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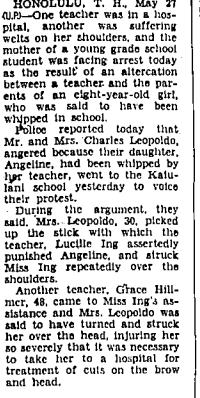

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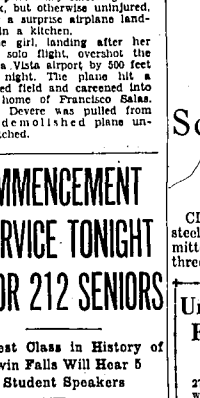
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ARMY OF FISHERMEN PREPARES FOR OPENING OF SEASON

SURVEY REVEALS STATUS OF MOST FAVORED SPOTS

Dr. D. L. Alexander returned last evening from San Francisco where he has been for the past two weeks.

Fishermen of this section were digging out their equipment today and testing their rods and tackle in anticipation of the fishing season which opens on Sunday, May 30.

Generally, fishing conditions are anticipated to offer good sport for the thousands who will venture out the first day. In some instances, however, low water will result in some of the more popular streams, such as Silver creek, offering little in the way of good fishing.

Mary Walton will fish streams in the immediate vicinity of Twin Falls while others plan trips which will take them over 200 miles from home in quest of the trout for which Idaho waters are famous.

Big Wood river—Clear in mornings, murky in afternoons. Slightly less than normal condition to cross in automobile at Stanton's crossing.

Silver creek—Most gone from stream. Fishing in lower reaches of water—excess low and muddy.

Malad river—Clear and good fly fishing. (Also streams in Hagerman valley).

East fork of Jarbidge river—Clear and fishing should be very good for trout.

Snake river—Irregular and as a result more or less rocky; however, fly fishing reasonably good.

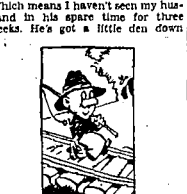

Need for Strict Enforcement

J. L. Balderston, state commissioner of law enforcement, has called attention to the fact that every automobile driver must have a new driver's license before July 1st.

He goes even farther than that by saying that applicants for drivers' licenses "may" be questioned regarding their past driving record, particularly as to whether they have any demerits against them by home town police officers.

"May" might have been the word, but in view of the increasing recklessness on the highways and the state's steadily growing death toll from automobile accidents, "must" would have been more in keeping with the steps necessary to bring Idaho motorists to air senses.

The state law is fairly clear as regards driving regulations. Those not permitted to operate motor vehicles include: (1) persons under age, (2) drivers whose licenses have been revoked or suspended, while the revocation or suspension is in effect, (3) habitual drunkards and narcotic drug addicts, (4) anyone adjudged to be afflicted with or suffering from a mental disability or disease who has not at the time of the application been restored to competency by methods provided by law, (5) applicants who the commissioner has good reason to believe could not operate a motor vehicle with safety, and (6) applicants who have not passed the examination.

It would seem that these exclusions are adequate to keep reckless drivers off the roads, but the real test comes in the enforcement of these regulations. Laxity in this respect is largely responsible for the half-brained type of driving we witness every day. Only when a steering wheel "nut" realizes he runs a serious chance of losing his driver's license will he begin to have any regard for others.

During the first four months of 1937 the record for killing, injury and destruction as a result of automobile accidents has topped all previous high marks in Idaho by nearly 50 per cent.

Isn't it high time that we were enforcing the state's driving regulations to the letter? "Must" is the word, not "may."

Building Dictatorship

To most Americans, the formula for creating a dictator requires only an armed uprising, march on Rome or a beer-cellar putsch. Actually, those things are merely the climax of a long preparatory period of secret plotting and chicanery, a covert siege of buying off and promising, of dodging and playing with loopholes in the constitutional law.

Japan right now is giving us a rare clinical example of that very thing. Rebuffed by the Japanese diet, Premier Senjuro Hayashi called for a general election in support of his neo-imperialistic measures. But the people overwhelmingly outvoted Hayashi's program. Then, instead of resigning himself to the public will, Hayashi announced he would disregard the vote and rule with parliament until the diet manifested a "spirit of world co-operation that is fast withering."

Japan may never reach full dictatorship, but it certainly is on the way, in the best accepted tradition of Hitler, Mussolini, Metaxas and others. The situation provides America with a splendid object lesson and a chance to brush up on the new world politics.

Recorder Office Costs Less, Does More Than Ada's

Although the volume of business handled by the office of Frank J. Seib, Twin Falls county auditor, recorder and clerk of the district court, is heavier than that handled by the same office in Ada county, administration expense here was nearly \$8,000 less in 1926.

Comparison of the expenditures by the two offices was shown today in figures from the annual report of Ada county.

The recorder-auditor-court clerk expenses here for 1926 were \$12,812.40 as compared with \$20,577.38 in Ada county. Comparative figures show that the work of the two offices stacks up as follows: Twin Falls recorder does more recording than Ada, as shown by fees; Twin Falls county has more tax sales to handle; Twin Falls county has passports and naturalization, in hand; (federal court in Boise does this for Ada); Ada county auditor handles some road and bridge claims, not handled by the Twin Falls auditor.

In total tax valuation of the two counties, Ada has an advantage of only \$4,000,000 over Twin Falls.

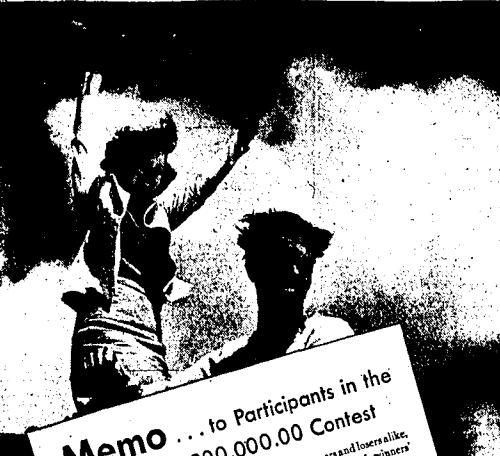

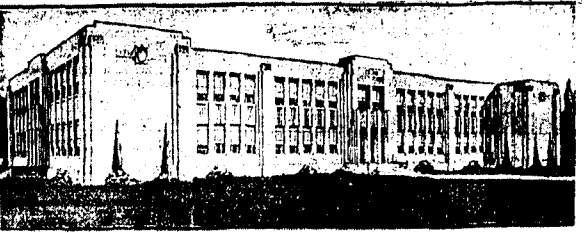

JEROME SCHOOL HAS NEW SETUP

Unique Plan Similar to One In Use in Ogden and Salt Lake City

JEROME, May 27 (Special)—New Washington school, now under construction, is to have an entirely new set-up approved by the board of education and school authorities after considerable study, thought and attention.

In the new building there will be accommodated two divisions of each of the grades from one to six inclusive, making in all 12 divisions with one teacher in charge of each. Grades one and two will be set up on Jerome's traditional plan, but in grades three, four, five and six a type of organization will be used which will permit pupils to have 175% work in the special subjects under teachers who have special aptitudes and training as well as experience for teaching of these subjects.

He started at \$4 a week. Two years later he quit because he was refused a pay increase of \$100 a year. It was then that he borrowed \$1,000 from his father and went into business for himself.

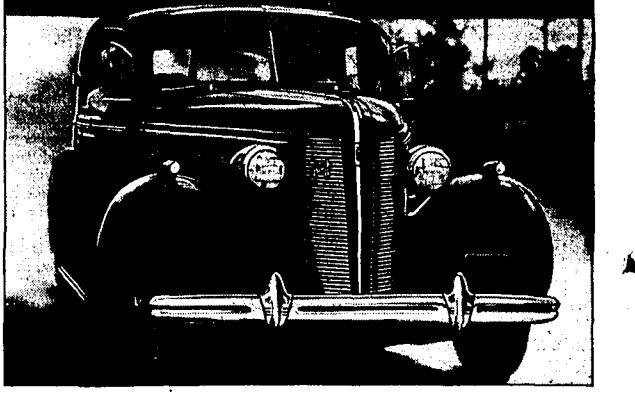
Gas in Cesspool Kills Nampa Man

ELEVEN STATES JOIN IN 'FRISCO BRIDGE DEDICATION

LONGEST SPAN IS OPENED FOR USE AT GOLDEN GATE

Week-Long Fiesta Takes Place in Bay District; Canadians Present

By ROGER JOHNSON
SAN FRANCISCO, May 27 (U.P.)—The west joined today in the dedication of the world's largest suspension bridge across the Golden Gate—once the destination of prairie schooners and westbound pioneers. Official delegations from 11 western states, Canada, Mexico, Hawaii, 59 California counties, and the U. S. Pacific fleet converged on San Francisco for a week of pageants and parades which took on the aspect of a huge Spanish fiesta.

Although San Francisco's 16 largest hotels were closed by a strike, and official representations were threatened in a flag-trampling incident, when a unidentified group hauled down a Nazi German swastika from a Market street building, there was a distinctly holiday atmosphere in the city.

Thousands lined downtown streets to watch impromptu parades of motorized cavalcades as they moved up Market street from the ferry building to be greeted officially by Mayor Angelo J. Rossi.

Governors from seven of the 11 participating states led this delegation. There were long automobile caravans from British Columbia, Washington, Oregon, Nevada, Idaho, Colorado, Arizona and Utah. The Redwood Empire district of northern California, which will be principal beneficiary of the Golden Gate bridge, sent a large delegation.

Included in the celebration units which arrived here were the 16th Scottish Canadian regiment of Victoria, B. C., the Vancouver Kluksano boys' band, the Cavemen and Cavewomen of Grants, Paas, Ore., Sheriff Eugene Biscailuz mounted "Western Foes" from Los Angeles, the Provo, Utah, high school band, the official fiesta band and marching groups from civic organizations throughout California.

100-Float Pageant
Three parades are scheduled, including a 100-float pageant tomorrow preceding official dedication and opening of the bridge by Gov. Frank F. Merriam. Tomorrow night the dramatized pageant "Spans the Golden Gate" with a cast of 3,000 headed by Baritone John Charles Thomas, will have its premiere showing at a huge amphitheater constructed at Ghiesey field.

Today is "pedestrian day" on the bridge—the only day that foot travelers will be allowed on the two-mile span. Fiesta officials predicted that 100,000 pedestrians would take advantage of the opportunity.
