HUGE STRIKE IN STEEL INDUSTRY THREATENS EAST

CIO Closes Down Two Plants Of Jones and Laughlin Company

WALKOUT WAVE FEARED

Rumor Says FDR Will Submit New Wage, Hour Bill To Congress

By United Press. The threat of a major steel strike spread up the upper Ohio valley today as John L. Lewis' committee for industrial organization closed down the Pittsburgh and Allquippa, Pa. plants of Jones and Laughlin Co., employing 27,000 persons. It was feared the walkout would spread to other major independent operators who have not yet signed contracts with the S. W. O. C.

GMV Plants Close

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BABY'S BOBYS FOUND IN TRASH

DAY-OLD CHILD, MUTILATED AND DISMEMBERED, DISCOVERED IN OGDEN

OGDEN, Utah, May 13 (UP)—Police today reported the body of a one-day-old child, mutilated and partially dismembered, had been found in a trash can in a city park.

C. V. Carroll, park caretaker, discovered the body as he was emptying the container. He said the baby's body slipped from an armful of newspapers he had removed from the can.

The child's face had been cut away, its right leg amputated and internal organs gouged out apparently with a knife.

# Senior Thespians Earn High Praise for Drama

## J. T. BAINBRIDGE IS PRIZE WINNER

### Cast Scores With Difficult Portrayals in Pioneer Offer

High praise and commendation was accorded the cast of "No More Frontier," the senior class play, as the initial performance was presented in the Twin Falls high school auditorium last evening. The drama will be repeated this evening with a duplicate cast of girls and again Friday night with the same cast as appeared during the first presentation.

Miles Jepson for his portrayal of Flint Bulley II, the third act, should receive special honors as he stepped in yesterday to enact the role when Bill Neale, originally slated for the part, was stricken with an acute attack of appendicitis.

**Difficult Roles**  
All roles were adequately characterized although many of them were very difficult as it was necessary for the student actors to progress from a young person to an aged grandparent.

Throughout the play the scenery of mountains in the background created the atmosphere and theme for the entire production and the reason for the pioneers always pushing onward and seeking for some new frontier.

The opening scene of the prologue, effectively costumed for the period 1875, established the idea of the contrast of the young and the old, the passing order and the new, with the young of that day seeking to conquer new worlds. The theme persisted throughout with three generations represented, first the west was to be conquered, then cattle, then irrigation, the seas and in the modern scenes the skies.

Frank Perrine and Herbert Larson were exceptionally good in their roles which traced their lives from a prospector's cabin in the Alturas his as young men to grandfathers in the growing city of Alturas.

**Girls Applauded**  
Pioneer women as played by Vivian Anderson as Gail Carlton, the pioneer bride who effectively showed her homesickness, and Milly Smith's portrayal of Sue McGarvey, the hysterical western-worn wife,

received much applause for the work.  
Betty Pumphrey as the daughter of the pioneer couple and the wife of Leonard Gallardy, as George Bailey II, led the first revolt and then as parents neither could understand the spirit of their children as carried by Charles Murray North and Lewis Leiser when small, and later taken over by Martin Smith and Miles Jepson.

It is hard to single one character from another as the effect of efficient training was evident in all character interpretations. Other parts were carried well by Mary K. Smith, Neal Gibson, Elwood Bohner, Bud Booth, Nathan Tolbert, Rupert Phibbs, Ivan and Ivan Johnson, Clarion Holton, Ellis Gardner, Helen Slack, Ed Sparks and Richard Harbert.

High credit for production of the elaborate drama goes to Miss Florence M. Rees, who directed it and whose deft hand is visible throughout both in the work of the student performers and in the authentic settings.

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COVERED WAGONS AND AUTOMOBILES The Federal Bureau of Roads, it has been revealed, is now considering a far-reaching 10-year program to "speedline" the old Oregon trail through Twin Falls county, and complete approval of the project in the near future is not unlikely.

District Engineer J. M. Johnston of Shoshone told a safety meeting in Twin Falls the other night that this new construction may contemplate by-passing several Twin Falls county towns and traffic concentration points. In that connection he asked the safety leaders to "use their influence" to prevent "greedy" local interests from opposing construction designed for greatest possible safety.

No doubt there are some who will immediately be alarmed at mere mention of "by-passes," as was the case when the so-called truck lane was constructed through Twin Falls. Perhaps "greedy" was not the word to describe those who protested against the truck lane. They undoubtedly were conscientious in their belief that this by-pass would hurt their various lines of business, and it may be that such has been the case to some extent.

But sooner or later, considering the present speed of automotive travel, we all will realize that roads must be made as straight as possible and free from all unnecessary hazards. The steadily mounting death toll from automobile accidents in the United States best demonstrates that need. Unless roads are so constructed as to lessen these hazards, the increasing traffic will only mean increasing loss of life.

When the old Oregon trail first came into being, at the time when broken down covered wagons started winding their way westward, there was no need for a bee-line route. There was no such thing as speed, and the road wound around every obstruction. The advent of the automobile, slow as it was at first, changed the picture and these obstructions had to be moved. As the speed increased the sharp corners became more dangerous and they in turn gave way to curves. Then wider roads became necessary and the increasing number of automobiles introduced the problem of traffic congestion.

In terms of modern transportation this traffic congestion is just as much an obstruction to the streamlined car as boulders, canyons, rivers and the like were obstructions to the covered wagons of days gone by. Modern traffic must now be routed around this new obstruction, and the by-pass system affords the solution. It's an evolution that's inevitable and inescapable, and we might just as well accept it.

Highway traffic today presents a problem of life and death, and life naturally must be the victor at any price.

It would seem that if the by-pass system is adopted throughout the country not only to expedite and facilitate traffic, but to encourage safety as well, that every business will find itself in relatively the same position. Adjustments will be necessary no doubt, but they, too, are inevitable.

We may not be able to conceive or approve of our future traffic systems any more than the early settlers rumbling along the old Oregon trail could conceive or approve of our present highway set-up. Time changes all things.

Judging from its lack of support, the Chamber of Commerce may be forced to "go on the county."

# Restrictions Close on Duke of Windsor

## BRITAIN TRIES TO LIMIT EX-KING'S PLACE OF LIVING

### France Apparently Only Spot Approved for Marriage of Former Monarch

By H. L. PERCY  
LONDON, May 13 (Special)—The restrictions which the duke of Windsor abandoned his throne to escape, are closing tightly about him, it was understood today.

The government declined to provide for him from public funds, it opposes the attendance of members of the royal family at his wedding to Mrs. Wallis Warfield, and now it has moved—definitely if delicately—to restrict the places where he may reside in the future, according to reports.

**Danger Spots**  
He has been informed, it was understood, that it is not desirable that he marry, or reside hereafter, in Austria or elsewhere in central Europe because the entrance is regarded as a potential danger spot.

France apparently was approved. But in France if the duke wants a religious wedding, he is faced by the problem of finding a Protestant clergyman willing to marry a divorcee—Mrs. Warfield, her new legal name.

**Announcement Expected**  
It is expected that the duke's wedding day will be made public some time next week, in the form of an announcement in the official "court circular" which records activities of the royal family.

If the duke elects to be married at the British embassy in Paris, with a clergyman officiating, it is believed likely that the government may recede from its opposition to the attendance of one or more members of the royal family.

**Favors Semi-Public Wedding**  
But if he decided to be married at the Chateau de Candé at Monts, France, where he is a fellow guest with Mrs. Warfield, it is said that the government may insist that no member of the family attend even inognito, because a ceremony at the chateau would undoubtedly be a civil one under French law. Dr. Charles Mercier, mayor of Monts, would officiate.

Mrs. Warfield is said to favor a chateau wedding, semi-public. But it is reported here that the government holds it would not be in keeping with the dignity of the royal family to be represented at a wedding there.
