U. S. CONGRESS "FEALTY OATH" BATTLE BREWS

Little Noticed Provision Carried in Planning Bill Causes Fight
DICTATION ATTEMPT SEEN

Beginning of "Socialistic" Regime Charged by Rep. May, Kentucky

WASHINGTON, June 5 (UP)—A rip-roaring congressional fight brewed today over a little-noticed provision carried in the new national resources planning bill, and the quiet directors of the proposed nationwide series of agencies similar to the Tennessee valley authority to take "fealty oaths."

The "fealty oath" provision is carried in both the administration bill introduced in the house by Rep. Joseph Mansfield, D. Tex., and the senate measure advocated by Sen. George W. Norris, I., Neb.

Rep. Andrew J. May, R., Ky., leading house critic of the house military affairs committee, which handles TVA legislation, charged the power proposals marked the beginning of a "socialistic" regime in this country.

Rep. Bertrand H. Snell, house minority leader, contended that the "fealty oaths" represented a White House attempt to dictate congressional policies without consulting the popular representatives.

The basis of the attack: lay in language of the two bills—both of which May and Snell contended without precedent—governing the new regional authorities or planning boards.

"No person shall be appointed a director unless he has given a written declaration of his belief and such statement shall be kept on file at the principal office of the authority."

Snell charged that the language in the bill was "rawest" he had ever seen and he doubted if any "foreign individual possesses more power than the President."

Woman, Baby Added to Death List in Coastal Bus Tragedy

REDDING, Calif., June 5 (UP)—An unidentified woman and her baby were added today to the list of those who were believed to have lost their lives when a northbound Pacific Greyhound bus crashed off the highway, overturned and burst into flames near here yesterday.

It first was reported that only the driver and six male passengers were aboard but it C. Bennett, driver of the stage from which the passengers were transferred to the ill-fated bus, said today that a woman and a child about one year old were aboard when the Greyhound bus left for the north.

Rockefeller Leaves Estate of Near \$25,000,000, Will Reveals

WHITE PLAINS, N. Y., June 5 (UP)—John D. Rockefeller, who at one time was estimated to be worth \$1.1 billion, has left an estate of approximately \$25,000,000, his will filed for probate today, revealed.

The "rustic estate" was left in trust during the life for Margaret Rockefeller de Cuevas, granddaughter of Rockefeller, the trustee being engaged to marry her in the fall of 1937.

They live at Lakewood, N. J., but spend a great part of their time abroad. They have two children, Elizabeth and John.

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President Lists Program Desired For This Session

JUDICIAL AND GOVERNMENTAL CHANGES INCLUDED IN SET-UP

WASHINGTON, June 5 (UP)—President Roosevelt outlined to house leaders today a seven point legislative program—including both judicial and governmental reorganization—which he desires passed at this session of congress.

The President met more than an hour with Speaker William B. Bankhead, D., Ala.; Majority Leader Sam Rayburn, D., Tex.; and Rep. Fred M. Vinson, D., Ky.

Bankhead and Rayburn outlined the following legislative program projected by Mr. Roosevelt:

1. Judiciary reorganization: the house probably will wait senate action; Mr. Roosevelt did not discuss a compromise.
2. Governmental reorganization: Mr. Roosevelt asked for a report on the progress of the house part of a joint senate-house committee considering the program to create two new cabinet positions and abolish the comptroller general's office.
3. Taxes: discussed whether legislation is necessary at this session to plug avoidance and evasion loopholes; house scheduled to take action Thursday to continue discussion.
4. National planning: discussed plans for committee hearings on reorganization; reorganization to create new TVAS throughout the country to develop land and water resources.
5. Farm Tenancy: Mr. Roosevelt has agreed to an experimental aid program costing \$10,000,000 in 1938; \$20,000,000 in 1939-1939, and \$50,000,000 a year thereafter.
6. War Relocation Authority: discussed general discussion on when the house should act on the bill.
7. Housing: bill probably will be pushed as soon as possible; reorganization agree on methods of financing.
8. Legislative list was virtually the same as President Roosevelt discussed earlier this week with senate Majority Leader Joseph T. Robinson, D., Ark. It has been held on a house group added national planning.

GIRL FREED ON MURDER CHARGE

15-Year-Old Student Turned Loose By Jury After Shooting Affair

SAN DIEGO, Calif., June 5 (UP)—Marian Ayres, 15, slim blond high school girl, today was freed from the verdict of a coroner's jury today of criminal blame for shooting to death the man she believed was her father.

Marian has been held on a \$50,000 bond for the killing of Frank T. Ayres, naval petty officer, with a shotgun which she dragged her mother across the room by the hair.

At the inquest late yesterday the jury learned for the first time that Ayres was not her father. She burst into tears when the mother, Mrs. Frances A. Ayres, testified Marian was her daughter by a previous marriage.

She said the date of her first marriage was engraved in the wedding ring her second husband gave her so "Marian would never know."

The jury found that Marian was not criminally responsible for Ayres' death, holding that she fired at him in the belief that her mother was in great danger of bodily harm.

"I Did the Right Thing," Rev. Jardine Says on Return to England

DARLING, England, June 5 (UP)—The Rev. Andrew Jardine, who defied the authority of the Church of England to perform a marriage ceremony for the duke and duchess of Windsor, will make full explanation to his parishioners in a sermon tomorrow night, he announced today.

Arriving by automobile from London, after his return yesterday from France, Jardine said at his vicarage, "I did the right thing, but not the slightest doubt about that."

Jardine returned to marry George Ormsby, club painter, to Dora Haylett, a film and pretty girl. They had been living together for some time before he married after his service for the duke and duchess.

FORD, REPUBLIC, WEIRTON FIRMS NAMED ON LIST

Hundreds of Subpoenas Are Issued to Officials and Employes of Companies

WASHINGTON, June 5 (AP)—The senate civil liberties committee is conducting an intensive investigation of two large steel corporations and the Ford Motor company with a view to public hearings on their labor practices. It was learned today.

Hundreds of subpoenas have already been served upon officials and employes of the automobile firm, the Weirton Steel corporation and Republic Steels company. Among those subpoenaed is Ernest T. Weir, board chairman of the Weirton company.

Two crack investigators of the senate body, which is headed by Sen. Robert M. La Follette, Jr., of Wisconsin in Youngstown, O., inquiring into the causes of the steel strike and friction between the company and striking members of the steel workers organizing committee, an affiliate of John L. Lewis' committee for industrial organization.

There has been a regular rash of anniversaries in the collegiate world lately. From the Harvard tercentenary on down, campus after campus has celebrated its birthday in some good round number, and capped-and gowned speakers have urged the world to witness the strides America has made in the field of higher education.

We get another of these anniversaries this June; one which will not cause as much of a stir as some of them have, but which will be well worth noting, even so. It is the centennial of Blackburn College, at Carlinville, Ill.

Blackburn College is a small institution, and it is not especially famous. It is noteworthy for being one of the most advanced of the "progressive" colleges which make education available to youngsters who are hard up for money.

Students at Blackburn can work their way through by working with their hands for two and one-half hours daily. Jobs are sandwiched in between studies. All of the physical facilities of the place—laundry, bakery, kitchen, power plant and so on—are operated by students. When fire swept the campus some years ago it was the students who did the rebuilding.

This kind of a program has made a college education available to a great many ambitious young middle westerners who would not, otherwise, have been able to get one. And it is a pretty safe bet that since they had to work for it they have made good use of it.

This leads us to a consideration of the place that the small college occupies in the American scheme of things. There are a good many places like Blackburn College in America. They are practically unheard of in the world which judges colleges by athletic records, size of student bodies, extent of endowment-funds and social prestige; yet they do a tremendous amount of good work, year after year, and their alumni make records which indicate that these little places are, in their way, quite as useful and valuable as the big ones.

On the face of things, all of these little colleges should be third-raters. They lack the library, laboratory and research facilities of the big institutions. They cannot hope to compete for distinguished faculty members. If other things were equal, they should be educating their young people only about half as well as the big places.

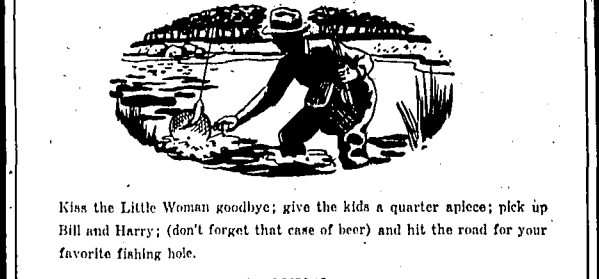

Economists See Great Britain Helping to Absorb Bar Shipments

WASHINGTON, June 5 (AP)—Increased cooperation by Great Britain to lighten the burden imposed on the United States by unprecedentedly heavy shipments of gold for sale to this country was forecast today by government economists.

Evidence of cooperative efforts were seen in the absorption by the British equalization fund of recent large offerings of gold on the London market.

President Roosevelt made it clear at his press conference yesterday that no change in this country's gold policy was contemplated, despite contrary rumors abroad.
