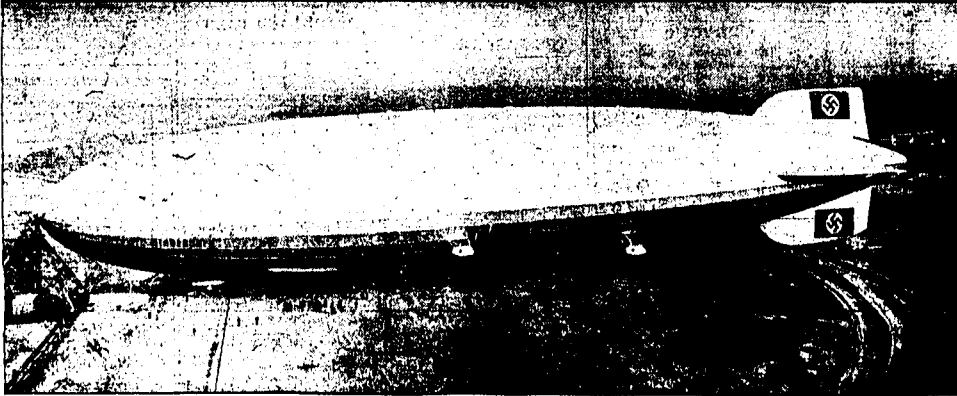

GUN LOOKED FOR IN TAYLOR CASE

15-Year-Old Mystery May Be Solved if Vital Clue Is Found

LOS ANGELES, May 7 (UP)—The re-opened investigation of the 15-year-old William Desmond Taylor murder shifted to the rural city of Santa Barbara, Calif., where investigators sought a pearl-handled revolver.

Mrs. Charlotte Shelby, mother of Mary Miles Minter, admittedly received the revolver as a gift from a Santa Barbara jeweler, she testified yesterday before the grand jury that the revolver was in her possession at the time Taylor, noted film director, was slain.

Deputy District Attorney Eugene D. Williams, in charge of the investigation, declared the gun, missing 15 years, is expected to prove an important clue in the inquiry if it can be located.

During Mrs. Shelby's testimony before the grand jury, which was preceded by that of her two daughters, Miss Minter and Mrs. Margaret Pillsbury, the mother recalled that she had the gun in her possession at the time of the Taylor shooting but did not recall what happened to it afterwards.

GERMANY PLANS OFFICIAL PROBE OF SHIP'S LOSS

Commission Starts For New York to Investigate Cause of Mishap

By FREDERICK C. OESCHNER BERLIN, May 7 (UP)—An official investigating commission started for New York today while Germans mourned the loss of their dirigible Hindenburg as a national disaster, and pledged themselves to keep their flag flying on new and better airships.

Representatives of the air ministry, the air research bureau and the Zeppelin companies left Vienna by airplane for Bremerhaven, to sail in the liner Europa for New York and investigate the explosion which wrecked the Hindenburg.

The Hugo Eckener, chief of the Zeppelin companies, left Vienna by automobile for Berlin to see government leaders.

The air ministry said that he probably would fly on to Cherbourg, France, and board the Europa tomorrow to accompany the official commission.

Prepare Proclamation

Berlin, May 7 (UP)—The German people which was expected to urge the donation of money to build a new ship similar to the national disaster after the Hindenburg catastrophe in 1936.

Carry on Plans

Zeppelin authorities said they were determined to carry through their present South American schedule with the Graf Zeppelin, as well as to continue construction of new airships. Der Angreif announced that dozens of contributions already have been sent to the charity during the day, earmarked for a ship to succeed to Hindenburg.

Eckener Hints at Possible Sabotage

EXPLOSION RIPS AIRCRAFT AS LANDING IS ATTEMPTED

NAVAL-AIR STATION, LAKEHURST, N. J., May 7 (UP)—The skeleton of the dirigible Hindenburg late today yielded the bodies of two more victims, one a woman. Both were burned in the explosion and fire that wrecked the German airliner at dusk yesterday, and brought the toll to 32 dead or unaccounted for.

Ship Insured

LONDON, May 7 (UP)—Insurance experts estimated today that the disaster to the Hindenburg would cost insurance companies 750,000 pounds sterling (\$2,750,000), spread among British, American, German and other companies. The Hindenburg hull alone was insured for 6,000,000 marks (\$2,400,000), covering all contingencies.

Other developments today: In Washington the senate military affairs committee decided to report favorably a bill designed to tighten federal control over helium, non-inflammable gas for dirigibles. The United States has a monopoly on the gas and none may be sent out of the country without the consent of the president.

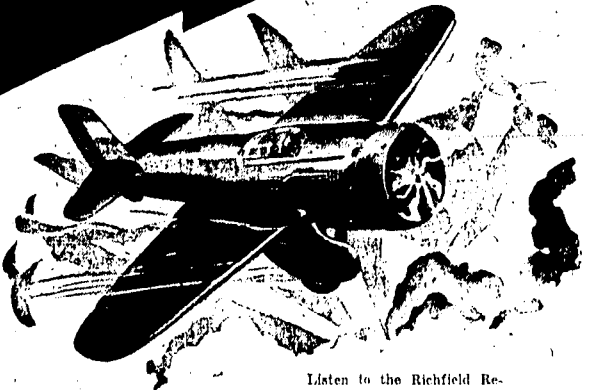

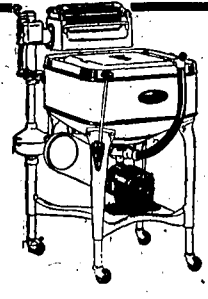

ACCIDENT-PREVENTION CAMPAIGN PLANNED IN COUNTY

HEALTH UNIT TO LAUNCH GENERAL SAFETY EFFORTS

Auto, Pedestrian, Household Stress Planned; Meeting Set For Tuesday

For the next month the prevention of accidents, not only in automobiles but among pedestrians and in the home as well, will be impressed upon the minds of citizens of Twin Falls county through efforts of the county health unit in sponsoring a county-wide safety campaign. It was announced this afternoon by Dr. J. W. Hawkins, director.

Thousands of booklets and pieces of literature along safety lines will be distributed throughout the schools, Dr. Hawkins said. Students will be asked to take the literature home and give it to their parents or guardians.

Another feature of the drive will be a mass safety meeting which will be held at the Chamber of Commerce meeting rooms in Twin Falls Tuesday afternoon. The meeting arrangements are being made by speakers representing the engineering aspects of road safety; police officers of law both from the state and local standpoint; the medical aspect of a driver's examinations and the personal aspect of the driver as explained by a physician; and the psychological aspect of the driver.

Safety moving pictures will also feature the Tuesday meeting which will be open to the public, Dr. Hawkins said.

The literature which will be distributed through the schools will deal with safe driving, prevention of pedestrian accidents and accident prevention in the homes.

Give Out Booklets

Booklets to be distributed will include "The Real Driver's Logbook," "Check Your Car," and "Culling All Drivers," being a guide to better motoring. These booklets were donated for distribution in the campaign through J. M. Pahan, representative of the Metropolitan Life Insurance company and also through the home office of the John Hancock Mutual Life Insurance company, their booklet being "Picture Yourself as a Safe Driver."

At the opening meeting summaries will be given on factors considered to be the cause of accidents, such summaries being prepared by leading authorities on the subject.

In connection with driving and safety education in the schools, Dr. Hawkins today was high in praise of the program being carried on in the Twin Falls junior high school under the direction of Mrs. Vera Co. O'Leary, principal.

"It would be well if such a course of study along safety lines could be introduced, or better yet required, in all schools. Many of the larger high schools in the United States, realizing the necessity of such a course, require all students to complete a program in automobile driving which teaches them all of the good, safe driving methods."

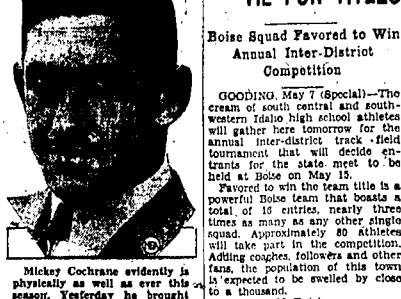

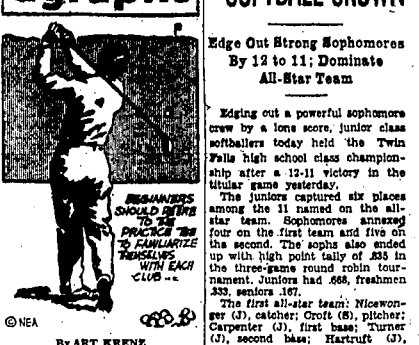

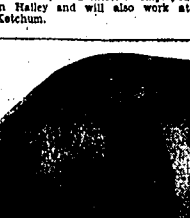

LONDON, May 7 (U.P.)—Dr. Hugo Eckener was quoted by the Evening Standard today as saying he believed that sabotage was the probable cause of the wreck of the Hindenburg.

It is quite impossible that the explosion was due to lightning, as it was equipped with the most modern preventive apparatus."

SANITATION MOVE SHOWS PROGRESS

Nearly \$250,000 Spent For Labor and Materials Since Beginning

BOISE, May 7 (Special)—With 317 men now employed in 36 of the state's 44 counties, Robert R. Frost, assistant state director, today released a spring progress report on the community sanitation program which has been operating since the fall of 1935.

Enlisting the aid of county commissioners, local civic clubs, newspapers and other agencies interested in bettering health conditions throughout Idaho, Frost said, his department expected to be operating in every county before the end of this year.

"Since the opening of the program, approximately \$250,000 has been spent for labor and building materials in community sanitation work. Much of this work was done for school districts and Grange groups interested in safeguarding the health of the children in their community," Frost said.

"However, public recognition of the worthiness of this community sanitation program is growing rapidly and before we can say that Idaho's project is complete, we expect more than double the amount of work finished to date."

Data is available at the state headquarters in Boise, or may be gotten from district WPA offices, Frost said.
