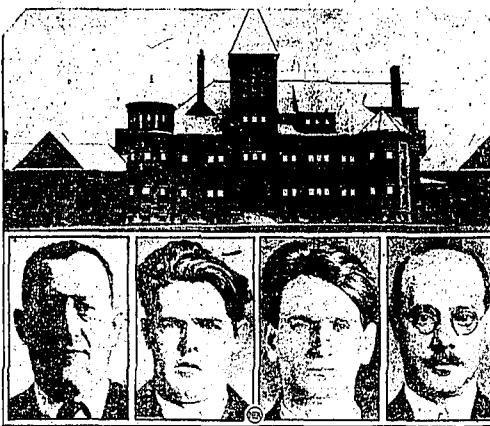

POTATO MARKET FALLS HEAVILY LAST FEW DAYS

Idaho Loadings Continue Liberal, However, in Spite of Low Prices; Maine Greatest Shipper During Week

IDAHO FALLS, Dec. 11.—The potato market was weak and "drizzly" all last week, shipping being slow during the past few days and prices had declined to the lowest point of the current season. Shipments and loadings were very light, inquiry from outside buyers was so thin, rather than buying because of the season of the moment.

Idaho loadings continued liberal in spite of the low price. The state shipped 82 cars to market last week, of which 41 cars were loaded at lower valley points, 20 at lower valley stations and 2 in the Boise valley. Early this week loadings were largely from warehouses, due to the fact that cold weather interfered with hauling from the farms.

Maine was the heaviest shipper of potatoes again last week, forwarding 144 cars to market. Movement for the entire country averaged 64 cars daily except Sunday, holding well in line with last year's movement at this time. Shipments from the Lake States and from Washington have been very light this fall, but Idaho, Colorado and California have shipped in greater volume than last year. So far, the corn markets have been somewhat over-supplied.

Cash prices were very poor early this week at Idaho shipping points. The upper valley reported sales ranging from 10 to 15¢, loaded cars of number one Russets. Buyers were generally offering around 10¢ on Tuesday. The lower valley was selling around 6¢ at the opening of the week with ordinary stock at 4¢. The market had an established price of 10¢ on Monday, demand being exceptionally slow. Bulk prices paid to farmers for Russets were the lowest of the season. Dealers were generally offering 40¢ to 45¢ cash for number ones and around 25¢ or less for number twos. Between the cold weather and the low price, haulages from the farms became very limited.

In the lower valley of Idaho cash trading came almost to a standstill over the last week-end. Dealers were generally offering 30¢ to 35¢ cash to growers for loaded cars of number one Russets. Number twos were quoted around 20¢ on the same basis. Loadings became very light on Monday, both the price and the weather restricting a free movement. Potatoes packed in warehouses at lower valley points usually brought around 10¢ to 15¢ cash track while number twos sold around 6¢ with an occasional car highest. Dealers reported that the bulk of the loadings in that territory were being consigned or rolled for delivered sales.

Colorado reported a declining market early this week, along with Nebraska, Washington and Maine. Trading was very limited in the Lake States so that prices were hardly established but the market was generally dull to weak in that section of the country also. The Chicago market showed no change Tuesday but Los Angeles was very weak with deliveries rising on Monday. Business generally middling around \$1.50 on number ones and \$1.00 on number twos.
