Hotel Building Details Completed

First of Work Scheduled For "Near Future"

Salt Lake City Firm Given General Building Contract

All legal details were completed and general contracts were awarded here today in connection with the construction of a \$300,000, seven-story hotel to be known as the Ambassador which will be located on First at the corner of Shoshone street and Second avenue east, opposite the Elks building.

The general contract for the structure was awarded H. E. Schraven of Salt Lake City while Industrial Steel, Inc., of Salt Lake City received the contract for steel which will be used in the building. It was officially announced by E. J. Post of the E. J. Post company of Salt Lake City, representing both financial and construction interests backing the enterprise.

The arrangements were completed at a special meeting held in Twin Falls this morning.

At the same time the incorporations of the new hotel compiled with terms of option agreements on property the hotel will occupy and met cash requirements on land owned by Detweiler Bros. Inc. and Kenneth C. Beach. Arrangements were also made to carry out all other options, terms and agreements, Mr. Post said.

It was also announced that the first mortgage commitment was secured for construction.

Ferry Named Counsel Lorenzo S. Young of Salt Lake City, architect, will be in charge of the plans for the structure and R. P. Perry of Twin Falls, lawyer, was permanently retained as counsel.

SCHOOL BOND VOTING FACTS

Facts on the school bond election of Twin Falls independent district No. 1, called for next Tuesday, May 25, to decide on issuance of \$350,000 in bonds.

BOND PURPOSE—To relieve highly overcrowded conditions in school system, to modernize the system and to provide adequate facilities.

WHO MAY VOTE—To be qualified to vote in this election, a person must be (1) A qualified elector of the state and school district, and a bona fide resident of the district for the 30 days preceding the election; (2) Owner and taxpayer on real estate, or (3) Husband or wife of such taxpayer.

MEANING OF TAXPAYER—Person whose name appears on the tax rolls of the county as owner of real property assessed or assessable within the boundaries of the district. This would include any person who has purchased property too recently to have paid a tax yet, since his or her name would be on the tax rolls regardless of whether a tax has yet been paid.

POLLING PLACES—Lincoln and Bickel schools. VOTING HOURS—4 to 7 p. m.

BOUNDARIES OF DISTRICT—Two miles west from the original townsite; three miles east; three miles south.

PREVIOUS DIVIDING LINES—All qualified taxpayers living west of Blue Lake boulevard and north, north and west of Shoshone street and west of the highway running south from South Park, will vote at Lincoln school. All qualified taxpayers living east and south of those dividing lines will vote at Bickel school.

OATH—All voters will be required to sign an oath before receiving a ballot, testifying their qualifications to participate in the bond election.

FLEXIBLE LABOR STANDARDS SEEN IN FDR PROGRAM

Administration Reported Not In Favor of Drastring Work Week Reduction

MESSAGE NEXT WEEK

No Official Text of Speech On New Proposals Has Been Published

By C. L. SULZBERGER WASHINGTON, May 22 (AP)—President Roosevelt's wage and hours proposals to be submitted to congress next week will provide fairly flexible labor standards, it appeared today.

Congressmen, especially those in the 30-hour work week regulation, interpret Mr. Roosevelt's plan as seeking a 35-to-40 hour basic limitation. But others close to Mr. Roosevelt indicated these interpretations assumed a more rigid regulation than the President had in mind.

No Official Text The Roosevelt bill has been published. Published versions represented various congressional interpretations of objectives outlined in conversations preliminary to submission of the White House wage and hours message.

It generally is understood that the administration does not believe it feasible to impose a drastic reduction of the work week on a rigid scale applicable to all industry alike. The administration appears, however, to be determined to obtain some statutory reduction of working hours.

Approach Abandoned This is sought indirectly under NIRA by establishing a type of industrial self-government in which reduced hours were established by intra-industry agreement.

It is believed that approach has been abandoned.

Instead, Mr. Roosevelt will ask for enactment of a bill based on the theory that the federal government has the authority to regulate the regulation of working conditions.

The President has been advised by certain officials working on the problem that this method is unquestionably constitutional in the light of recent supreme court decisions.

STATE SHOULD BE SATISFIED WITH NO LOSSES, SAYS HEAD

By DAVID N. JOHNSON BOISE, Idaho, May 22 (UP)—Governor Barzilla W. Clark leveled the guns of "strict justice" on post-depression conditions today and asked that the state be satisfied only that it had "suffered no financial loss" in operations designed to recover financial extensions allowed during 1930-36.

He aimed his statement directly at three conditions. The governor referred to: 1. Farm mortgages. 2. State land board loans. 3. Rental purchase of machinery.

World Require Payments The governor said an exact interpretation of state law would prompt foreclosure of many farm mortgages, that back interest penalties on state loans be collected, and that state officials and machinery companies be required to repay large rental payments recently judged illegal.

"But strict justice, I think," said the governor, "would only demand that the state be satisfied that it has suffered no financial loss by the plan adopted during the depression."

"This plan," said the governor, was disregarded for the more formal processes of law. He cited the fact that the state legislature passed a moratorium law on mortgages.

Fortified Interest "Our state's law forbade interest penalties on defaulting state loans," said the governor, "and cash being at a premium, our state officials bought machinery on a rental basis."

In fact, courts and lawyers took sort of an enforced holiday, the governor said, under conditions were brought about by emergency situations. He demanded immediate action.

"During the depression," the governor said, farmers handed to us their property when the officers were ordered to foreclose mortgages.

Incidents Overlooked Such incidents were usually overlooked because of stringent financial conditions then prevalent, the governor indicated.

"We have now returned to a normal basis for doing business," said the governor, "and an exact interpretation of the law would demand that back interest penalties on state loans now be collected. Machinery companies would be an additional 40 or 50 per cent on the loan and would contact the land."

The governor, however, indicated that he felt such a procedure would not be in accord with principles of (Continued on Page 2, Column 3)

# NO ADDED TAX FOR SCHOOL BONDS, CHAIRMAN SAYS

## Approval Would Mean No Burden, McClain Shows

Approval of the proposed \$350,000 bond issue for relieving over-crowded school conditions and for modernizing the Twin Falls school system "will not entail an extra penny of taxation," Chairman C. E. McClain, of the citizens' informational committee, said this afternoon in releasing detailed figures of the school district's financial status.

"The bond issue for \$350,000," the chairman said, "could be paid off over a period of 20 years without any increase in the present tax levy."

He pointed out that bond retirement money raised under the present sinking fund assessment of 4.8 mills would provide adequate funds which would fall due each year.

\$35,950 Annually

"The present 4.8 mill levy for retirement of bonded indebtedness," Mr. McClain declared, "provides \$35,950 a year under the present sinking fund valuation. Without considering the fact that the valuation will undoubtedly increase as Twin Falls gains in size, making a total indebtedness of \$11,982.43. Now consider the entirely different picture at present. Bonded debt on May 1 of this year was \$78,000. There was no floating debt cash on hand in the sinking fund May 1 was \$22,552.39, leaving a net indebtedness of only \$55,447.61."

New Twin Falls projects announced recently, he pointed out, give strong indication that the property valuation of the district is certain to rise. The \$300,000 Ambassador hotel, the \$125,000 addition to the Ferguson hotel, the proposed \$300,000 meat processing plant and the total of nearly \$200,000 in other building projects already completed or underway in the city, point the way to increased valuation, the committee chairman said. County Assessor James D. Barnhart corroborated his statement that such projects will mean a boost in assessment totals.

Could Be Reduced

"The valuation increase," Mr. McClain explained, "will mean that the mill rate probably could be reduced while the bonds are being paid off."

"That's an entirely different picture than the tax for increased valuation mentioned occasionally in connection with the school construction program."

The present 4.8 mill levy for next year, Mr. McClain asserted in quoting verified figures from books of the school board, "will provide sufficient margin when added to the amount in the bond retirement fund at the end of the year, to pay the remaining indebtedness of this district on bonds outstanding."

That total is now only a net of \$55,447.61.

"Consequently, the same tax levy can then be used to retire the new bonds. Continued for 10 years' time, the levy as it now exists will retire the \$350,000 issue entirely."

No New Burden

"As a result," he said, "taxpayers who vote in the bond election on Tuesday should understand that they will undertake no new burden—and may even find the present rate reduced within the 10 years—by approving the sorely needed funds for construction of new schools."

The chairman joined with other members of the citizens' informational committee—Mrs. J. R. Nelson, Otto Koster, Roy Painter and Stuart H. Taylor—in emphasizing that since 1927-1928 the enrollment in the Twin Falls system has increased over 400.

"That increase alone," a committee statement said, "would fill two fairly good-sized elementary schools. And yet we have had no expansion whatever in school room facilities. As a result, the over-crowding is deplorable and has forced curtail-

## Cleveland Wins to Keep American Lead

### Boston Bees Triumph as Danny MacFayden Holds Pirates to Seven Hits

NEW YORK, May 22.—(UP)—The Chicago Cubs had a string of four victories today, carrying them to third place in the National league.

There is nothing remarkable about four consecutive triumphs, but as soon as the Cubs win three straight talk immediately turns to famous winning streaks.

The Chicago Nationals started back in 1887 when they bowled over 21 in a row, and this figure wasn't surpassed until 1916 when the New York Giants ran a string of 28. The only time it was ever matched was by the 1935 Cub aggregation which started winning on Sept. 4 and didn't stop until they clinched the pennant. Other memorable Cub streaks are the 15 in a row last year; 13 in 1885; 14 in 1909 and 1927; and 13 in 1892 and 1923.

**Long Win Streaks**  
Most winning streaks are the result of long home stands, and this is now the Giants made their 25th record in 1916. The 17 in a row registered by the Giants in 1926 was on a road trip.

The Cubs ran off six in a row this year carrying them from last to fifth place. Yesterday's 8-9 victory over the Giants dropped the New Yorkers into fourth place and elevated the Cubs to within a game of the second place St. Louis Cardinals who rapped the Brooklyn Dodgers, 11-2.

The leading Pittsburgh Pirates were stopped, 6-3, by the Boston Bees. Danny MacFayden turned the trick with his seven-hit pitching. The Cincinnati Reds climbed out of the cellar and shoved Philadelphia in by losing out the Phils, 6-5.

**Cleveland Holds Lead**  
In the American league the leading Cleveland Indians dropped the Detroit Tigers, 7-5, but they failed to gain in the close race as every first division club turned in a victory.

The second place Philadelphia Athletics beat off a challenge as the Chicago White Sox won, 4-3, behind Carter's four-hit fling-ling.

The New York Yankees clung to third place by edging the St. Louis Browns 4-3 in 11 innings. Bill Dickey's single off Sheriff "Tim" Starbuck won the game.

The Detroit Tigers outlasted the Boston Red Sox, 4-2, in another 11 inning struggle. George Coffman scattered eight hits to lead the veteran Lefty Grove in a pitchers' duel.

## EX-KING WORRIES ABOUT ATTITUDE OF GOVERNMENT

Edward in Good Graces of Family, But Ostracism Campaign Hurts

MONTPELIER, France, May 22 (U.P.)—The duke of Windsor, seriously worried over a virtual British government boycott of his wedding, has resorted to knitting to soothe his jangling nerves. It was understood today.

As the result, it was said, Mrs. Wallis Warfield has a new sweater which he knitted for her in wool of new "wally blue" shade. It was finished last night and presented to her this morning.

Since the government's ostracism campaign, it was said, the duke has become more and more nervous, and slept so badly that he knitted and paried on the sweater assiduously until late at night.

It was reported that Mrs. Warfield was kept busy consulting the duke. Events of the wedding in June, she filled him with a bitterness against the government, it was reported, and have been a severe blow to his pride.

No Religious Ceremony  
First denied the attendance of members of his own family at his wedding to Mrs. Warfield on June 3, only 10 days hence, the duke now has been denied even the privilege of a religious ceremony.

In addition, it was reported today, he is disappointed because the royal family has not yet formally announced his engagement in the court circular, which records activities of the royal family.

There has been delay also, it was said, in transferring the \$500,000 which is understood to be the contribution of the royal family to insure Mrs. Warfield's financial independence in case that the duke predeceased her. This sum would be kept in trust.

On Good Terms  
It is emphasized that present ill-feeling is entirely between the duke and the government. He is said to be on better terms than he was with members of the royal family.

A French notary called at the castle to attest the final papers for the civil wedding.

A provincial British consular officer will be the sole representative of his country at the wedding. It is expected that the government will permit Consul W. Cummings Graham of Nantes to attend and this is regarded as more a matter of red tape than of a concession.

It was thought that the local French Protestant minister might act. But even the French Protestant minister announced last night.

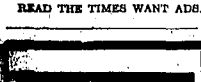

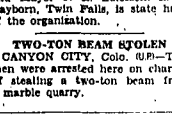

The program was urged by J. L. Eberly, Idaho bar examiner, before the meeting of the Eleventh Judicial District Bar association at the Park hotel last night.

Other speakers included Judge James W. Porter and Judge T. Bailey Lee of the 11th judicial district bench; former Probate Judge O. P. Duval; Ray D. Agee, local attorney; and Cary Nixon, chairman of the Idaho Bar association program committee. Paul V. Thoman, president of the district group, presided and introduced speakers.

Strong Movement  
Declaring that there is "an amazingly strong movement in other states toward a centralized and integrated bar," Mr. Eberly told the attorneys that the Idaho bar commission and many members of the state's legal ranks "are now working toward the same goal in Idaho."

"This state, for many years, had one of the highest rates of admission to practice," he asserted. "Other states have been cutting down the number who are admitted by tightening up on requirements and by making other restrictions. Idaho has done much along

## Wilcox Explains Brown Needle on Evergreen Trees

Explanation of the damage as needles turn brown on evergreen trees was made here today for the benefit of property owners and ranchers by W. E. Wilcox, horticulture inspector for the Twin Falls district, state department of agriculture.

"There have been a great many inquiries at this office as to the damage on evergreen trees and shrubs by the needles turning brown," Mr. Wilcox said.

"We have sent samples to the forestry department at the University and R. K. Pierson, extension forester, states the cause is freezing injury in the fall, followed by a bright sun the next morning, causing the needles to thaw out too rapidly and killing them. This damage should correct itself if the trees are cared for in the same manner as has been practiced before any injury occurred."

"One ruling by the bar commission, that aided toward this goal was the refusal to admit attorneys to practice merely on certificate. They must now pass a regular examination."

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## REBELS CONTINUE MADRID SHELLING

45 Killed, 75 Wounded in 2 Days of Bombing; 20 Dead Yesterday



MADRID, May 22 (U.P.)—The second rebel bombardment of Madrid in two days killed 45 persons and wounded 75 others today, unofficial estimates reported, and again heavily damaged the heart of the capital.

The insurgent artillery began shelling Madrid at 6 a. m. They kept it up for 4 1/2 hours, raining big shells into the Gran Via section and elsewhere in the center of the city.

Refugees to whom bombings are almost a daily experience, ate breakfast in the United States embassy to the scream of rebel shells but no one left the building when the embassy windows were shattered by detonations.

The bombardment followed a similar one Friday when 20 were killed and 60 wounded, including women and children.
