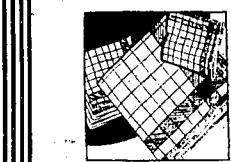

LABOR CHIEFTAIN AGAINST CHANGES

Defeat Seen For American Federation in Stand By Secretary

WASHINGTON, May 5 (UP)—Secretary of Labor Frances Perkins today announced her opposition to amendments to the Wagner labor relations act until it has had a chance to work.

Miss Perkins explained her position at the close of the second of a series of capital-labor conferences called to discuss collective bargaining procedure under the law. She set another meeting for next week. "I would like to see whether any injustices are done under the act before I think it would be wise to take steps to change it," she said.

Miss Perkins said the changes she opposes include the Walsh amendment to grant craft unions the mandatory right to bargain for their own members in instances where they are in the minority.

With work of fingerprinting students at the Lincoln grade school nearly completed, preparations were being made today to start the work at the junior high school and also at the Bickel school probably Friday of this week. It was announced this afternoon by Paul Gilman, chairman of the Junior Chamber of Commerce committee which is sponsoring the program.

Before fingerprints are taken, each student takes home a slip which seeks the parents' permission in the matter. The slip explains that the "prints" will be valuable in establishing identification in case of accident or kidnaping.

Filed in Washington
Once taken, the fingerprints are detached to the department of justice in Washington, D. C., where they are filed for identification purposes only.

Because of the nearness of the closing of school for the summer, two additional girls working under the National Youth administration, will be assigned to the work, supplementing the staff of four engaged in the work at present. Those working on the project include Thelma Moss, Laura Hampton, Irma Jean Ainsworth and Emma Jean Ainsworth.

At High School
During the time the junior high school students are having fingerprints taken it is also anticipated that senior high students will be "printed." Following completion of the two high schools and the Bickel, the work will start at the Washington, Mr. Gilman said.

It is expected that between 82 and 95 per cent of the parents and guardians will give permission to have their children fingerprinted.
