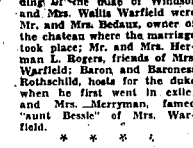

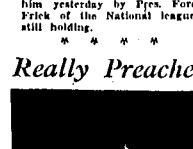

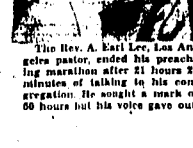

DUKE WEDS WALLIS WARFIELD

Violence Flares in New Steel Strike Area

Picket is Shot In Trying to Stop Workers

Gov. Davey of Ohio Steps in To Avert Settlement Of Controversy

(By United Press) Violence flared in a new steel strike area today when Steve John, 40, a picket, was wounded with buckshot while allegedly trying to prevent non-strikers from entering a Republic Steel corporation plant at Warren, O.

Gov. Martin L. Davey of Ohio stepped into the steel strike controversy by announcing he would act as mediator in an attempt to settle the situation which has 70,000 workers idle in three big independent steel plants—Republic, Inland Steel and Youngstown Sheet & Tube.

Company officials continued to resist the demands of the steel workers organizing committee, affiliate of the committee for industrial organization, for a working contract. In Chicago, steel strikers and sympathizers prepared to bury five of their six members who died in a battle with police Sunday at the gates of the Republic Steel plant. Funeral services for the slain were held yesterday. Conspiracy charges are pending against 40 persons accused of participating in the slaying.

In Detroit, Common Pleas Judge Ralph Liddy was to rule today on when he can act as an 11-man grand jury investigating a fight between Ford Motor company employees and officials of the United Automobile Workers union.

(By United Press) LONDON, June 3 (UP)—Ernest Simpson secluded himself today during the marriage of his former wife to the duke of Windsor and was nowhere to be seen. It was believed he might have been in the oyster-lice surroundings of his regimental guards.

CHATEAU DE CANDE, Monts, June 3 (UP)—The duke of Windsor, responding to a toast, wishing him and his duchess happiness today after their wedding, said: "We are happy you are here on this occasion, so important to us."

MONTS, France, June 3 (UP)—Italy boycotted the coronation of King George VI but sent several newspaper correspondents to report on the wedding.

One of them asked why they covered the wedding and not the coronation. The answer was: "Perhaps because the wedding annoys the British government."

MONTS, France, June 3 (UP)—Several small American flags in the form of ribbons were entwined with the flowers at the duke of Windsor's wedding. But no British flags were to be seen in either room where the civil and religious ceremonies were held.

LONDON, June 3 (UP)—Twelve couples, with 24 witnesses and numerous guests, crowded into the Caxton hall register office today in a rush to be married.

MONTS, France, June 3 (UP)—By trans-Atlantic telephone to New York—The sun was blotted out by clouds today at the moment Mayor Charles Merkle began the ceremony. The duke of Windsor and Mrs. Wallis Warfield, man and wife, villagers smiled and declared: "It's a good omen."

BOISE, Idaho, June 3 (UP)—D. Dunhee, state director of health, today said he had retained attorneys to fight a recent court decision by the state supreme court which had disqualified him from office.

Mr. Dunhee said that in view of the fact that he had been stopped, until the matter was settled in court, he had automatically stepped out of the head of the department.

Britain Presents Three-Point Plan To Nations in Spanish War Crisis

Pact Would Guard Against Patrol Ship Interference

LONDON, June 3 (UP)—Great Britain submitted to France, Germany and Italy a three-point plan today, designed to restore friendly relations in dealing with the Spanish situation and to induce Germany and Italy to return to the non-intervention committee.

The plan provides guarantees against further interference with non-intervention patrol ships, on which Italy and Germany insist. It would be achieved by the following means: 1. Safety zones in Spanish harbors frequented by non-intervention patrol ships. 2. Guarantees that both Spanish factions to prevent molestation at warships. 3. Immediate consultation among the naval commanders of all four patrol fleets (British, French, Italian and German) in event of future attacks on patrol vessels. The other three governments are studying the plan and have not yet replied.

CASSIA ASKS U.S. FINGERPRINT AID

Identification of Man Found Slain Will Be Made By G-Men's Bureau

BOISE, June 3 (Special)—Cassia county authorities were at today to bring positive identification of a murder victim's body to the state capital. The Cassia officer and sheriff at J. Foster of Pocatello checked identification marks carefully yesterday, and found that clothing, two dental plates, hair and tattoo marks on both forearms tally exactly with those ascribed to McCarthy.

The dental plates have already been sent to Sheriff Don Hendrick, Boise, for identification by the dentist, who made McCarthy's false teeth. No prints in Idaho.

At Boise, Hendrick said that comparison of fingerprints with war department files would provide the only positive identification, since no prints of McCarthy are on record in Idaho although he was in Boise city but a few weeks ago. Sheriff Pace has requested close watch by police officers throughout the southern Idaho area for two months said to have been McCarthy's companions when he left Boise May 10 headed for Montana.

Jerome Boys Hurt In Gasoline Blast

JEROME, June 3 (Special)—Two Jerome youths were being treated today for serious and painful burns received yesterday at 11 p. m. on the highway near the Appleton school house six miles west of here when a match lighted by a companion ignited the gasoline tank.

The injured youths are Sylvester Robbins, 18, son of Ely Robbins and owner of the car involved, who sustained serious burns of both arms to the elbows, and LeVer Bennett, 17, who received burns on both legs and one of particular severity on the left leg. William Miller, who was with the boys was unharmed. The trio was returning from Wendell.

Practical officer Earl Williams, who was called to the scene of the accident, immediately reported this afternoon that the explosion occurred when the car boys were driving ran out of gas and Miller struck a match to examine the tank. As the match lit, the tank was ignited by one of his companions and exploded, bringing the match close to the opening of the tank. In the resulting explosion the two boys' clothing caught fire but Bennett was blown toward the road. Robbins caught him to prevent his being struck by the approaching car and received the burns on his arms.

The three youths were brought to Jerome by Earl Erwin and Hilby Patsy, both of Jerome, and were rushed to the office of Dr. R. C. Malson, who gave their injuries emergency treatment and pronounced them second and third degree burns.

The two are now at their homes. The car was brought back to Jerome by Williams.

Work to Continue on Vegetable Advertising

BOISE, June 3 (UP)—Guy Graham, commissioner of Agriculture, called today to discuss the fruit and vegetable advertising commission would continue its work, notwithstanding a recent opinion by Attorney General J. W. Taylor.

The opinion expressed "grave doubts" as to the measure's constitutionality. Graham said he would take the case to court if efforts were made to stop the commission's work.

Church Refuses Rites Sanction

Religious Heads of England Say Marriage Performed Out of Jurisdiction

PERCY LONDON, June 3 (UP)—The Church of England, outlawed by an obscure country clergyman and confronted by an angry public controversy over its refusal to sanction the marriage of the duke of Windsor, still does not recognize his wedding as blessed by the church, the Bishop of Pulkham, who performed the ceremony, has been victorious with his disclaimer.

The bishop of Pulkham, who has jurisdiction over Anglican church affairs in France, admitted he would not be disciplined.

The bishop, who sent the "Ivory Mr. Jardine a telegram of strong protest and rebuke, told the United Press: "No further action will be taken by me. My telegram to Mr. Jardine only protested against his officiating at the wedding. It is a jurisdiction which he had no license or permission."

The church insists on the indissolubility of marriage, and since all marriage in France must be civil, then the only private ceremony could perform in benediction after the marriage."

# FDR URGES PLANNED COMBAT OF DUST, FLOOD, DROUGHT

## MESSAGE ASKS ESTABLISHMENT OF 8 SECTIONS

### Program Would Stress Water Power to Block Private Monopolies

WASHINGTON, June 3 (AP)—President Roosevelt urged congress in a special message today to establish eight regional authorities over the country to combat dust storms, floods and droughts by a long-time national planning program featuring generation of water-power to block private monopoly.

Mr. Roosevelt proposed to duplicate the government's Tennessee valley development on major rivers basins throughout the nation. He asked speedy action because "Nature has given recurrent and poignant warnings through dust storms, floods and droughts that we must act while there is yet time if we could reserve for today the use of our posterity the natural resources of a virile national life."

Couples Plan With Fia  
The President coupled his recommendation with a plea for enactment of his executive reorganization and an open declaration against private waterpower monopoly. He suggested that his authorities for these seven flexible basins:

Atlantic seaboard: Great Lakes and Ohio valley; drainage basin of the Tennessee and Cumberland rivers; drainage basins of the Missouri river and the Red River of the north; drainage basins of the Arkansas, Red and Rio Grand rivers; basins of the Colorado river and rivers flowing into the Pacific south of the California-Oregon line; the Columbia river basin of the Pacific northwest.

## COURT DECREES TITLE TO RANCH

Samuel Grandall Dunn, 83, and W. E. Dunn Upheld by Verdict Here

Ownership of 4,000 acres of land and 1,600 head of livestock in the T-7 outfit had been confirmed today as being solely to Samuel Grandall Dunn, colorful 83-year-old Three Creek pioneer cattleman, and William E. Dunn, one of his sons. Memorandum decision affecting the ranches and livestock valued at \$120,000 was returned yesterday by District Judge J. Bailey Lee. It followed 12 days of oral and documentary testimony and arguments in court here.

Four other sons and two daughters of the elder Dunn, associated in the case with him as plaintiffs, had sought to oust Willor Dunn's partnership claim and to assure equal distribution rights. All plaintiffs except the elder Dunn, Judge Lee ruled would be restrained permanently from interfering with the partnership between the father, Willor Dunn and the latter's wife, Mrs. Dva Dunn.

Favors Aged Pioneer  
Any implied trust in previous partitioning of the land, Judge Dunn with other sons would operate only in favor of the pioneer cattleman, the court found. The succession of the ranch, in the court's opinion, had been made by the cattleman with "unswerving purpose of preserving his 'good name' and protecting 'an enviable credit' in banking circles."

The judge's memorandum decision upheld the claim of Sam and Willor, and Mrs. Carolyn Patrick to the Devil creek ranch purchased from Stewart V. Dunn, one of the sons.

Jurisdiction to appoint a receiver for the Dunn properties, should such action become necessary, was reversed by the court.

First of partnerships cited was set up in 1929 between the elder Dunn and Stewart and Willor, two sons. The father assigned two-thirds share of all his stock and property to the partnership. The partnership purchased the Walters ranch. Willor Dunn became a partner in 1933 when he and Willor transferred his one-third interest to him.

Disolved in 1933  
The partnership was dissolved in 1933, assertedly because of the depression and because of "disagreements" among the elder Stewart and Alvaro re-conveyed all property except Devil creek and House creek ranches. Thereafter the elder Dunn and Willor established a new partnership.

The new combine, Judge Lee found, has achieved favorable results by cutting mortgage from \$35,000 down to \$20,000.

Attorneys in the case were Bothwell & Povey for the plaintiffs, Chapman and Chapman for the defendants, Willor E. Dunn and his wife, and Stephan and Blanford for the intervenors, Patrick and his wife.

## TOMLINSON WILL HANDLE LICENSES

Former City Patrolman Goes On State Force; Permit Sale Now Underway

Appointment of W. E. Tomlinson, former city patrolman, as a state traffic officer to write driver licenses in Twin Falls speeded up the handling of the licenses here today.

All motorists must secure permit renewals by July 1. Fee is 50 cents. The new licenses differ from the old in appearance, but still carry space for listing of traffic violations.

Tomlinson is on duty every day at the office of Sheriff C. F. Prater during office hours. It was announced. He was on the city police force from 1935 until May of this year.

Responsibility for handling of the drivers' licenses rests with state patrolmen in each district, according to word received today by F. M. Kingsbury from J. L. Balderston, commissioner of law enforcement, Kingsbury, state traffic officer in this area, said that men will be stationed later at Buhl and Piler one day each week to handle the license renewals. Arrangements in other south central Idaho communities will be made by the state troopers in those districts.

## BUILDING TOTAL CONTINUES BOOM

Permits Asked in Twin Falls For First Three Days of June Total \$28,045

Application for a building permit to construct a \$4,500 residence at the corner of Ninth avenue north and Shoshone street by Velma Johnson this afternoon brought to \$28,045 the total for the first three days of June.

This total, added to the total of \$133,284 for the first five months of this year, brings to \$161,329 the total building in Twin Falls to date.

City Clerk W. E. Hedges, said that 200 permits are filed for approval of the city council, points out that this total does not include \$950,000 added to the construction which is expected to get underway in the city before the year ends.

Included in the \$950,000 is the seven-story Ambassador hotel, the new Bickel school building, the new unit at Lincoln, improvements to other school buildings and the meat processing plant planned here this fall by the Associated Meat Producers, Inc.

## WM. HIX DENIES RANCHER SLAYING

MOUNTAIN HOME, Idaho, June 3 (AP)—William Hix, 25, accused of murdering Frank Miller, Mayfield farmer, today faced a sentence of 30 years at his preliminary hearing here and steadfastly denied that he had killed the rancher. Miller's body was found May 18 by his son, Frank, Jr., 1,300 feet from his ranch, covered with carnal and with low branches. Examination showed that he had died from a gunshot wound in the back.

Hix, excitedly watching procedure which wore a damaging web of circumstantial evidence around him, broke into testimony several times to contradict witnesses, or deny statements.

He was clean shaven, and dressed in a black suit. He had been brought from the state penitentiary early today for the hearing before Justice O. E. Horell.

Evidence introduced by six witnesses called by Charles Stout, Elmore county attorney, indicated that Hix had collected Miller's mail after the man's disappearance, signed checks for purchase of clothing with Miller's name, and had sold his personal belongings.

## SWIMMING POOL TO OPEN MONDAY

Outdoor Plunge Is Filled For Testing Today; Minor Work Only Remains

The words of a small boy as he looked at the Harmon park swimming pool this afternoon, "It won't be long now," were substantiated by S. Claus Stewart, park superintendent, who said the pool will be open Tuesday.

Today the pool was filled and all that remains to be done before the opening is a few minor repairs to the chlorination system, Stewart said.

## MOTOR LICENSE RECEIPTS CLIMB

Cash Through May Soars to \$20,292 Above Similar Period in 1936

Motor vehicle license receipts through May of this year soared \$1,202.45 above those for the first five months of 1936; it was revealed here today in figures issued by J. D. Barnhart, county assessor.

Funds taken in through May 31 totaled \$169,742.60, Mr. Barnhart's report showed. Receipts for the month of May were \$16,843.95. The figure through May of 1936 was \$148,498.15.

The cash paid by motorists of the county so far in 1937 is already well above the entire total for 1936 and within less than \$8,000 of the full year of 1936. In 1935, the year's total was \$150,077.75. Full 12-month receipts for 1936 were \$178,147.25 as compared with the \$169,742.60 already taken in during less than half of 1937.

The license buying in the county shows a decided uptrend in the recovery climb for this section. Total sales for 1937 were only \$116,314.50 and for 1934 \$130,507.85.

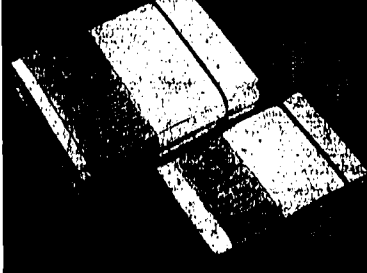

# NEW MOVE AIMS AT CENTRAL LABOR UNIT IN TWIN FALLS

## PLANS OUTLINED FOR ORGANIZING ON WIDE SCALE

H. H. Freedholm Maps Effort Underway Here; Says at C. I. O. Methods

Organization pointing toward a central labor union in Twin Falls was underway this afternoon among members of various crafts and groups in the city, it was announced by H. H. Freedholm, vice president of the state Federation of Labor and organizer for the American Federation of Labor.

At the present time, Freedholm points out, organization of the journeymen plumbers has been completed here. They are affiliated with the United Association of Journeymen Plumbers and Steamfitters and are workers, not contractors. The contractors, he said, are considered master plumbers.

These in Operation Unions which are formed in the city at present and which he said will join the central labor body when organization is completed, include the Typographical Union, Electricians' union, Post Office Clerks' union and Letter Carriers' union.

Organization, now will center among store clerks, hotel workers, restaurant employes, beverage dispensers, lathers, plasterers, bricklayers, painters, carpenters. The latter two groups, Freedholm said, are organized at the present time but will be more closely organized.

At one time organization of a central labor organization was completed in this county. In 1919 the members numbered approximately 750 and construction started on a labor temple, the foundation of which is now utilized by the present American Legion hall, Freedholm said. A depression at that time, however, caused a general strike of workers and formation stopped.

No indication was given as to the time which would be required in completing the local central body. Condemns Sit-Downs "But I want it clearly understood," Freedholm said, "that I am not a member of the CIO and do not subscribe to its methods. I am not in favor of the sit-down strikes nor any other tactics used by that group."

Temporary meeting quarters for the unions will be located at 314 and one-half Second avenue east.

## IDAHO HOLSTEINS EARN HIGH RANK

University of Idaho's Herd Wins National Honors For Butterfat

MADISON, Wis., June 3 (Special)—The honor list of high record Holstein cows for 1926 has just been published by the Holstein-Friesian Association of America. This list is based on official test months and yearly tests for butterfat production reported for pure bred Holsteins throughout the United States.

Five cows in the herd of registered Holsteins owned by the University of Idaho at Moscow, appear six times on the honor list for 1926. In the yearly division for senior two-year olds in Class B, Idaho Korndyke Ozonna placed third with 72.3 lbs. fat and 18,136.5 lbs. milk. A fourth place is held by Idaho Perfection-Gloriana, a senior three-year-old tested in Class A. She produced 268.2 lbs. fat and 23,700.5 lbs. milk during the year.

The senior two-year-old Idaho Korndyke Lucky has the distinction of being the highest producer in the ten months division, Class B. She produced 545.5 lbs. fat and 19,781.5 lbs. milk to place 7th and in the yearly division she ranked 9th with a yield of 630.1 lbs. fat and 17,948.1 lbs. milk. The other two in the honor list are Idaho Korndyke Honora and Idaho Walker Honey-suckle.

The university herd has made a very fine showing in competition with other Holstein herds throughout the United States.

## Strawberries Sold By Valley Grower

HAGERMAN, June 3 (Special)—The first of the season's crop of strawberries here made their appearance on the market last week. The ripening time of the berries this year, according to Charles Carey, one of the heaviest producers from this section, is later than the average season. He stated, the yield is heavier and the berries of a better quality than ever before.

Mr. Carey has seven acres of Early Premier and Dorsets, and has made a planting of four acres of the latest improved varieties this spring.

Pickers are now busy on the crop and 2,012 crates, have already been ordered and another order will be needed later. Thirty pickers are employed at the height of the season.

Mr. Carey states he believes land here if properly cultivated can be made to pay an average of \$125 per acre per year planted in strawberries. The principal expense, he stated, in handling strawberries is the cost of the pickers, the crates, cups and the cultivation of the land.

# PRESIDENT HAS ABANDONED COURT BILL, REPORT SAYS

## OFFICIAL THINKS FDR SHOULD LET MEASURE SLIDE

### White House Maintains That "No Compromise" Will Be Accepted

By JOE ALEX MORRIS  
WASHINGTON, June 3 (Special)—President Roosevelt has abandoned plans for action on his supreme court reorganization bill at this session of congress, a source close to the White House indicated today. A high administration official said that his advice was for Mr. Roosevelt to leave the measure on the calendar so that it might be re-considered next session "if conditions warrant."

The White House maintained its position that "no compromise" would be accepted.

Adopted Advice  
The recent action of the administration in pushing a heavy legislative program before congress and letting the court measure slide into the background indicated, however, that the President had adopted the official's advice.

There was no indication when, if ever, the controversial issue would reach a vote in the senate where opposition leaders assert that it faces certain defeat.

"The bill already has proved an effective weapon," the White House adviser said. "My idea would be to let it ride over until next session in event it is needed then."

### Can Revive Bill Later

It was presumed that he meant such a program would permit the President to revive the bill later in event of supreme court rulings next year against important New Deal legislation.

Parliamentarians pointed out that the plan would work out satisfactorily barring some maneuver by court bill opponents. Senate bills remain on the calendar from one session to the next in the same congress.

Under such a plan, it was said, the measure might not even be debated at length in the present session. The heavy legislative program now before congress would be re-considered every most of the summer.

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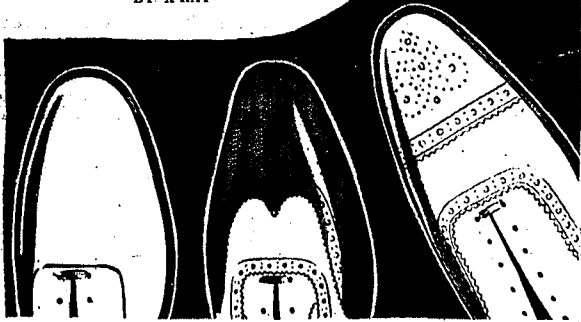
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
