Men have swung back to the good old card sweater and this seems to have the edge on pullovers.

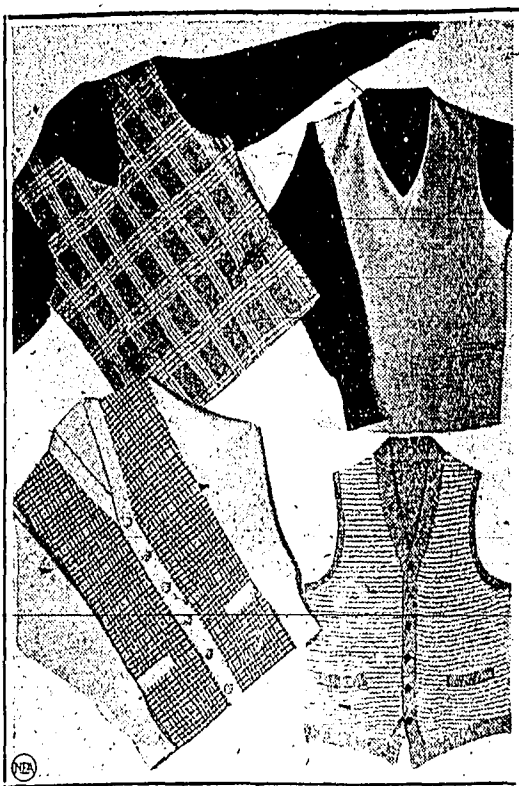

1939 Model of New York Fair Shown

NEW YORK (AP)—A model of the 1939 New York world's fair has been placed on view in the New York museum of science and industry, showing buildings, streets, roadways, communication facilities, and landscaping in miniature, as they will appear, bird's-eye view, when the fair opens.

How sunken gardens, artificial lakes, modern structures will be erected in what was an open meadow is indicated by the model. Highway, railroad and highway facilities are shown and tiny trees and flags mark the plan of the fair grounds in the site near Flushing, L. I., with all avenues leading to the lofty central building.

The Great Seal of the United States was proposed and designed by William Barton in 1782. It is composed of a spread eagle, symbolizing strength, bearing an escutcheon with 13 stripes for the 13 original states. Its right talor holds an olive branch and its left 13 arrows.

Looking For Job? Secure Card Now At U. S. Service

Many Calls Each Year, Says Director; One Lady Even Applies for Husband

Because of the wide range of positions the service is called upon to fill, and because of the many projects scheduled to get underway in Idaho next spring, Ray Butler, manager of the United States employment service, today urged all interested persons to secure registration cards as soon as possible.

"During the course of a year," Mr. Butler said, "we have not only been called upon to fill hundreds of positions in our district, which is composed of nine southern central counties, but also to fill requests from other districts as well as other states."

One Wanted Husband! "Hundreds of requests for workers have poured in upon the local office since the service first started," he said. "One woman even had in a standing request for a husband and another young girl, a stranger in Twin Falls, asked us to supply an escort for her and said she would pay all expenses. We supplied the young man and his expenses were paid by the girl."

At the present time women registrations are badly needed. Mr. Butler points out, especially among those trained in housekeeping.

Butler urges all unemployed who have not already done so to secure registration cards, which are free of charge. He also issues a call for trained workers in various lines, or for those who are already employed but would better themselves by securing other positions, which they are capable to fill.



For the second successive day Tuesday, the mercury in Twin Falls failed to go below the zero mark, the official readings of the bureau of entomology show.

Roads Being Opened Hollister and Amsterdam side roads were being opened this afternoon by Twin Falls highway district plows.

Portions of the side roads in the Kimberly-Hansen district were still blocked today from recent blizzards, but traffic was not being delayed as a large majority of the roads were open.

Plow Has Trouble The large plow of the highway district, which developed transmission trouble south of Twin Falls last night, was expected to be in service again this afternoon.

In Twin Falls today streets were slushy as top snow started to melt under a bright sun.

NINE MILLION ROSES TYLER, Tex. (U.P.)—Nine million new rose plants—enough for a continuous rose fence around the United States with bushes set two feet apart—will be produced this year in an area within 15 miles of Tyler, through protection of the growing plants from disease by sulphur spraying.

Water Pipes Can Still Freeze Up, So Take Caution

Moderation of the weather is no reason for citizens of the city to believe their water pipes will not freeze, city water officials said here today.

Although moderate weather exists above the ground, they pointed out, one foot under the ground the temperature is still low and the ground frozen solid.

During the recent cold snap the city department was called upon to thaw out many pipes and replace some broken water meters.

LEEVE ADDITION BUILT IN CAIRO

Two Thousand Men Put 3 Foot Top Wall on Banks Of Two Rivers

(Copyright, 1937, United Press) CAIRO, Ill., Jan. 27 (U.P.)—Two thousand men, who toiled through the frosty night to save their homes completed at dawn today a three-foot addition to the Cairo levee.

They three-mile concrete wedge which protects this city of 14,000 on the one side from the Ohio and on the other from the Mississippi now stands 63 feet high.

Dynamiting Helps Even if the flood waters spill over the rim into the city, it was believed only the lower floors of buildings would be flooded.

White and Negro labored side by side on top of the levee all night to erect an earthen barrier. It was a city entirely of men. The women, the children, the crippled, the aged had been removed under the supervision of Gov. Henry Horner during the past few days.

The bulkheads were built by filling earth between boards fastened together on top of the concrete levee. It was tedious hand labor.

EVANSVILLE, Ind., Jan. 27 (U.P.)—Completing a long list of official flood emergency announcements, the radio and nouncer at an Evansville station said:

"That clears up the flood information for the moment. We will now play some music."

"A moment later the strains of 'The Beautiful Ohio' floated over the air.
