JUDGE DECLARES AMERICA'S DUTY IN LAW IS INVOLVED

Eighteenth Amendment properly Ratified Hoist At Newark, N. J. Decision at Close of

NEWARK, N. J., Dec. 17. (UP)—The eighteenth amendment to the United States constitution has been held invalid by United States District Judge Charles Clark on the ground that it was improperly ratified.

The decision, which will no eventually to the United States Supreme court, is based on article 5 of the constitution—the amendment article—which provides, in the opinion of Judge Clark, that any transfer of power from the individual states to the federal government cannot be ratified by constitutional convention rather than the state legislatures.

New Question
Judge Clark held that the question covered by his decision was entirely a new one, and that the same as the one involved in the so-called national prohibition cases of 1920, when the United States amendment was upheld by the supreme court.

In these cases, he said, in a summary of his decision, "the court was considering the constitutionality of the subject matter of the amendment, and was not asked to concern itself with the manner in which it was adopted."

The case on which Judge Clark ruled was that of William S. Gray, a farmer of Wantage, Sussex county, N. J., who had been indicted on a charge of transporting and selling beer. The case was defended by prominent counsel of New York City, who argued that the amendment was not in force in New Jersey, and that the case should be dismissed.

In order to make a test case of it, the decision however, will not affect the present status of federal prohibition enforcement in New Jersey. Judge Clark said since 1920, he has not heard of any other case in which the amendment was held invalid.

The government will, of course, appeal the decision. Meanwhile, as I understand it, no other judge in the United States nor the judges of this district are bound by his opinion, and therefore the enforcement of the Volstead act will continue in New Jersey until the remaining three judges in this bench all decide in agreement with Judge Clark or until a decision of the higher court is reached upon this opinion.

HOISE, Dec. 17.—Resolutions adopted at a committee meeting of Mayor James M. CANAL PROJECT MOST FINISHED

From a recent report of Engineer E. L. Darlington, of Burley, regarding the progress that has been made up to December 1, the construction of the Milner-Shoshone canal which will bring Snake river water to the Gooding district and adjacent sections, it is revealed that less than 10 percent of the work is yet to be done.

Says the report, which was sent to U. S. Reclamation, secretary, American Falls Reclamation district No. 2 at Gooding:

"Analysis of the estimates shows that excavation of all classes of material has reached the 6,000,000 yard mark. About 30 per cent of the excavation has been rock.

"The canal is now 21.5 per cent completed down to Little Wood river. All work under contract of Burden Construction company, Winston Brothers company and the John Phillips company, has been accepted and released. The upper contract of Mitty Brothers company is now approximately 77 per cent completed. The lower contract, consisting of six schedules, covered about 80 miles of the canal, is 86 per cent completed, with only 77 per cent of the time elapsed.

"Puddling of rock cuts and tamping of embankments has mostly by snow and cold weather, but encouraging progress is being made on this work. A drizzle working a string of steel has been carrying on in engineering dump trucks, is now employed in supplying earth for sealing the canal against seepage losses."

"Authority has been received to start surveys for the new line distributing system in seven lands which will be handled by the engineers without water rights. The forces at Eden and Shoshone which heretofore have been busy occupied on directing construction activities."

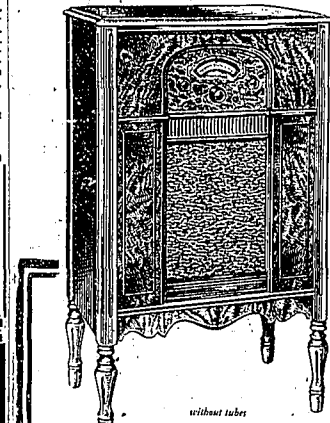

DEMOCRATS AND INDEPENDENTS RESUME ATTACK

Battle Against Administration Continues While Relief Measures Are Studied in the Committee Rooms of Capitol

WASHINGTON, Dec. 17 (UP)—Democrats and Western hungry in congress resumed their barrage against the administration Tuesday, while unemployment and drought relief measures languished in committee rooms.

Senator Shipstead, F. L. Munn, declared the administration relief program and charred President Hoover was "illuminating" against "generous" measures to aid the hungry and jobless.

In the House, Democratic Leader Garner made a scathing attack on Secretary of Treasury Mellon, charging he had concealed the true extent of tax refunds in corporations during the last fiscal year.

Rep. McFadden, Rep. Pa. chairman of the House banking committee, assailed President Hoover's appointment of Eugene Meyer Jr., 30-year governor of the Federal reserve board. McFadden said Meyer was indirectly associated with J. P. Morgan and company, and "there's not any doubt the reserve board is playing with these international interests."

Senator Wagner, Dem. N. Y.

a leader in unemployment relief efforts, asked an amendment to the bill to determine why bread prices had not decreased proportionately with wheat.

Meanwhile the emergency relief bills on which congress began work nearly three weeks ago still were tied up in committees. 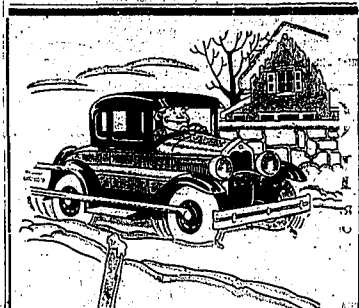

MINOR LEAGUE CZAR BECOMES A POSSIBILITY

Magnates Differ as to Need
For Man to Rule Over Les-
ser Baseball Circuits as Pro-
posed by Dr. C. H. Straub

LOS ANGELES, Dec. 17. (UP)—A czar of the minor leagues in rule over the three Class AA circuits looms as a possibility as an aftermath of recent trade between the majors and the minors.

Dr. Charles H. Straub, president of the San Francisco club, is one of the leading advocates for a commissioner to guide the Pacific Coast league, American association and International league much after the capacity that Judge K. M. Landis served organized baseball since the "black Sox" scandal of 1919.

Minor league baseball men generally agree that they will have to hand together more closely than ever if they are to survive any kind of a fight with the majors.

J. M. Patrick, president of the Los Angeles club, for one, believes that it is suicide for the minors to engage in a war with the majors.

We need the majors more than they need us," said Patrick. "Without the draft the three big minors cannot hope to maintain their high standard of play."

Dr. Straub takes the opposite view that the three Class AA leagues can develop and train their players and in the time rival the major leagues in playing strength.

Among those mentioned in connection with the establishment of a commissioner for the three big minors is William H. McGraw, senior president of the Pacific Coast league.

William Wrigley, Jr., owner of the Chicago Cubs and Los Angeles Angels, regrets the whole controversy between the Majors and the minors.

"Baseball is too wholesome to be kicked around by this kind of arguments. There's nothing too much politics in baseball anyway, especially the Coast league."

Despite the breach between the majors and minors, Wrigley says that he will not allow it to prevent him from completing the deal whereby Los Angeles will receive nine players for Fletcher, Ted Busch, the top man of the minors sought by the Cubs.

"I'm willing to abide by any ruling made by the majority," commented Wrigley, "but draft or no draft I intend to complete the deal for Busch."

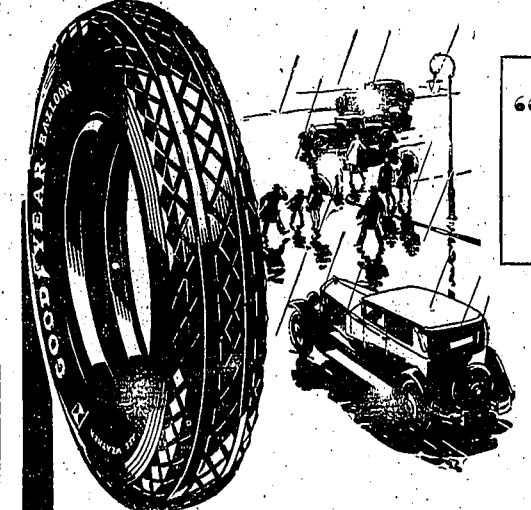
