TRUCK ACCIDENT HURTS CCC MEN

3 Members of Camp Injured When Vehicle Turns Over At Mountain Home

BOISE, May 31 (UP)—Condition of three CCC men was reported serious today after they were injured when a truck in which they were riding overturned Sunday at a Mountain Home street corner.

Six other youths were painfully injured. All were taken to the veterans hospital here.

Hospital attaches said today the most seriously injured was Anita Arnold, Parnell, Mo. He was suffering from fractured ribs and a punctured lung.

Two others, Bob Jackson, Mountain Home; and Owen Miller, Marysville, Mo., were reported in serious condition.

5 DEAD IN CHICAGO RIOT OF STRIKERS

1,500 Unionists and 150 Policemen Fight

CHICAGO, May 31 (UP)—State and federal authorities strove today to prevent recurrence of fighting which brought death to five striking steel workers and injury to more than 100 unionists and police in a fierce battle near the Republic Steel company's south side plant.

Gov. Henry Horner announced after a midnight conference with representatives of all interested parties that:

- 1. Peaceful picketing will be permitted at the Republic gates.
2. Martial law will not be declared at present.
3. Struck by reports of the viciousness of the battle waged between 1,500 steel strikers and 150 city police, Horner struck hard for a settlement of the strike which has crippled three of the biggest independent steel companies.
4. Republic Steel Corp., Youngstown Steel and Tube Co., and Inland Steel Corp. in Illinois, Indiana, Ohio, Michigan and New York.
5. Hoped to settle the whole thing not a minute later.

"I do hope to settle the whole thing not a minute later," the governor said after a two-and-one-half hour conference. "I hope to avert any further danger of bloodshed."

SCORES DEAD IN TOLL OF HOLIDAY

(By United Press) Scores of persons were killed and hundreds injured in holiday accidents throughout the country, a survey by the United Press revealed today. A majority of the fatalities resulted from automobile crashes on the nation's highways, crowded with motorists' first rush to resorts.

In the metropolitan New York area, the toll reached eight dead and 11 injured when a bicyclist swerved into the path of a coupe in which five persons were seated at 1:45 p. m. on May 31. Four men were killed and a fifth critically injured when the car turned over and burst into flames.

Shantytown Demands Court Order for Evacuation

Shantytown residents in Rock creek canyon, faced by orders of new owners to move by June 6, "will ignore the verbal notice and won't move except on court order," an asserted spokesman for the 250 canyon residents said today.

Luke Francis, leader in Workers' Alliance local No. 8, issued the flat ultimatum this morning. He claimed that "75 per cent of Shantytown backs me up in this stand. Five or six families who had intended to move anyway are unconcerned one way or the other."

DEATH COMES TO DON MCKAY, 93

Man Who Lived in Halley At Year of Founding, Dies in Hospital

Don McKay, a resident of Twin Falls for 20 years and who would have observed his 93rd birthday today, died yesterday afternoon at the county general hospital, where he was under treatment for only one day.

Long a pioneer figure in this section, he became a resident of Halley in 1881, the year of the town's founding. At that point he was engaged in cotton picking. He was in a partnership which was called Cliff and McKay. Later he was proprietor of a hotel in Halley, moving to Shoshone in 1888 where he managed a hotel.

Born in Boston, Mass., on May 31, 1844, he came west to Nevada in 1871. After a residence there and in Idaho he went to Utah where in 1877 he married Miss L. Bartholomew at Elmore and lived for a time at Frisco, a mining town which is now defunct. It was from Frisco that he and his wife moved to Halley.

He moved to Shoshone following the death of his wife in 1887. After living in Shoshone he was for a time employed by the government in British Columbia as supervisor of roads.

He came to Twin Falls about 20 years ago and during his later years became interested in mining. McKay was a charter member of the Masonic lodge of Halley and belonged to the Knights Templar Commandery at Boise. At the time of his death he was the only living charter member of the lodge. He also belonged to the Royal Arch Masonic temple at Twin Falls, and the 22 Korah temple at Boise.

Surviving are two daughters, Mrs. Stella Browne, Salmon; Mrs. Hortense Perry, Twin Falls, and several grandchildren. The body was taken to Halley where tentative services have been arranged for Wednesday at 2 p. m. Burial will be in Halley cemetery beside his wife under the direction of the Halley funeral home. Halley Masonic lodge will be in charge of services.

Hitler Quits Non-Intervention Agreement Following Attack

LONDON, May 31 (UP)—Italy has joined Germany in withdrawing from the non-intervention committee and the international control scheme in Spain, it was announced officially today.

By FREDERICK C. OESCHNER BERLIN, May 31 (UP)—Germany, inflamed to a fighting mood by the aerial bombing of the pocket battleship Deutschland, in which 23 sailors were killed, blasted the Spanish port of Almeria with its first today and withdrew from the international non-intervention agreement of Spain.

A foreign office spokesman announced that the bombardment of Almeria was considered sufficient reprisal for the Deutschland incident. "We will ask no further restitution or make any further claim," he said.

Asked what guarantees would be demanded from the non-intervention committee before Germany resumes co-operation, the spokesman said: "If the non-intervention committee requires all control ships to remain on an aggressor, that might achieve our purpose."

While reliable private quarters maintained that Germany is ready to undertake a succession of further moves against the Valencia government—some in co-operation with Italy—government officials emphasized that the actual stand is that Germany is prepared to take further reprisals only if provoked by further aggression.

Government sources said the bombardment of Almeria did not constitute an act of war, firstly, because there are no diplomatic relations between Berlin and Valencia, and secondly because "one cannot wage war on a band of pirates."

An official announcement said German warships in Spanish waters have been instructed to fire on any approaching loyalist airplanes or warships.

Additional German warships were ordered to Spanish waters. The navy ministry refused to confirm or deny that shore leave had been granted on all German ships throughout the world.

The government ordered all flags hoisted for three days in mourning for the Deutschland victim. Public indignation was high. The newspapers appeared with black-bordered pages.

Regarding Germany's attitude towards the non-intervention agreement, an official communiqué said: "The German government has instructed to submit to the committee chairman official-corroborated evidence of the attack on a German warship and to notify him of the German government's decision not to participate in the control system or the obligations of the non-intervention committee as long as no absolute guarantee is given that such acts will not recur."

There was a rumor that the Reichstag would be convened today and the spokesman said the propaganda ministry knew nothing of it.

Inviting Picnic With Death

It takes, as somebody once remarked, all kinds of people to make a world. And since our world is infinitely various, it follows that we have some queer fish masquerading as adult human beings.

Here is a little news story that got on the wires from Galena, Mo., a few days ago:
"The carnival spirit of a rural hanging tonight drew hundreds of persons to the death watch over Roscoe (Red) Jackson, 33, confessed slayer, who will be executed at 6 a. m. tomorrow.

"The lawn of the Stone county courthouse was sprinkled with groups of women who chattered as if it a picnic. Small boys ran across the boardwalk platform and into the jail to peep at the condemned man."

It would be easy enough to dance around those two paragraphs briefly, conclude that the people of Stone county, Missouri, are somehow more calloused and heartless than all the rest of us, and then go on to something else. The only trouble is that it wouldn't be true.

For this sort of thing has happened before, in other places than Missouri, and it will happen again. It is not unusual, for modern America. And it provides a good insight into the odd moral atmosphere of a land which can't seem to understand why it has such a crime problem.

The thing that hits you in the eye about that carnival crowd that stayed up all night to enjoy a good hanging, is that it has no conception whatever of the sacredness of human life.

Inside that jail there was a man who was living through his last hours on earth; a man whom society, for good and sufficient reasons, was about to put out of existence. No one with any sensitivity to the infinite mystery of life and death can even think of a man in that situation without feeling sobered and humble.

And when people can make a picnic out of such a thing, the only possible conclusion is that they lack that saving sensitivity. They simply cannot understand that any life, even a bad one, is a part of the same tremendous riddle that underlies their own lives. Unless death strikes close to them they remain unmoved by it.

Now a country which can muster such picnicking crowds is a country in which life is considered cheap. And such a country, because it has that attitude, is just naturally going to have a high homicide rate, with shootings and stabbings and mob violence enough to make the angels weep. How can it have anything else, if it has no inkling of the sacredness of life?

Of course, not all of us go to hangings. But most of us do it by proxy. We insist that our newspapers describe executions in grim detail, sparing us nothing. We feast our morbid curiosity on stories of the death house, the "last mile," the grim paraphernalia and routine of death. And we do it for the same reason that the Missouri mob flocked about the scaffold.

As long as we have that attitude we have no right to wonder at the appalling commonness of homicide in our country.

"Justified" Child Labor

The National Association of Manufacturers, through a letter from its president to the Senate Interstate Commerce committee, indorses wholeheartedly the principles and purposes of pending laws "designed to eliminate unjustified child labor."

At the same time, it reiterates its opposition to the child labor amendment.

In spite of its endorsement, that opposition is not surprising. That one word, "unjustified," in the endorsement, leaves a loophole wide enough to permit opposition to practically any child labor law.

The way to move against child labor is to move against all child labor. Once you admit that child labor is "justified" in some cases, you permit every employer of child labor to insist that his particular brand of child labor is one of the justified varieties. And so the passage of effective legislation becomes impossible.

"If they come in to buy a tie, also sell them a shirt," advises Louis H. Busich, business counselor. That probably wouldn't apply, however, to those who may have "lost their shirts."

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





George Rauch, 51, Responds To Treatment After Truck Is Hit at Crossing

Condition of George F. Rauch, 51, who was injured early Saturday in a truck-train crash at the Eighth street south railroad crossing, was reported this afternoon to be "very good" by Twin Falls general hospital attendants, where he is under treatment.

The train hit the truck's rear wheels, spinning the machine completely around and throwing it some distance before the engineer could bring the train to a stop.

Investigation revealed the train whistled for the crossing but Rauch drove directly into its path. It was said at the time that either Rauch did not see the train coming or the whistle, because of a west wind, was blurred.

Harry Ball, also co-owner of the Palace company, was of the opinion that the injured man "just didn't see it coming."

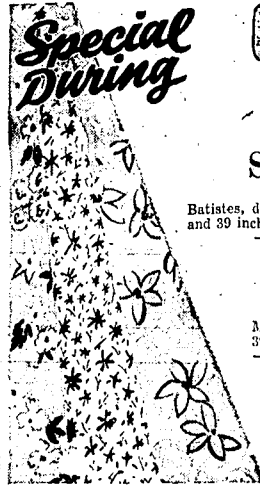

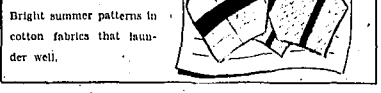
